In district interscholastic competition she was 1st in debate her junior and senior years; 1st in slide rule, junior year; second in shorthand, senior year.

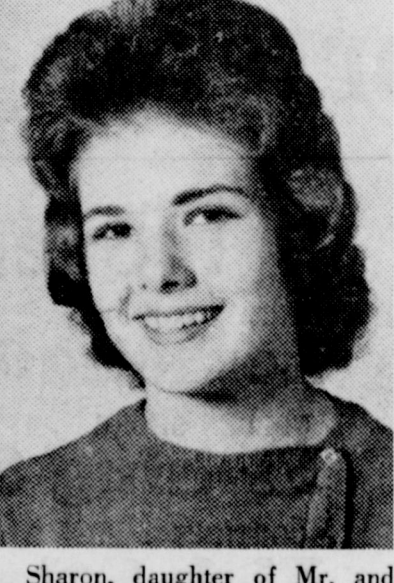
Jean Ann works part time as secretary at the Presbyterian church and is pianist in her Sunday School department at the 1st Baptist church.

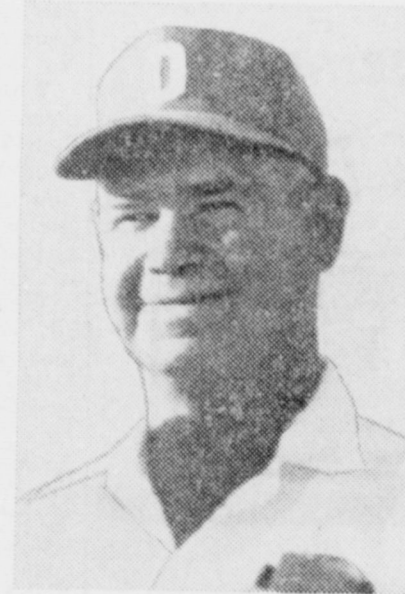

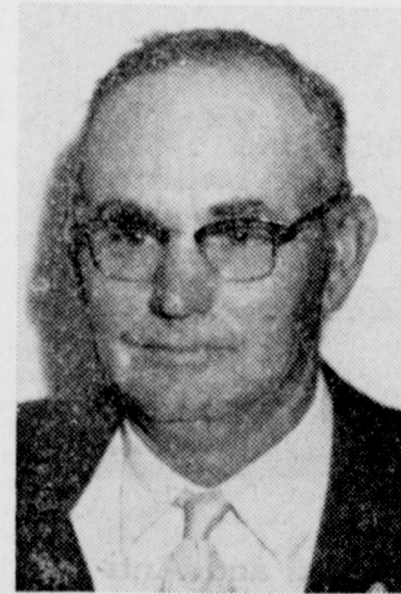

How much wisdom there is in that! And how often we forget it! We tinker around with everything in life, trying to find the combination that will make life right, but always seem carefully to avoid the key to it all—putting ourselves right.

I suppose the real reason we always avoid this alternative is because it brings things so "close to home." If we can yell about our politicians, our government, our schools, and complain about anything and everything else, we can try to hide from the fact that our real problems center in ourselves. We search for handy and acceptable scapegoats to gallop away with our sins and problems and shortcomings, but in the end it never works. We are still "stuck with ourselves."

Any real reformation of life must begin from the inside. It means we must "get our lives out on the carpet"; that rather than examining everyone else's faults we must look at our own. There was Someone who once said something about specks and logs in the eye; it still holds true. It always will.

The Christian makes the unusual and bold claim that the only place that this getting out on the carpet can take place is before God. Not just any old God, mind you, but the God who reveals His love in Jesus Christ. And this love is found in His Church.

You might be saying that you have seen plenty of unloving things about the Church. With red faces we admit this. But we also admit that the Church is the very place for sinners! That's the reason we are followers of Christ in His Church, because we admit the fact that we are sinners. And we know, in all our imperfection, the great perfection of God. It is in His Church that we find this love and forgiveness and His Word communicated in word and sacrament. And this love is open to all men.

The ancient prayer of Saint Augustine still has it: "Thou hast

made us, O Lord, for Thyself, and our heart shall find no rest till it rest in Thee." If you want to solve the vexing problems of your world, you must begin with yourself. Worship this Sunday with one of the congregations of His People. If the "map" of the man is out of kilter, then the map of the world will remain out of kilter too.
