(24) (94) An ordinance providing for Curfew for Minors; and Providing

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any minor person to be upon the streets of the City of Lowa Park, Texas, after the hours of cleven o'clock P.M. (11:00 P.M.), on Sunday through Thursday nights and on Friday nights and Saturday nights after the hour of twelve thirty o'clock A.M. (12:30 A.M.), which actually will be twelve thirty o'clock A.M. (12:30 A.M.) on Sat-urday morning and Sunday morning, unless such minor is accompa-nied by a parent or legal guardian, or is enroute to or from a place where such minor is employed, until the City Council deems it necessary to change this provision.

Section 2. That the curfew imposed in Section 1 above shall be lifted at five o'clock A.M. (5:00 Richie and Lance Pierce are A.M.) of each day. Section 2. 



"I'm on the floor and I need help!"

These were the first words Mrs. Myrtle Allen heard when she answered the call on her switchboard. A telephone operator in Dallas, Mrs. Allen tells what happened next: "He could hardly talk," she recalled, "but it was evident he was stricken, on the floor helpless and had managed to dial 'Operator' for help. I told him to stay on the floor and not to worry because I wouldn't leave him."

With practiced efficiency, Mrs. Allen swung into action. Using another line, she called for an ambulance, alerted the man's next-door neighbor and notified his nearby relatives.

"It was thanks enough to me that he got help on time," said Mrs. Allen. "Any operator would have done the same thing."


