in high school.

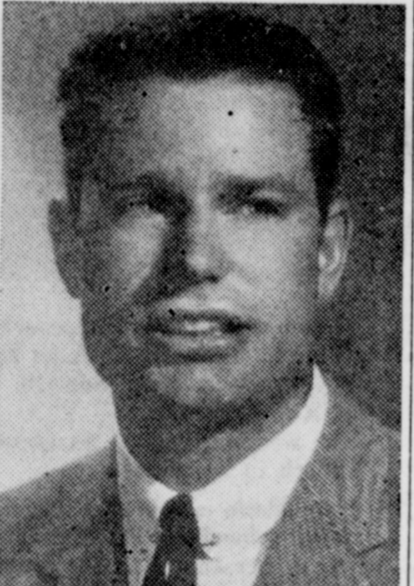
Ellis was born in Cumby and

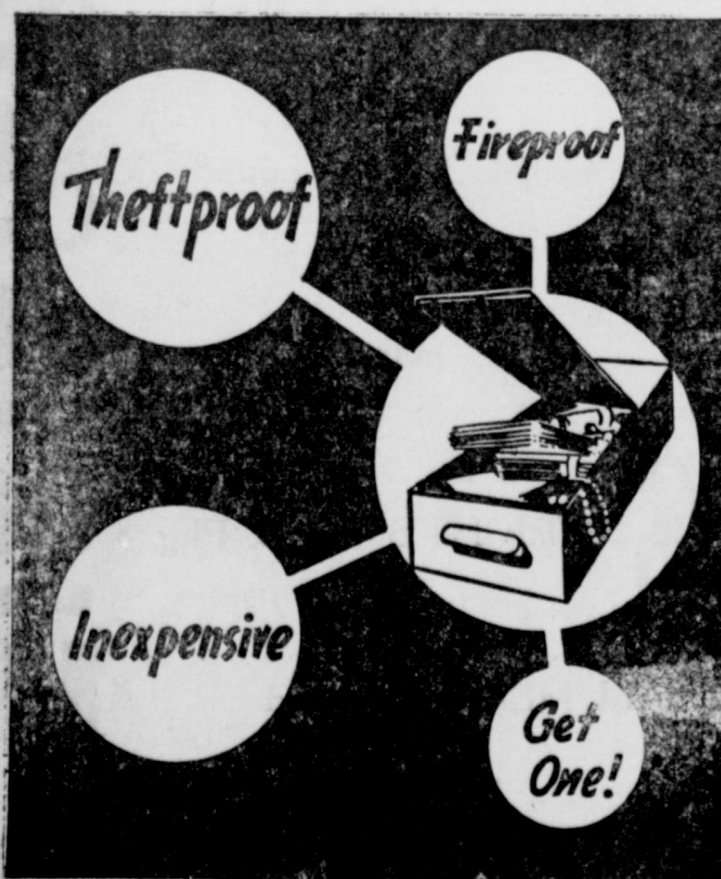

At one of our crusades, a young mother carried her small, club-footed child in her arms for prayer. Dangling from her arms was a pair of brand-new little shoes. When I asked her what they were for, tears came to her eyes. Her chin began to quiver and she said, "Brother Roberts, God is going to heal my little boy, and I'm going to take those old shoes off him tonight. I'm going to lace these new ones on his feet, and he is going to walk out of this tent."
After the little fellow was prayed for, he calmly sat down, unlaced his old, special-built shoes and put his new ones on. He walked everywhere. He and his mother had faith, and with that faith they expected his healing.
Faith is not something you try to make yourself believe. It is something you cannot doubt. Faith is inward certainty. It is an attitude you have developed by believing right about God. You believe so completely that you cannot doubt it.
A housewife wanting to preserve her beautiful sterling silver used it only when she had guests. Hidden away, it tarnish-

ed quickly; and each time she brought it out, she worked hours to restore its brightness. In despair, she left it out, used it daily and was surprised when it not only retained its shining luster, but became even more beautiful.
Faith is to be used every day, not just when you are faced with dire emergency. You can trust Christ with each care, problem and burden. He is interested in the small incidents of your life as well as in the large ones.
The Bible says that "every person has been given the measure of faith." However, not everyone uses his faith to the best advantage. Faith must be put into action before it becomes a force. You must trust God and expect Him to bring about the things He has promised.
Many times during my life I have stepped out on nothing but faith. Because I put my faith into action and because God is good, what I believed for came to pass. Your faith can be powerful, too. Just use your faith—put it to work. You are not "taking a chance" when you rely upon God.

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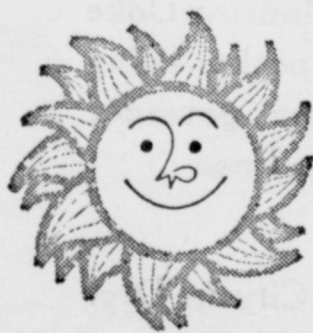
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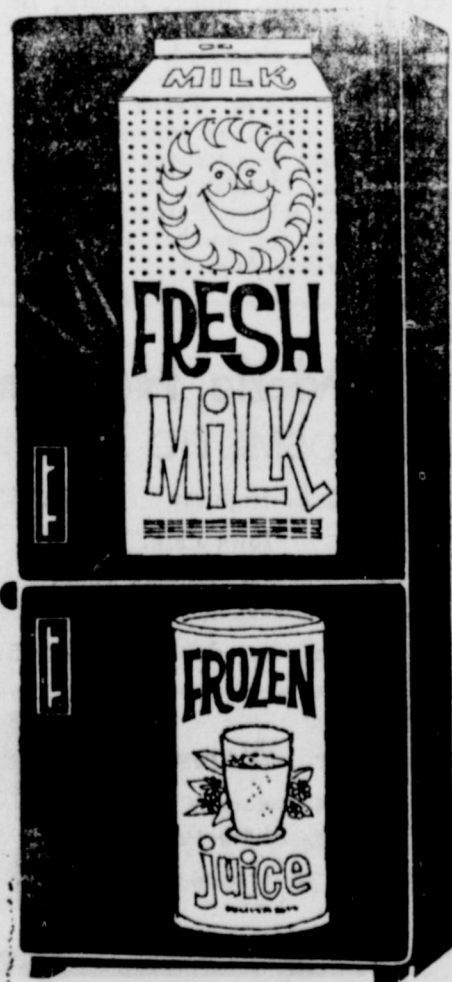
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
