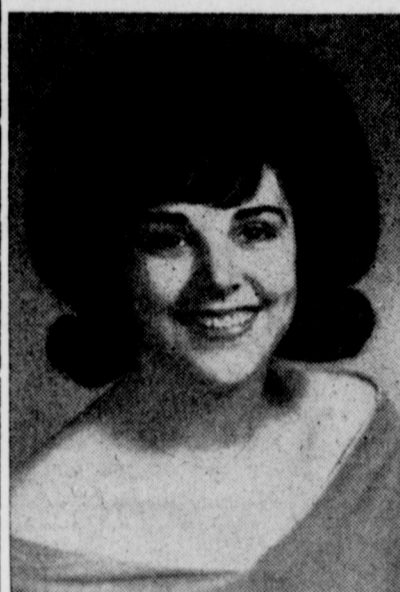

Animal Shelter Is Dog Pound

The City of Iowa Park has made arrangements with the Animal Shelter east of town to keep all dogs that are impounded under Ordinance No. 28 (143). Anyone who has a dog impounded may reclaim it by going to the shelter, identifying it, paying the impounding and boarding fee, license and vaccination fee (if vaccination is needed) at the City Hall or Police Department, and then returning to the shelter with a receipt to pick up the dog.

It is hoped that everyone who has a dog as a pet will obey the dog ordinance and keep his dog enclosed in his yard or on a leash, have it vaccinated at yearly intervals for rabies, and obtain a city license if this has not already been done.

The buildings or school plant was the big criticism, with the elementary building being in very poor condition.

Western Union Telex Service Brought to W.F.

Western Union's new Telex service, which permits users to dial other subscribers in eight seconds or less for instantaneous two-way communications message and data, began operating officially in Wichita Falls this week.

Telex provides direct customer to customer teleprinter connections, nationally and internationally, on a toll basis. The subscriber merely dials the Telex customer he wants and in a few seconds gets automatic identification. Then he types his message out on the simple Telex keyboard. His distant correspondent, with a similar machine, can answer back immediately.

Lee Barkley of Iowa Park is Wichita Falls manager for Western Union. He says "Telex rates are based on time used and distance of the call. For example, a Telex user can send a one-minute message from Wichita Falls to Houston or New York for 45c. Since there is no minimum time charge a short message can be sent Coast-to-Coast for as little as 25c. The per-minute charge for the average Telex call last year, was estimated at 26c with messages averaging 65 words.

Wichita Falls is the 195th Telex city in the US and these cities serve over 21,000 subscribers.

Plans on School Building Ordered

Stanley Williamson speaking on behalf of Iowa Park school trustees, stated this week that sketches for the proposed new high school building will be ready about May 5. The architects have been instructed to concentrate on adequate classroom and cafeteria facilities as well as a gym and auditorium. The trustees stated that a football stadium will NOT be included in the building program.

If on May 4 the citizens approve the \$950,000 school bond issue it will be necessary to increase our school taxes by 28% of what we are now paying. On a home assessed at \$2500, the tax would be increased approximately \$9.80 a year. On a home valued on the school tax rolls at \$5000 the increase would be approximately \$19.60.

However, Mr. Williamson said the increase would not be necessary until 1968. In other words, taxes would not be increased this year.

Any person who would like to know how his taxes would be affected can call Bill Steger, tax collector for the school district, at 592-4193, and the information will be given immediately.

Mr. Williamson stresses the need for a building program, and the school trustees feel it is their obligation to keep the citizens informed.

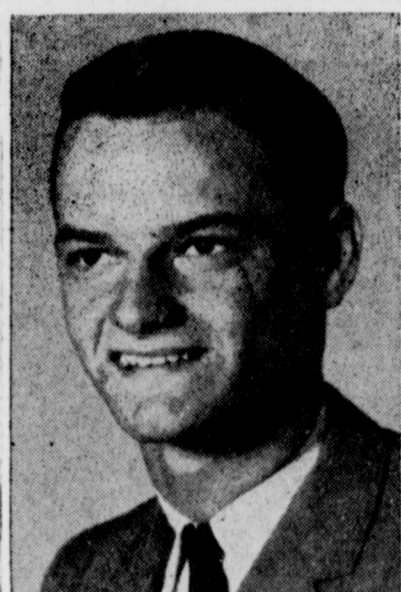
Robert has spoken about 12 times to groups numbering from 20 to 300 on Communism, Americanism and Christianity.

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Committees Named for Action Program of I.P. Chamber

Iowa Park is on the move as result of the Community Clinic held in February. Chamber of Commerce directors at their regular monthly meeting voted unanimously three priority projects for 1967.

Priority No. 1—To endorse the proposed new high school facility. 153 suggestions were submitted at the clinic as the greatest need for our town.

Priority No. 2—Endorse development of an expanded recreation program for Iowa Park. There were 202 suggestions for a civic center for youth recreation.

Priority No. 3—Endorse a city street paving program. 111 suggestions were made to improve streets, which included sweeping, lighting, zoning laws enforced, city-wide paving program, curb and gutter improvements, drainage, repair existing streets, and additional stop signs.

The various programs of work were discussed, and President Arch Hughes, with help of directors, appointed committees to get action started for the different programs.

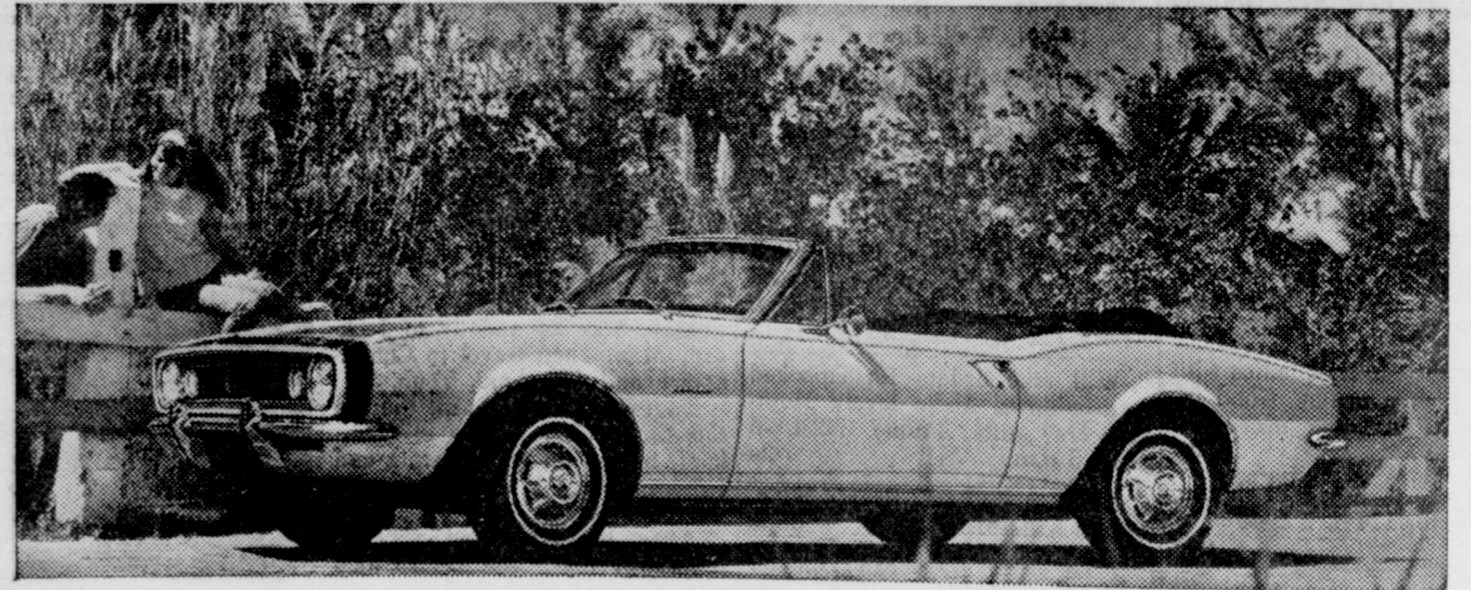

ORDINANCE NUMBER 102
(29) (94)
An ordinance providing for a Curfew for Minors; and Providing a Penalty.
Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any minor person to be upon the streets of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, after the hour of eleven o'clock P.M. (11:00 P.M.), on Sunday through Thursday nights and on Friday nights and Saturday nights after the hour of twelve thirty o'clock A.M. (12:30 A.M.), which actually will be twelve thirty o'clock A.M. (12:30 A.M.) on Saturday morning and Sunday morning, unless such minor is accompanied by a parent or legal guardian, or in enroute to or from a place where such minor is employed, until the City Council deems it necessary to change this provision.
Section 2. That the curfew imposed in Section 1 above shall be lifted at five o'clock A.M. (5:00 A.M.) of each day.
Section 3. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

"I'm on the floor and I need help!"

These were the first words Mrs. Myrtle Allen heard when she answered the call on her switchboard. A telephone operator in Dallas, Mrs. Allen tells what happened next: "He could hardly talk," she recalled, "but it was evident he was stricken, on the floor helpless and had managed to dial 'Operator' for help. I told him to stay on the floor and not to worry because I wouldn't leave him."

With practiced efficiency, Mrs. Allen swung into action. Using another line, she called for an ambulance, alerted the man's next-door neighbor and notified his nearby relatives.

All the while, she kept the man on the phone, cautioning him not to move.

the telephone company and told how he had been helped. "Had it not been for that operator, I would have died," he said. "She was insistent that I keep quiet on the floor. The doctors told me it saved my life."

"It was thanks enough to me that he got help on time," said Mrs. Allen. "Any operator would have done the same thing."
