Voting Saturday Will Have Two Party Primaries

The Republican Primary will be held Saturday, May 7, at Faith Baptist church, Iowa Park, for all voters of Precincts 30 through 35, according to China B. Smith.

The polls will open at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m.

Bruce Wester will serve as judge and Smith will assist him.

There are no contested races on the Republican ballot and no write-ins are expected. Main purpose of the primary will then be to qualify party members to attend precinct, county and state conventions.

According to a recent ruling, a person cannot hold party office unless he has voted in the party's primary election.

Although the six voting precincts are using the Iowa Park location for their primary election, individual precinct conventions are to be held immediately after the polls are closed. Purpose of the conventions is to name delegates to the county convention.

Millions of Democrats are expected to go to their respective voting places and select nominees to represent the party in November's general election. This preliminary skirmish is set for all day Saturday, May 7, beginning at 7:00 and ending at 7:00.

Only precinct chairmen will be elected Saturday. The other names on the ballot represent candidates for party nomination to the various county, district and state offices.

Precinct 32, which includes all of Commissioner's Precinct 3 north of the railroad except for a small section around Clara, will probably poll more than 1000 votes.

Precinct 31, Clara community, will do well if 30 Democrats show up.

Several hundred voters are expected in Precinct 33 and nearly as many in Precinct 34.

Democrats of Precinct 32 will cast ballots at the ASCS building on West Park in Iowa Park. Those voting in Precinct 33 will go to Presbyterian church here.

Immediately upon completion of voting hours, each Precinct will conduct a convention, when delegates to the county convention will be elected and resolutions will be offered concerning party policy.

A voter who fails to attend his precinct convention has not used his full powers and fulfilled his obligation to his party and his state. Let's vote early, and then come back at 7:00 p.m. Saturday and take an active part in making the Texas Democratic party a dynamic part of the National Democratic party!
