

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

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

ORDINANCE NO. 309

This is an ordinance providing for a pubic hearing for annexa-tion of the hereinafter described territory of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and extending the boundary limits of said City so as to include said hereinafter described property within said limits: and providing for a date, time, and place for a public hearing for all interested persons to be heard and giving notice of such public hearing by publication in a newspaper, providing said notice shall be published at least once in said newspaper not more than twenty (20) days nor less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing, and providing for the effective date of this ordinance: and,

Whereas, the Iowa Park Independent School District has requested of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that said City Annex the hereinafter described territory surrounding and upon which the Bradford School is situated, which is one of the elementary schools of the Iowa Park Independent School District, and extend the boundaries of said City so as to include said school and school ground situated in the hereinafter described territory within said city limits: and,

Whereas, the land hereinziter described in Section One (1) of this Ordinance adjoins the present city limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, and the members of the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, have concluded that said area, being contiguous to and with the south city limits of said City, and being within the extra-territorial jurisdiction of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, should be annexed and made a part of the City of Iowa Park, Texas; and,

Whereas, a public hearing for all interested persons to be heard on the question of annexing the hereinafter described territory should be had, and notice of such hearing should be published in a newspaper for not more than twenty (20) days nor less than ten (10) days prior to the date of hearing; and,

Whereas, the notice of said public hearing shall include a descrip-tion of the territory to be an-nexed which is described as fol-

Beginning at the point of inter-section of the South City Limits Line of the City of Iowa Park and the East right-of-way of South Texowa Street:

Thence South 01º 29' 20" West along said East right-of-way line extended South 663.0 feet to an Thence North 890 13' 30" East

359.3 feet to an iron rod; Thence South 000 46' 30" East

600.0 feet to an iron rod; Thence South 89º 13' 30" West at 883.1 feet, an iron rod in the East right-of-way line of South Texowa Street extended South and continuing a total distance of 958.16 feet to a point in the West right-of-way line of South Texowa Street extended South:

Thence North 01° 29' 30" East 1266.43 feet to a point of intersection of the West right-of-way line of South Texowa Street and the City of Iowa Park South City Limits Line;

Thence East along the City of Iowa Park's South City Limits Line 75.0 feet to the place of Beginning.

Now, Therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that the public be informed that the City intends to annex the above de-

scribed territory, and extend its boundary limits so as to include said above described territory within said City Limits, that a public hearing be had on said annexation ordinance in the City Council's Chambers of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, on the 10 day of October, 1966, at 7:30 o'clock P.M. That the City Clerk shall cause notice of such public hearing to be published in the Iowa Park Herald newspaper in Iowa Park, Texas, for not more than twenty (20) days nor less than ten (0) days prior to the date of said public hearing.

Section 2: That this Ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage as the Charter in such cases provides.





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
