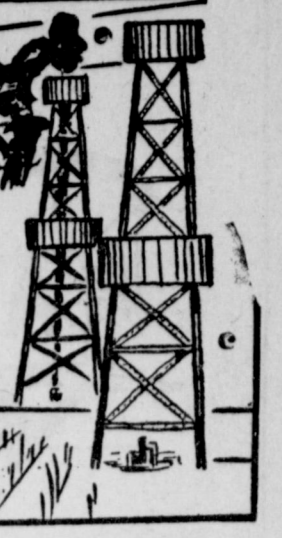

## Hawks Scalp Indians 21-12

Coach Tommy Watkins' boys came out fired up Friday night and pulled off a well rehearsed reverse play on the opening kickoff that found Larry Thompson carrying the ball to the Indian 39. Five plays later the Indians from Quanah were on the short end of a 7-0 score.

This blow demoralized the visitors, and the magnificent Hawk line set about to complete the rout. Bear Waters, Gordon Parkey, Carson Crume, Carlton Walls and Phillip Green, backed up by Billy Jackson and Terry May, time and again stymied the famed Indian ground game by stunting and red-dogging.

Waters and May played havoc with Quanah quarterback Gibson. They forced him to hurry passes and constantly haunted him. The remarkable Gibson wound up with only three completions in nine passing tries.

Hawk quarterback Robert Dawson stayed mostly with ground plays so consistent were his backs in picking up needed yardage. He threw seven times, completed 3 for 55 yards and 1 touchdown. Drew Sawyer tried his halfback pass, but had it intercepted.

Iowa Park and Quanah traded punts in the first quarter and then traded fumbles. Hawks lost a good chance to score, dropping the ball on the Indian 10. Quanah kicked out to the 47. Three plays netted a first down and then Thompson scooted 19 yards to the Quanah 16.

May got 6, Jackson 6, May 3, and the quarter ended. Next play Dawson cracked the final yard for Iowa Park's second counter. Dawson converted for the 6th straight time this year to give Hawks a 14-0 advantage.

Quanah came back and showed why they were rated so highly. Holmes returned the kick-off to the 34 with a run that had local supporters on their feet. Two penalties didn't stop them. Down the field Quanah came like real Indians on the warpath. IP finally gathered their defenses and Gibson's 4th down pass fell incomplete, to give the Hawks possession on their own 5.

May kicked out to the Indian 48. Two passes put Quanah on the Hawk 25, then Gibson broke loose on a scoring run. His attempt at conversion was stopped.

With only 92 seconds left in the half the Hawks took the kickoff. Jackson carried to the 44; May to midfield. Dawson passed to End Ronnie Berry for 12. On fourth down, Dawson hit Sawyer for the remaining 38 yards. He calmly added his 3rd conversion.

After fine halftime shows by bands of both schools, the Hawks kicked off. Watkins had his boys defending well, and the Indians couldn't move the Hawks took over. Indian halfback John Holmes, a speedster who scared the Hawks and fans several times, picked off Sawyer's pass and returned to the Quanah 45. Gibson made 17 yards and then tried passes. Three fell incomplete and the Indians kicked. IP picked up a first down and then a penalty stalled them into a kick. Quanah ran one play and the third quarter ended with the Hawks holding a 21-6 edge.

Iowa Park surrender two first downs before forcing the Indians to kick. Jackson fumbled the ball and the Indians took over on the Hawk 8. Dennis Barker made 2 and Gibson raced to paydirt on a fake pass. Gibson tried his roll out pass which failed, leaving the score 21-12.

Strong running and fumbles dominated the rest of the game.

Coach Watkins named Danny Tarbet, Harry Moore, James Moore, Jackson and Sawyer his Hawks of the Week.

This Friday night is a crucial time for the Hawks. They travel to Olney to battle the Cubs. Olney has a fine time which swept to five victories before being tied by Childress last Friday.

Coach Watkins invites all Hawk boosters to the school Friday at 3:00 for a pep rally and send-off

## Society Listing Crippled Folk

In an effort to locate all persons—children and adults—in North Texas who are handicapped either by disease or injury, a questionnaire is being distributed to all schools in Montague, Clay, Wilbarger, Young, Jack, Baylor, Archer and Wichita counties. The forms are being distributed at the schools this week and it is hoped by Oct. 21 a complete list of such persons will have been compiled.

North Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults operates the North Texas Crippled Children's Center in Wichita Falls.

Cleo Nipper, a board member of the Society, said, "We are particularly interested in knowing of adults who are now handicapped as the result of such things as strokes, arthritis, multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease. With therapy many can be helped back to a functional life."

At present, some 70 youngsters afflicted with crippling defects receive treatments at the Center, where six professionally trained therapists are on duty in addition to a consulting orthopedist.

Mr. Nipper pointed out that "handicapped" refers not only to body movements but also to hearing and speech.

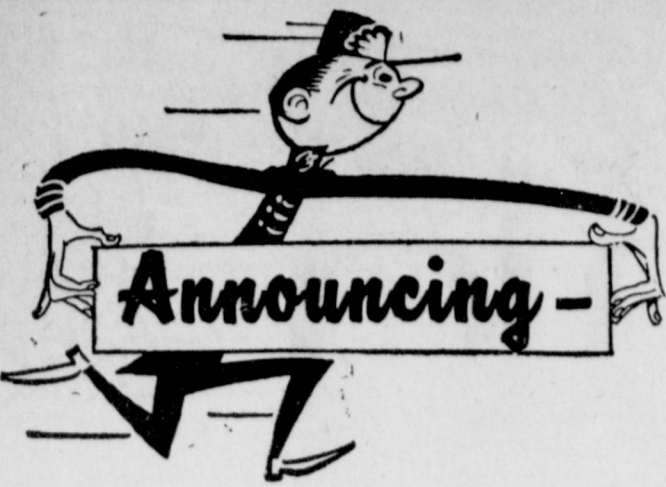
The couple live at 800 East Pasadena.

## Yarborough Pushing Education Program

Senator Ralph Yarborough of Texas is co-author of a three-part education bill that will expand and strengthen education now and in the future. It has been approved in the Senate and is now pending in the House.

This bill will expand vocational education; extend the National Defense Education Act three years; increase funds available for student loans in colleges and universities; extend the law granting aid to school districts in so-called impacted areas.

Some 400,000 students in Texas have benefited from the vocational education section of this bill which provided home economics and agriculture training. The new law proposes to expand vocational education into the fields of mechanics, industry and business to help prepare young people to take their place in this technological society.

Under the NDEA provision, 77 Texas colleges and universities have taken part, and 17,300 students in Texas received loans to stay in school in fiscal 1961 and 1962. More than 170 fellowships for doctorates were awarded in graduate programs in Texas under NDEA. Sixty fellowships went to students of foreign languages and

others were awarded to teachers of the deaf and the mentally retarded.

In 1963 more than \$17,000,000 was provided for 249 Texas school districts to build, maintain and operate schools overloaded by the children of nearby federal personnel. About 5 per cent of the entire Texas population is military. This bill will extend this program another three years.

Senator Yarborough this week issued a statement favoring repeal of the poll tax on Nov. 9:

"Our state will vote for or against repeal of the poll tax on November 9. This is our opportunity to do away with the price tag imposed on the liberty of ten million Texans. A 'FOR' vote is for repeal. Put the poll tax in the antique shows with the whipping posts, ducking stools, the thumb screw and leg-irons.

"Thirty-six states have already ratified the proposed federal constitutional amendment, of which I am a co-author, to abolish the poll tax as a prerequisite for voting in federal elections. Only two more states are needed to make this amendment a part of our Constitution. Final ratification is certain to come by next March. If Texans are still saddled with the

state poll tax and federal elections are free of the poll tax, our state will have the most confusing and complex and expensive election system in the nation."

John Hail has been appointed general chairman of the local annual CROP Hallowe'en project on October 31. This year's collection will be a united endeavor of nine church youth groups. It is expected that 50 persons of junior high age and older will take part.

Christian Rural Overseas Program is the community food appeal of Church World Service, gathering farm commodities and cash to provide for overseas relief and rehabilitation through church overseas programs.

CROP gifts are always put to use under church supervision and in co-operation with local social welfare groups. Distribution is made on the basis of need without question of religion, race or creed.

In 1962, youth of Texas collected \$55,085 for CROP and help to provide 199,250,000 lbs. of government-donated food overseas, in addition to other shipments of food, fiber and self-help materials, valued at over a half-million dollars, which were not otherwise available to the overseas programs of the churches.

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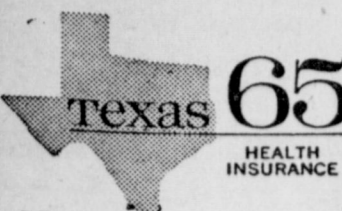
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## Service Held for C. A. Pearce

Approval last Wednesday of the sale of US wheat to the Soviet Union and Eastern European countries has been receiving increasing bi-partisan support since details have become known.

I fully support the President in this matter. I was among a group of members of Congress who discussed the matter with the President prior to his statement on the subject.

On Oct. 2, I said two prerequisites to my support for such a wheat sale would be that the sale be handled through regular business channels, and that the sale must be for gold or dollars. Both of these requirements have been met. Further, there will be no government credit granted in the deal.

Pleasing to me was the announcement that all the wheat possible will be carried on ships flying the American flag. Foreign shipping will be used only when US shipping is not available. No single US exporter will get too big a share of the orders.

Most basic argument for the sale of wheat to the Soviets is that we have a surplus of wheat and a deficit in our balance of payments which gives us a need for more gold. The Soviets have a need for our wheat and apparently have the gold with which to purchase it. The trade, therefore, would be mutually advantageous.

Cold hard fact is that we cannot effectively prevent the Soviet

Union from obtaining our wheat. They have been purchasing flour from other free nations which was milled from US wheat.

Why should we greet with fear any talk of peace and greet with applause all talk of war?
