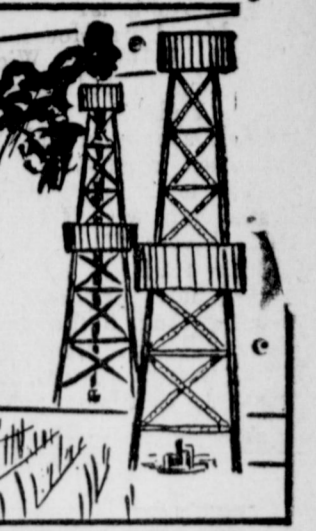

Garden Club

Although one of the youngest organizations of its kind in the area, Iowa Park Garden club has made wonderful record in achievement since its organization and federation in 1960. The membership list is small and each member serves in some capacity during the year. Each member is responsible for a program.

1964-65 will be no exception. Theme will be a continuation of last year's: Conservation; and this theme will be stressed in other areas than those used last year.

First program will be Conservation through Civic Participation and will feature James Heath of the Chamber of Commerce, who will tell of plans and projects for that organization. The club will advise Heath of its projects which will be compatible to his program, and thus benefit both groups.

In October the regular program will feature a discussion on Forcing Bulbs for Christmas Bloom, with a workshop to follow.

November meeting will include demonstration of drying and preserving materials available locally, with workshop to follow.

High point of December will be instructions on making corsages, table and tray arrangements. The annual Family Night covered-dish dinner will be an event of the holiday season.

Containers for floral arrangements will be discussed at January meeting with a special portion being devoted to use of unusual containers. Workshop will center around construction of a container to fit a special occasion from materials on hand, and uses of bases and background material.

February program will consist of lecture and workshop on Buds of This Area and Their Habits.

March regular meeting will begin a series of programs leading up to the annual Flower Show in April. Preparation of Plants for the horticulture division and the Basic Principles of Flower Arranging will be brought by a competent speaker.

The year's work will close with installation luncheon in May.

Throughout the year, members will bring arrangements or a pot plant to the meetings.

Finance projects will include a Tasting Tea and a Christmas Fair. Tentative plans include a pilgrimage to the Chundor Gardens in Weatherford and a field trip to inspect and catalog wild flowers of the area, and a Bird Watching breakfast.

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YOUR LAWN

WATERING YOUR LAWN

July and August are months when it normally doesn't rain enough to produce a lush green lawn.

Watering isn't necessary for a healthy lawn but it's vital if you want to maintain an enviable plot of grass during hot spells.

The decision to water or not water depends on you. If you feel it's important to preserve a green turf during these months, then water. But remember, the watering habit can become expensive, especially in areas where water is scarce. And when done improperly, it often hurts a sturdy lawn.

Too little watering causes a shallow root system and invites crabgrass. Too much watering cuts off the oxygen supply to roots, causes shallow roots and creates an ideal breeding ground for diseases.

To water properly, soak the ground to a depth of at least 6 inches. Once a week is usually sufficient, but twice a week will take care of the worst drought conditions. To check the water penetration, insert a table knife or sharp instrument into the ground. See how far and how easily it goes down.

Summer is also the time to check your lawn for that dark green color it had early in the season. If the lawn lacks this color, then most likely it needs nitrogen to bring back the greenness.

Apply a slow-release nitrogen fertilizer. This type of fertilizer is non-burning, releases the ni-

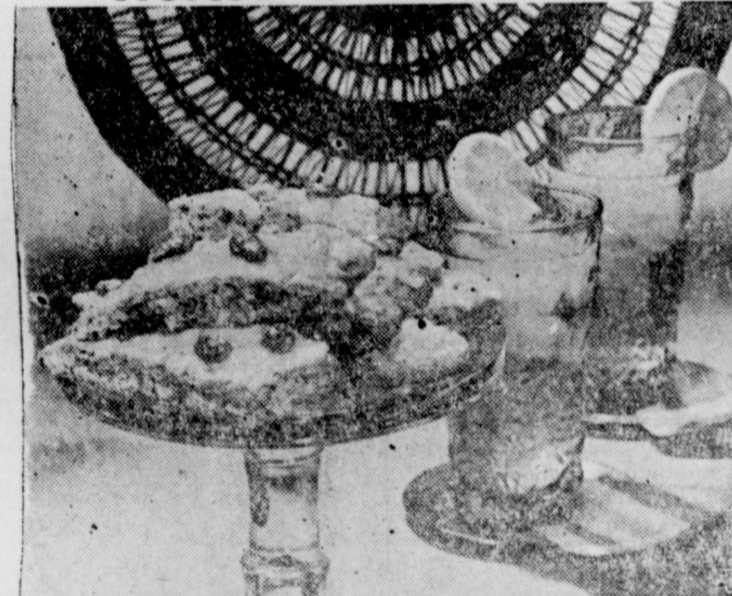


trogen at a steady rate, and avoids a big surge of growth which sometimes invites disease and insects.

If you don't mind a brown lawn during summer, don't bother watering. Most well-established lawns in the northern part of the United States can survive the summer months without watering and will usually revive with the first good rain.

Easy Bar Cookie

Frosted Raisin Toasties



This very flavorful but not too sweet raisin bar cookie is perfect to serve with iced tea or lemonade. Its interesting new tasty flavor is achieved by baking the oats and walnuts in a hot oven before stirring them into the dough.

The California raisins are chopped lightly to let the taste surprising flavor distribute throughout the bars. Notice the simple directions for shaping and cutting the raisin toasties. If you prefer the same dough may be used for drop cookies.

FROSTED RAISIN TOASTIES

| 1 cup California seedless raisins | 3 eggs |
| 2 cups rolled oats | 2 1/2 cups sifted flour |

Chop raisins lightly. Spread oats and walnuts on baking sheet; toast lightly in hot oven (400 degrees F.) about 8 minutes. Blend together shortening and sugar; beat in eggs one at a time. Sift together flour, soda, salt and cinnamon. Add to sugar mixture alternately with milk; stir in raisins, toasted oats and walnuts. Divide into 6 parts; chill dough. Roll each piece into long roll 1-inch in diameter and about 15 inches long. Place two strips on each lightly greased baking sheet. Press to first 4-inch strip with rolling pin. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 12 to 15 minutes. While still warm brush with glaze made by combining 2 cups sifted powdered sugar with 2 tablespoons hot water. Sprinkle with raisins; turn raisins to coat with frosting. Cool. Cut each 2-in into 12 diagonal slices. Makes 6 dozen.
