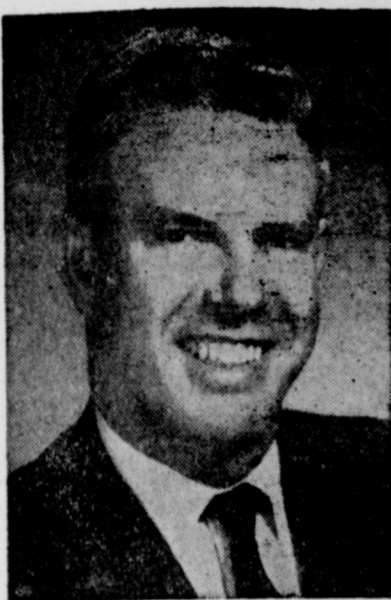

Titus T. Mitchell of Wichita Falls has been appointed municipal court judge for Iowa Park. He will hold his first court session here this Thursday morning.

Mitchell has been delinquent tax collector for Iowa Park for several years, along with his work as city judge for Wichita Falls.

He resigned that position early this year to enter the Democratic primary as candidate for the state legislature.

Iowa Park never has had a municipal judge before, relying upon the mayor to fulfill that function.

Mitchell is a native of Bowie and earned his law degree at Baylor university in 1949. He is an air force veteran of World War Two and the Korean conflict.

### Greater Use of Library Facilities Discussed in Henrietta Meeting

The Multi-County Library meeting was held Tuesday at Edwards public library in Henrietta. Mrs. Don Slagle, librarian, and members of Henrietta library board were hosts.

Welcome address was given by Clay County Judge Ed Williams. Report of the Governor's Conference at Austin was given by Mrs. Rex M. Gates, Henrietta board member. Some of the jewels quoted by Mrs. Gates are:

"With public sentiment, nothing can fail."—Dr. Winfrey.

"Books are the most powerful instruments placed in the hands of man."—Connally.

She mentioned the term "Information explosion," which was used by many speakers at the conference. She recommended James L. Love, past president of Friends of Texas Libraries, as a speaker who is a dedicated library supporter.

Mrs. Clyde King, art teacher at Lamar school in Wichita Falls, displayed and discussed examples of techniques in children's art, closely associated with libraries.

Miss Elizabeth Karle, field consultant with Texas State Library, discussed "Co-operative Approach to Library Service." She mentioned progressive steps in library facilities being made available in area libraries—Burk Burnett, new, Electra, Wichita Falls, school libraries open on certain days this summer, and other towns to the west of us.

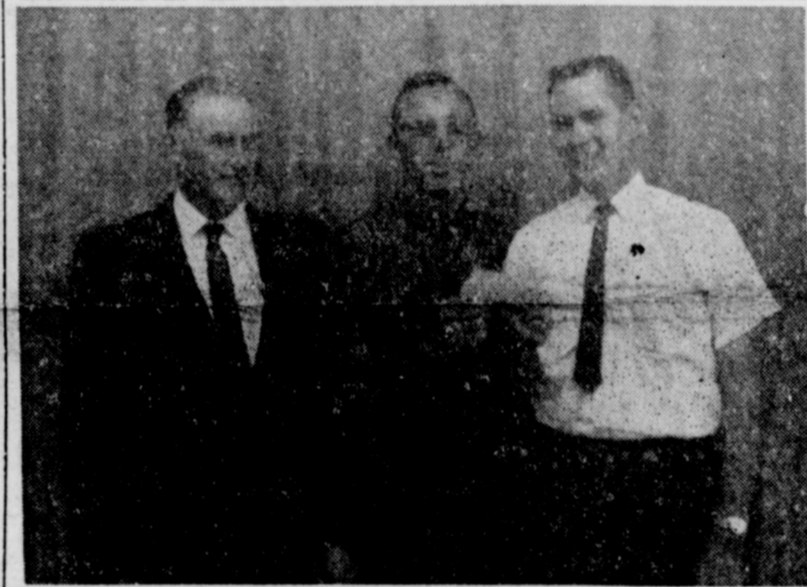
She told of plans being made for reciprocal loans between area libraries and the starting of processing centers in a number of Texas cities. She advocates borrowing within communities between church, school and individual libraries.

Mrs. Slagle suggested that clubs

be asked to select library service as project. She acknowledged the vast support given in times past by Texas Federation of Women's clubs. Accenting memorials was emphasized.

A tour of the Henrietta library followed. In this town of 3900 population, a modern, attractive, air-conditioned 2-room library is widely used. Endowed in the beginning by a Henrietta family who continue their interest, it has grown from the original one room structure to its present size. Plans are being made to enlarge it still further. It is staffed by a paid librarian and supported by an enthusiastic board and wide-awake community.

### Here's what to do about obscene or harassing phone calls:

**1. Don't talk.**  
Don't keep talking to the caller. What he really wants is an audience. Don't be that audience.

**2. Hang up.**  
Hang up if the caller doesn't say anything.  
Hang up at the first obscene word.  
Hang up if the caller doesn't identify himself to your satisfaction.

**3. Call us, if . . .**  
these obscene or harassing calls persist.  
We're concerned about these calls and want to help stop them. Should you receive any, remember, you control your phone. You can end any conversation simply by hanging up.

If the calls continue, don't hesitate to phone your Southwestern Bell Service Representative. She can call in people we have specially trained to help investigate, identify, and work with police in the apprehension of these callers. With the help of improved procedures many persistent callers have been caught.

We also remind everyone that Texas law provides up to \$1,000 in fines and 12 months imprisonment for making obscene or harassing calls. And where evidence is clear, we are permitted to disconnect or remove the phone service of anyone making such calls.

We want you to know we're doing all we can to preserve your right to privacy.
