After 75 Years 'White House' Landmark Here, Pulled Down

Landmarks, irrespective of significance and sentiment, so often have to be torn down for one reason or another.

If it were possible to preserve or to restore them, a community or state or nation would have many places of interest for both natives and tourists to enjoy and to relive yesteryears.

As the wheels of progress turn, keeping pace demands that some landmarks be torn down to make way for new roads, buildings, industries. Too, deterioration and vandalism, when a building is vacant, have forced owners, relatives or interested persons to give their consent for the razing of the structure.

Among the landmarks in our community now passed is the 8-room frame house with 2 screened-in porches and a long front porch extending almost the width of the house known as the "White House," part of which stood almost 75 years about 1/2 mile southwest of town.

Razing of the structure took place a few weeks ago.

The late Mr. and Mrs. John J. White and their family moved to Iowa Park from Hill county in 1891 and settled on a plot of land purchased from Tarrant county school land. Late in March 1892 the house was destroyed by a tornado, and White, who was a carpenter and contractor, rebuilt the house about a block north from where the first one stood.

About 1914 the house was remodeled and more rooms were added. The heavy plate glass front door flanked by long glass panels was one of the most attractive features about the house.

The door opened into an "entrance room" about 9x12 where the library table, bookcase, console Victrola and wall telephone were. Incidentally, the family had the same telephone number 51 until dial telephones were installed.

To the left was a door leading to a living room 14x16. At one time a pump organ graced the room and later a piano was added. South of the entrance room was a large dining room where the wood heater burned in cold weather.

There were 4 large bedrooms (only 2 clothes closets) and a good-sized kitchen. Ceilings were high and the base boards wide.

In one corner of the dining room stood a hand pump covering an underground cistern. The pump, which would be considered something unique today, was a luxury when installed. Water was drawn from the cistern and dropped into a bucket hanging on the front of the pump in cups attached to the pulley chains.

James J. (Jim) White, a son, and his father were well known "threshermen" in a wide area of Northwest Texas. They went out every spring with their outfit which included a steam engine, separator, cook shack, bundle wagons, teams, and pitchforks, and a crew of workers.

When the harvest season was over, part of the equipment was stored in a big barn on the place. There were also barns and stalls

for the milch cows, horses and mules and houses and coops for the chickens, turkeys and guineas.

In the hustle and bustle of the city, the "White Place" was the ideal spot for relaxation and rest. Mrs. White, mother of nine, five of whom lived to be grown, was an excellent cook and warm hospitality radiated from their Christian home.

Mr. White, who wore a long beard and bore resemblance to a patriarch of old, was a quiet-spoken man using very few superfluous words. Relatives and friends recall now what he always said to guests at a meal following grace, "Now what you can't reach, just call for."

Upon the deaths of his parents, Jim White continued to live in the home place. He suffered a broken hip in a fall in 1959 and was in a nursing home in Tom Bean for 4 1/2 years before his death.

Even before his death, the house had suffered some vandalism. Three weeks following his death, entrance was gained into the house by caving in two outside doors and a drinking party was held. Beautiful pieces of furniture were broken to smithereens, inside doors torn off the hinges, window panes shattered, walls spattered with grease, and an effort made to burn the house.

Vandalism increased, and the one-time lovely house was nothing more than an invitation for vandalism, immoral and drinking parties.

The heirs had no other choice. They advertised: "For Sale — House to be torn down and moved off premises." They were swamped with calls from people who expressed interest. It was sold to an Oklahoman who razed it and hauled the lumber to that state to build outbuildings on his farm.

Mrs. Belle Alred and Mrs. O. H. K. Ross of Wichita Falls are the only living children of Mr. and Mrs. John J. White, who, with their nephew Charles S. White of Odessa, and the children of the late Jim White, still own the 72 acres in pasture land and cultivation.

The memory of the "White House" has been preserved in some pieces of furniture taken out of the house before the vandalism. They have been refinished and are conversation pieces in the homes of the relatives who have them.

The couple met at Merkel in May, 1910. They married July 11, 1916, at the home of the bride's parents in the Jones county area known now as the Hodges community.

After two years residence in Merkel, Mr. and Mrs. Rogers moved to Abilene. Mr. Rogers is now retired after 42 years employment with Wooten Wholesale Grocery.

Some 300 guests registered during the hours of 2:00 to 5:00. Those attending from Iowa Park were Mr. and Mrs. Sullivan and Roger, Vance Ross, Mr. and Mrs. W. I. Lynn and David Vestal.

Funeral service for Twyanna Gayle Hamilton Fuller, 23, a former resident of Iowa Park, will be conducted at 10:00 a.m. Friday in Tanner Funeral Home chapel by Rev. Donald Wood of First Baptist church. Burial will be in Highland cemetery.

Mrs. Fuller was born June 13, 1938, in Iowa Park, where she lived until 1952. She was a resident of Sidney, Nebr., and was killed in an automobile accident in Kentucky, at 5:30 p.m. Monday.

The accident occurred near Elkton, Ky. Her husband was injured and is in a Guthrie, Ky., hospital in critical condition.

She is survived by two sons: Eugene 9 and William Fred 5; her parents Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Hamilton of Riverton, Wyo.; and one sister Mrs. Janaris Ann Little of Sun Dance, Wyo.

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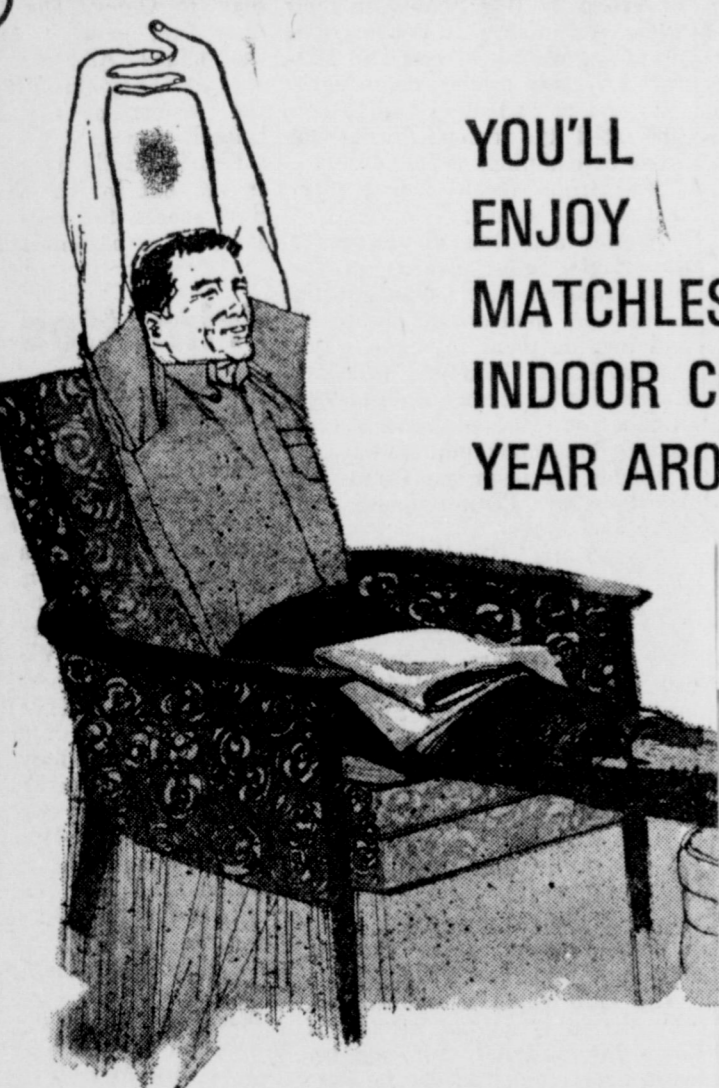

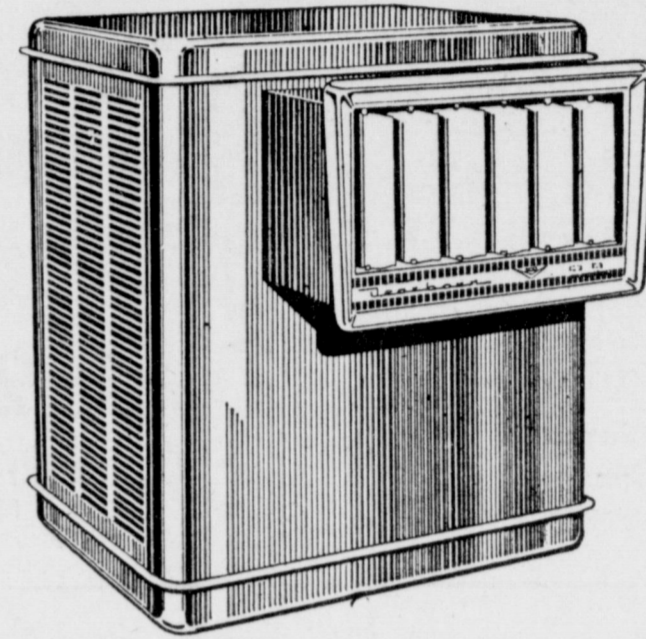
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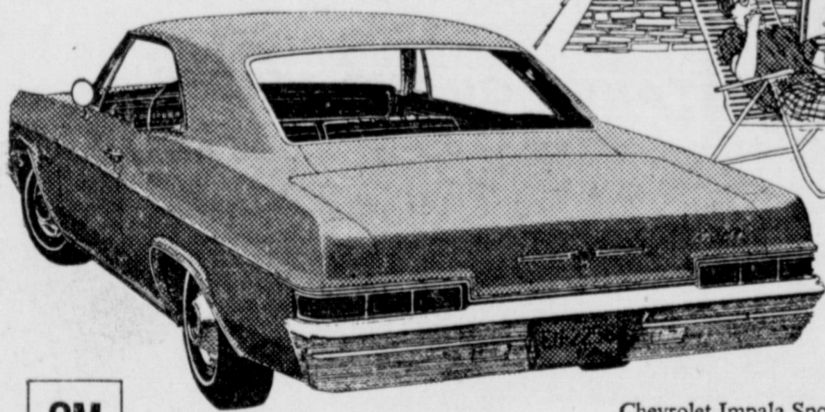
