

The Sisk Bullet Shop, located at

the old Brubaker Lumber site, is

owned by Ralph B. Sisk, a native

of Wichita county. He was born

to the late Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Sisk

in the Allendale community, who

had come here in 1889. The Sisk

family moved to Iowa Park in 1910.

Ralph married Miss Nell King,

a teacher in the Allendale school,

on Sept. 15, 1918. He worked in the

oilfield as a trucker and always

Ralph wasn't satisfied with the

large caliber rifles and bullets he

had to use in shooting game. He

met a Capt. Watkins in the army

who had invented a .22 center fire






