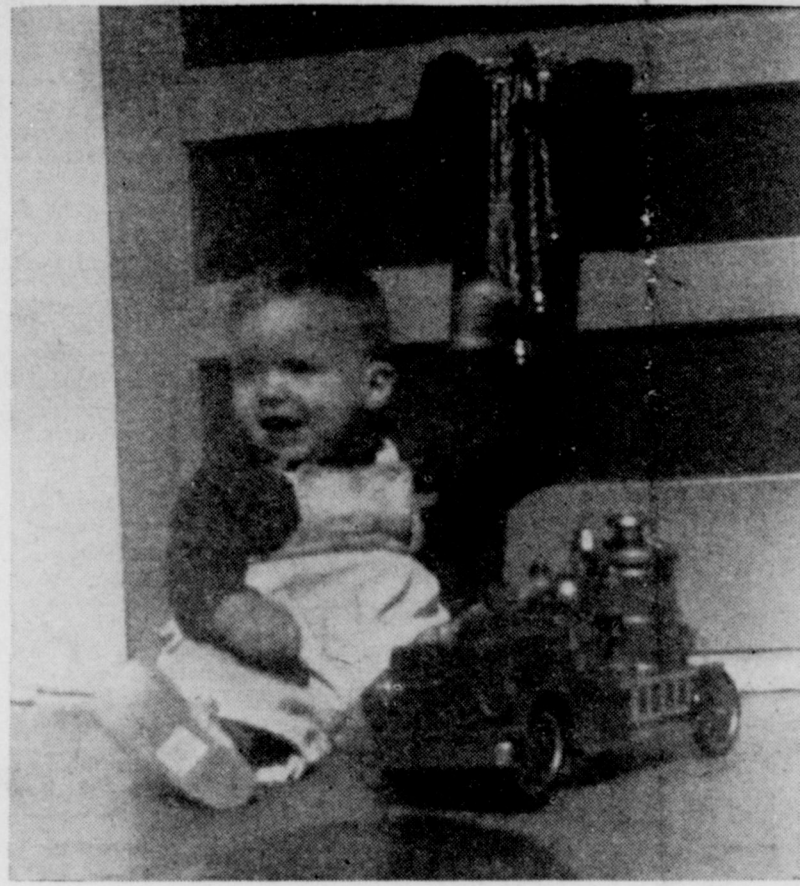

The Meaning of Christmas

At this particular season our
thoughts turn to the birth day of
the greatest person who ever
lived. It is the day dedicated to
the memory of the birth of our
Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Far from outgrowing the Christ-
mas story, the passing of time
only proves that such a message
is absolutely indispensable to
man's happiness here and here-
after. If you want to know what
the world was like before Christ
Jesus came into it as Bethlehem's
Babe, dust off your ancient his-
tory and read a few chapters. If
you want to know what the world
would be like today should the
Christmas story suddenly be de-
stroyed or totally forgotten, just
take a trip through some area of
the earth where the name of Je-
sus is unknown.

The story of our savior's birth
should appeal to the deepest think-
ers of all time: To the historian,
since the advent of this babe gave
new purpose and direction to the
course of humanity; to the scien-
tist, for the Christ of Bethlehem
holds the ultimate secret of life
itself; to the philosopher, for Je-
sus brought to a world already sa-
tiated with various philosophies a
new and living way or pattern of
existence; and to the theologian,
for above all, Christ came to
give weary, sin sick bankrupt hu-
manity a new and adequate dy-
namic for life.

The Christmas message is thus
a pardon, not a death warrant; a
birth certificate, not an obituary;
a moral dynamic, not merely
good advice. For Christ, who is
the theme of the Christmas mes-
sage, is "the way, the truth, and
the life."

In reading the scripture, there

are three things that stand out
which should be emphasized in
the proper celebration of Christ-
mas in order to be happy, and to
make others happy.

First, there is joy. Christmas is
a time of great joy because nearly
2000 years ago, there came into
our world one to redeem it. This
promise of God of his first com-
ing has been fulfilled. The an-
nouncement of the angelic host
was, "Fear not; for behold I bring
you good tidings of great joy,
which shall be to all people. And
suddenly there was with the Angel
a multitude of the heavenly host
praising God, and saying, Glory
to God in the highest, and on
earth peace, good will toward
men" (Luke 2:10,13,14). This
should be a joyful season to all
Christians, a time of joy much
richer than at any other time of
the year.

The second thing that should be
emphasized at Christmas is wor-
ship. The wise men from the east
said, "Where is he that is born
King of the Jews? for we have
seen his star in the east, and are
come to worship him" (Matthew
2:2). At the birth of Christ, God
hung a special star in the heaven
for hope and guidance. The wise
men followed the gleam of this
star for many days, over moun-
tains and valleys until it stopped
over a stable in the little town of
Bethlehem. When they entered the
stable they fell down and wor-
shipped him. Though this babe
was not born in a king's palace,
there was something different
about the child that made them
want to fall on their knees and
worship him. This time of year
should be a time of worship and
praise to God for His great gift
to the world.

The third thing that should be
emphasized at Christmas is giv-
ing. "When they opened their
treasures, they presented unto him
gifts." Christmas is a time for giv-
ing gifts, not just receiving them.
God gave to us the greatest gift
of all, His only Son. This was a
gift of redemption. Man had fallen
in sin and no other sacrifice would
suffice.

In view of God's "unspeakable
gift" to us, what gifts shall we
make in return to him? He is
worthy of our supreme love. The
true spirit of Christmas is receiv-
ing the gift of God and in return
giving ourselves and possessions
to Him.

They like to browse through second-hand shops, searching for furniture, farm implements, or anything that has weathered the storms through the years, and it is amazing how they can repair and refinish things in the worst state of repair so perfectly.

Their latest project has been doing over three old trunks they found in a second-hand store. The trunks will be presented to their three grandchildren at Christmas. The children also appreciate antiques, so Mr. and Mrs. Van Horn feel they will be delighted.

A big turtle back trunk will be their gift to Bobby Short, because they think it will suit his taste. It was originally covered with cowhide, which had to be removed. Then, it was a pretty tedious job to lift the wood and metal strips up to slip Naugahyde plastic underneath. The trunk still has the original brass lock, but the handles had to be replaced, and the Van Horns replaced them with leather dog collars. They relined the trunk with dark red plastic.

Mrs. Don Holly of Mesquite, the couple's granddaughter, will receive the trunk with the most feminine look. This was originally all black, and Mrs. Van Horn used her ability to paint for brightening the metal strips on

top with colorful zinis. To heighten interest, the original picture inside the lid depicting a farm scene was salvaged and restored to its original place after the trunk had been lined with green.

like folds of gold metallic, which served as containers for gold flowers, was the focal point. The inside featured a red, white and green theme with a joyous snowman the main attraction.

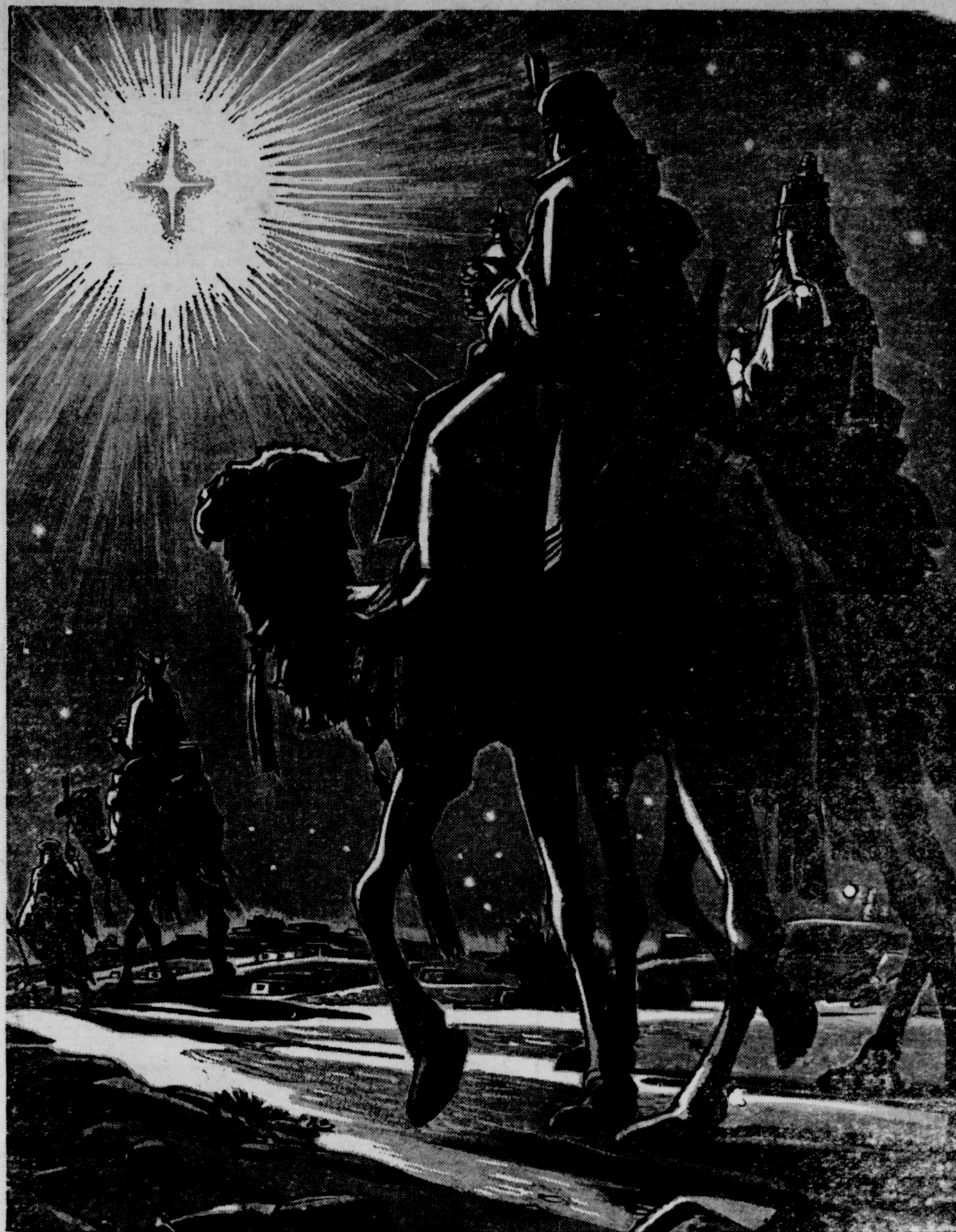
Here again, one would be tempted to place a blue ribbon on each door in the building, because each was a winner in its own rank and setting.

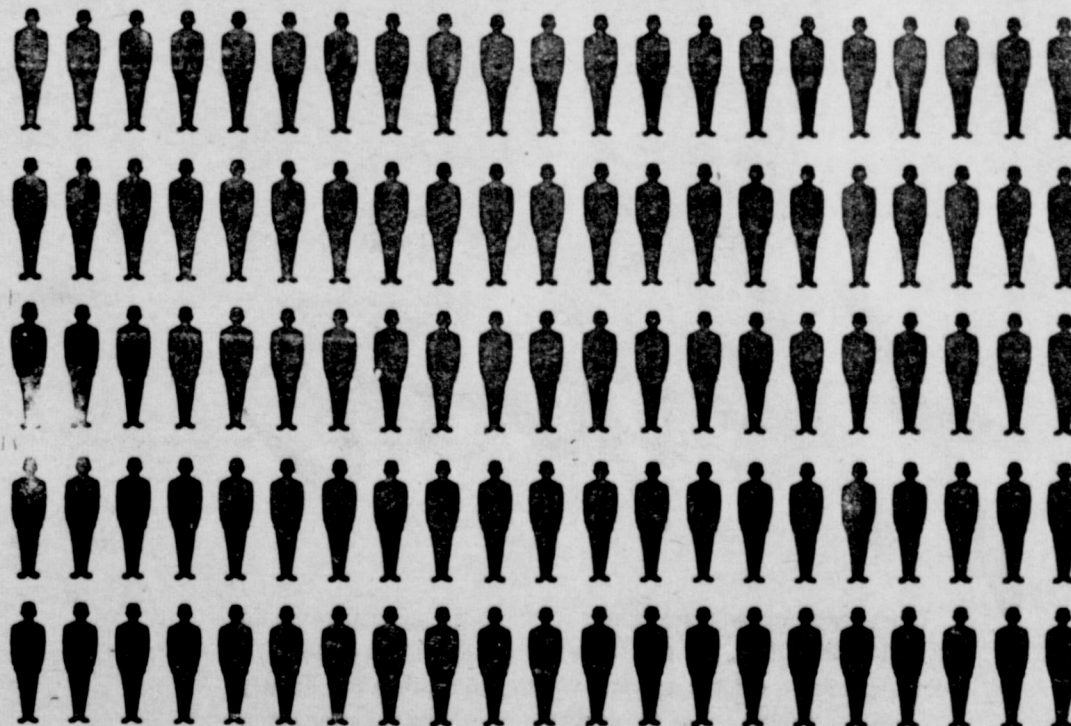

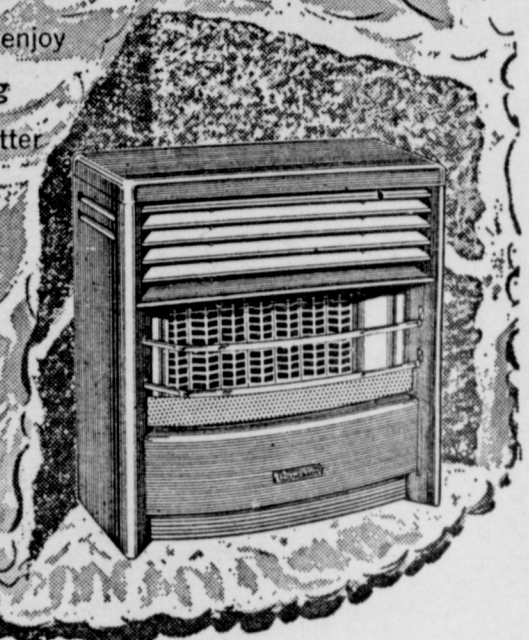

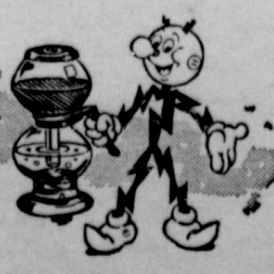
