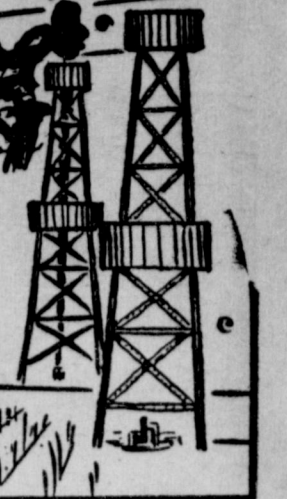

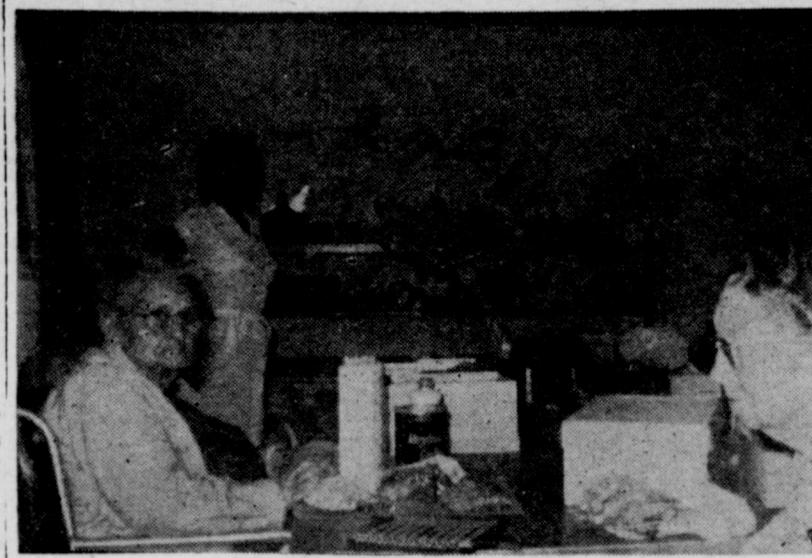
Annual Christmas party for the

Occupational Therapy Provides Interest to Patients at Park Manor



Park Manor Nursing Home, which was opened here in April, is one of the few nursing homes in the area with an occupational therapy department. Mrs. Jo Nell McKay is head of the department.

Dr. E. W. Featherston of Vernon and W. S. Featherston of Iowa Park are owners of Park Manor. Dr. Featherston, knowing the social, mental and physical advantages of occupational therapy work, planned to have the department in the earliest stages of planning and building the nursing home.

Mrs. McKay took special training in the occupational therapy department of Wichita Falls state hospital. She has an enthusiasm for the work that is contagious among co-workers and patients alike.

Mrs. McKay is presently directing the making of Christmas decorations. Patients have already made attractive wreaths with clove bottle tops, Sana Clauses, sleds, angels fashioned of Readers Digest magazines, and other symbols of the season.

Mrs. McKay expressed gratitude for interest and assistance of people of the community in the department. Following is a list of items which can be used in the work:

Clifford Carl Burrows, 79, died at his home 600 North Wall, at 4:30 a.m. Sunday, Dec. 6, following two years of illness.

Resident of Iowa Park since 1907, Burrows was born near Beebe, Ark., Feb. 25, 1885. He was married to Miss Annie Bassinger in Nash, Texas, in 1904.

When they first moved to Iowa Park he was engaged in farming. Later he became substitute carrier on Route One. He was the first appointed rural carrier of Route Three and made the 20-mile trip on a bicycle at first. Later he used a horse cart, motorcycle with sidecar, a motor buggy, and finally a car. During this time, Burrows also operated a blacksmith shop.

In 1952 he was appointed Iowa Park postmaster by Herbert Hoover, a position he held more than eight years.

Mr. Burrows was a member of First Methodist church, Masonic Lodge No. 713 and the Shriners.
