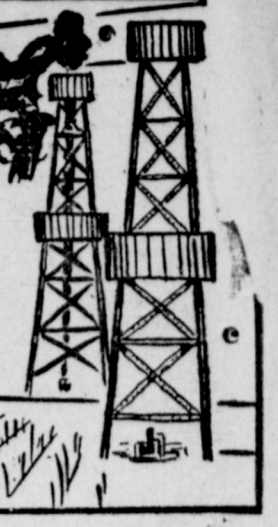

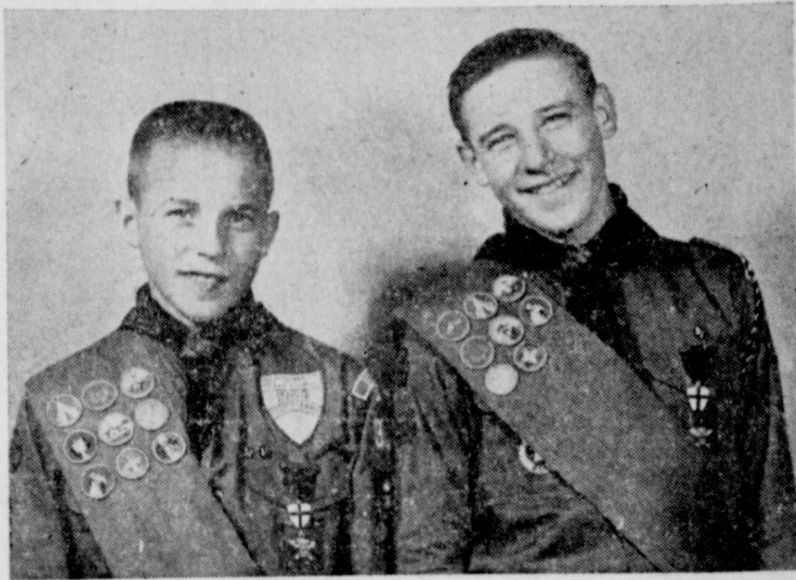

IPHS Offers Summer Classes

Summer school will be conducted in IPHS beginning next Monday. Registration will be from 8 to 11 a.m. Friday.

Classes will begin at 8:00 and end at noon, Monday through Friday, with the session ending on July 27.

Class periods will be two hours in length. One course earning ½ unit credit will cost \$20. Two courses with 1 unit credit, \$30. Payment is due when you register or may be paid weekly if necessary.

The following subjects will be offered: English I, II and III; Algebra I and II; Plane Geometry.

Students may take English courses only if they have had them before and did not earn full credit. Mrs. China B. Smith will teach English courses. Roy Smith will teach mathematics.

Classes will be conducted in air-conditioned rooms.

IPHS will not accept credits earned during the summer from any other school, provided the same course is available here.
