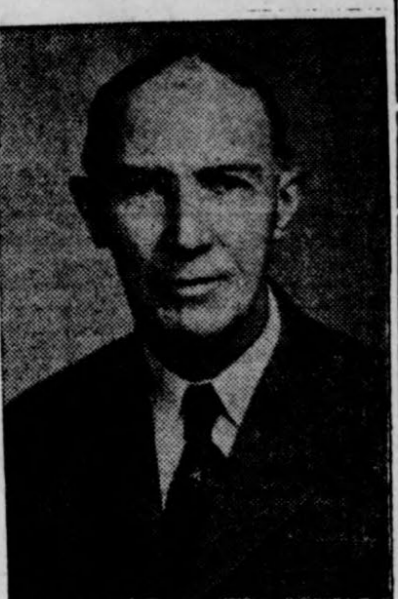

An informative Pan-American program featured a meeting of the 23 Study club Thursday afternoon. Mrs. Sam Hill was hostess to the members who assembled at the Baptist church.

Any animal shown in the county show must meet the same requirements as those entered in the district show. 6. A contestant may enter only one animal in the county show. For parents of pre-school youngsters, who are getting them ready for the - we'll say - get acquainted school, which will be conducted the first week after the regular school term is finished, in the Iowa Park first grade rooms. Here is a reminder of the greatest importance to the child's health. That is health. For a child to learn fast and keep up with all school activities, he must be able to see well, have good teeth, know how to eat the right kind of foods and why it is important to eat them, and have good health habits.

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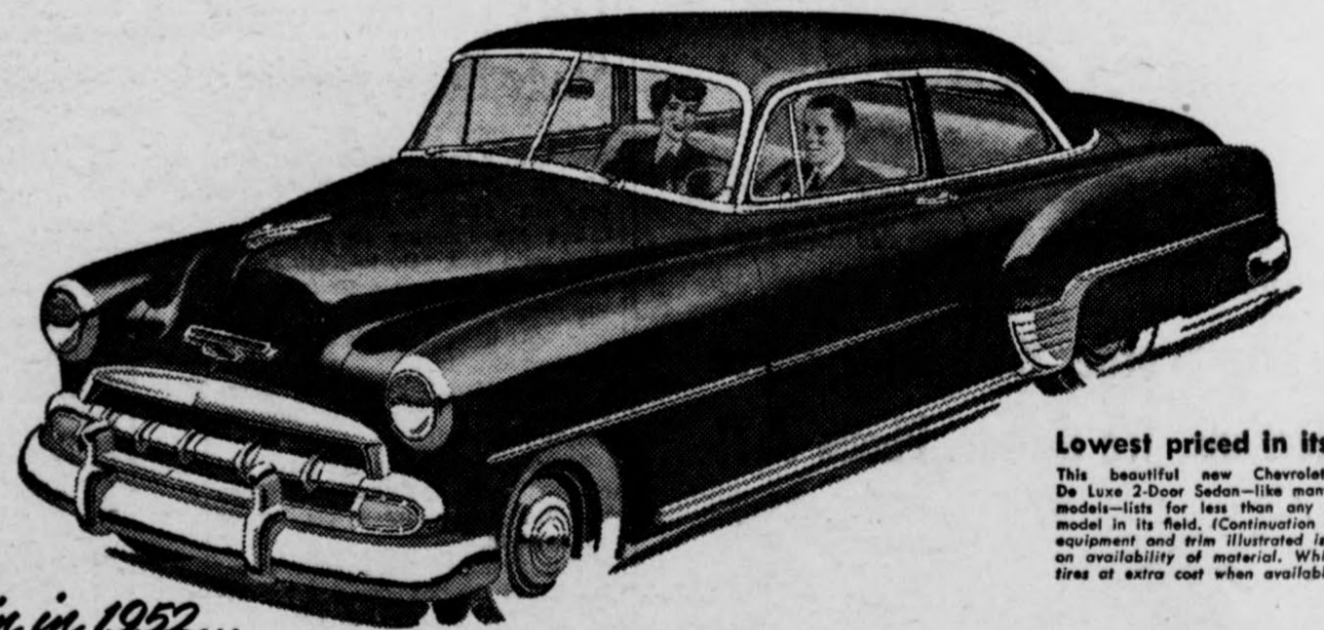
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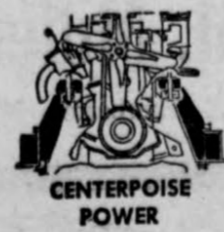
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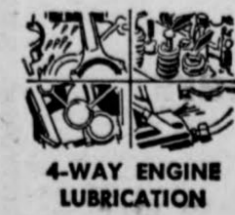
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
