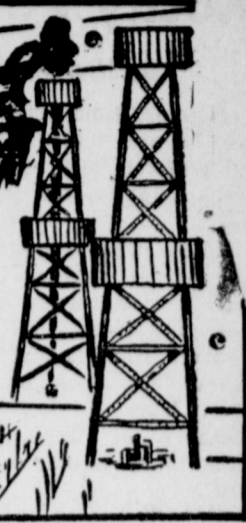

## Service Held for Dave Harbour

David Oliver (Dave) Harbour, 73, a lifelong resident of Iowa Park, died Monday morning in Park Manor following a lengthy illness.

Born Sept. 6, 1893, in Iowa Park, he was son of the late Sue Holt Harbour and David King Harbour.

He was a disabled World War I veteran, having sustained injuries in France near the close of the war. He was employed with the late Tom Burnett for 20 years and then worked with Hammond Oil Co. until his retirement.

He was member of Methodist church.

He was married to Miss Rena Moore, a teacher in Iowa Park school, on June 18, 1924, at Decatur.

Funeral service was conducted Wednesday morning in Tanner Funeral Home chapel by Rev. Olin Tunnell of the Methodist church. Burial was in Highland cemetery where graveside military rites were conducted.

## Recreation Center

Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Combs are in charge of summer recreation program again this year. Rita Guthrie and Esda Walker are student helpers.

Following is a statement from Gerald on the 1966 program and plans for this summer:

The 1966 summer recreation program was one of great success. It provided boys and girls leisure time activities. A center and playground by provided by the school board. The recreation division through donations by the Lions club and the City of Iowa Park furnished all leadership and expendable supplies.

The program was operated on a six-weeks basis with the center located at IPHS gym and agriculture building. He hopes to have an 8-week program this summer.

The recreation center was staffed with well qualified personnel. This year due to an increase in activities we will have a junior leader, giving three persons for supervision.

The center was open Monday through Friday from 9 to 12 and from 2 to 5. There was scheduled activity during each period of the day: volleyball, basketball, dodgeball, soccer, softball, ping pong, four square, table games, tennis and many other activities. We are adding track for boys and girls this year.

Each Friday the center had special events. These included a pet show, a bicycle rodeo, horned foot race, and other activities.

The center registered 320 individual children. Average age was between 7 and 10 years. Total attendance 979 for six weeks.

We would like to start a "pony tail" softball league for girls, track and tennis for both boys and girls to enter some of the recreational meets in our area. We would like to set aside one night (Friday) a week for adult leisure time recreation such as volleyball, ping pong and other activities.

Registration will be 25c.

Red River Connie Mack baseball includes teams from Archer City, Electra, Seymour, Vernon, Iowa Park, SAFB, Wichita Falls.

## Your C of C

FIREARMS AND AIRGUNS ORDINANCE NUMBER 36

Section 1. Firearms. Discharge Prohibited.  
It shall be unlawful to discharge any gun, rifle, pistol or firearm of any kind within the limits of the City.

Section 2. Airguns. Discharge Prohibited.  
It shall be unlawful to discharge any airgun, air rifle or air pistol of any description (by whatever name known) that by means of compressed air, compressed gas, springs or any other means is capable of discharging shots, pellets, or any solid object at any velocity anywhere within the limits of the City.

FIREWORKS ORDINANCE NUMBER 39 (239)

An ordinance relative to the sale or explosion of fireworks within the City Limits; and providing a penalty for such offense.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas:

That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to sell, offer for sale, or explode, any type or kind of fireworks, including firecrackers, torpedoes, rockets, roman candles and any other types of explosives commonly used for such purposes, within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

Any person, firm, or corporation guilty of violating any provision of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$1.00 and not exceeding \$100.00 for each separate offense.

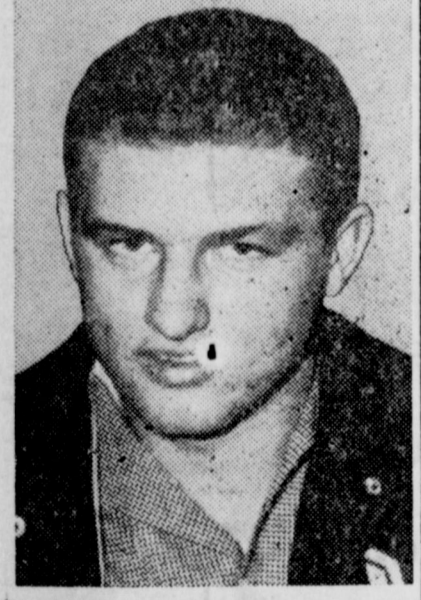
Please impress the boys with the harm they are causing and the sad state of a dead songbird.

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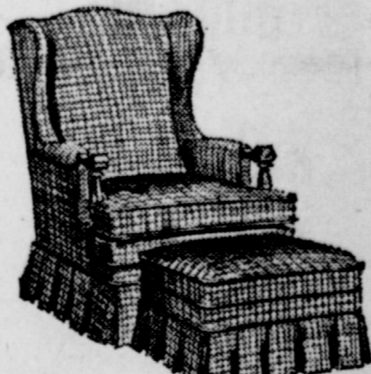

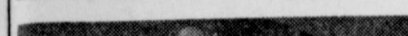

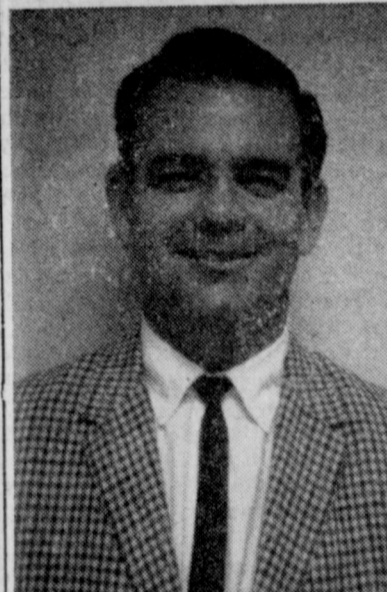
Reed will speak on the historical and cultural developments of interest in the Middle East and the present developing crises. He will also review the US state department policy on the Middle East. Lt. Morris of SAFB will assist Col. Reed.

Reed is rated as a command pilot—jet qualified. He has flown Lombar and supersonic fighter aircraft. During World War II he was a B-24 squadron commander and was a prisoner of war in Germany.

He was installation commander at Ankara, Turkey, from July 1966 to February 1967.

He is currently group chief of operations division of 3750 Technical school at SAFB.

Reed holds a degree in engineering sciences from Air Force Institute of Technology. His service experiences have included command and staff work. For six years he was with an atomic test group at Albuquerque, N.M.



District Attorney Stanley Kirk spoke to the Teen Time group Monday evening. He opened with observations on the number of our laws today that have grown out of the Ten Commandments.

Bringing his talk down to the level of his listeners he said: "We have people uttering religion; what we need is more people living religion."

"For our American sins of law-

lessness, we can start with the most elementary level—respect for the law.

"1. I will obey the laws.  
"2. I will assist public officials in preventing crime. Too often crime thrives because citizens do not care. Community apathy is crime's strongest ally. Do not overlook so-called minor crimes.

"3. I will help courts in giving evidence. A citizen must be willing to testify in court if he has pertinent information. Many citizens will report incriminating information but are not willing to testify in court. When this occurs, justice suffers.

"4. I will serve on the jury when asked.

"5. Keep yourself informed on local crime problems. You cannot fight crime in your community unless you are acquainted with the local conditions.

"6. Regard the law enforcement officer as a friend, not a foe. Too often citizens view the officer as an 'enemy' who will cause trouble. Actually the police officer is a friend, standing guard 24 hours a day to protect you. If you criticize the police, take time to commend them, too, when they deserve it.

"7. Be active yourself in civic affairs. Vote in elections concerning community problems. Healthy community spirit, alert to the importance of integrity in a democracy, is an effective weapon against crime."

Darrell Dick, teacher in junior high and choir director of Highland Heights Baptist church, was guest Tuesday evening and will appear again Friday evening. He entertains with guitar and vocal music and brings an inspirational message.
