Are we overlooking the community problems to the extent that we are unconcerned about the future?

True our town has grown in population and we welcome these people into our midst, but with added population we find added needs.

We have in PTA a medium where all people may meet and work together for interests of the adults as well as children and youth.

We have 10 churches to accommodate the people's choice of religious belief. Some of our people do not choose to attend the church—which is a freedom of choice.

We have various civic clubs with active membership—strictly membership by voluntary choice.

We have a PTA which was organized in 1909—the first in Wichita county—which struggled together during World War II.

Today, we are struggling to retain organization against TV, disinterested parents, probably also just nonchalant members.

We pay dues voluntarily, no one forces anyone to become a member. By the same token, they can refrain from becoming a member if they so desire.

But with the basic policies:

1. Education for all, stressing adult education.
2. Non-commercial, no advertising. Non-partisan—any party member may belong but PTA does not promote individual candidate. We do legislate (assisted greatly in teacher pay raise). Non-sectarian—recognize rights of individuals to own religious belief.
3. Working with schools in full co-operation and not trying to operate them.
4. Working with other agencies in child welfare.

We find some are in favor of disbanding. Are we going to let a few people break down our channel of communication among the parents, teachers, students.

As new needs arise, rules and by-laws must undergo changes.

Let's try a PTSA—parents and teachers and students association. Students pay no dues, but may serve on committees.

When well made plans are made known, we can and will assist in getting better and bigger educational facilities—such as a new high school building.

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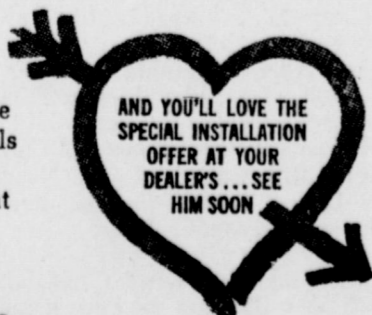
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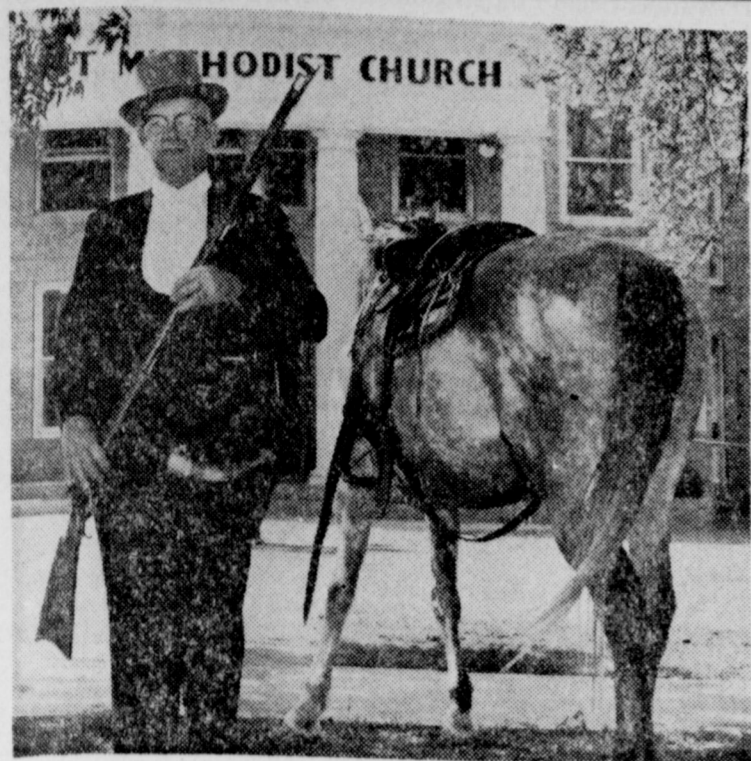
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### Old Clothes, Muzzle Loader

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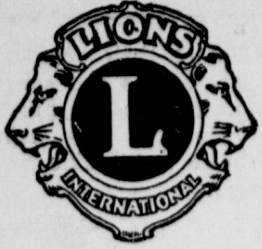

True our town has grown in population and we welcome these people into our midst, but with added population we find added needs.

We have in PTA a medium where all people may meet and work together for interests of the adults as well as children and youth.

We have 10 churches to accommodate the people's choice of religious belief. Some of our people do not choose to attend the church—which is a freedom of choice.

We have various civic clubs with active membership—strictly membership by voluntary choice.

We have a PTA which was organized in 1909—the first in Wichita county—which struggled together during World War II.

Today, we are struggling to retain organization against TV, disinterested parents, probably also just nonchalant members.

We pay dues voluntarily, no one forces anyone to become a member. By the same token, they can refrain from becoming a member if they so desire.

But with the basic policies:

1. Education for all, stressing adult education.
2. Non-commercial, no advertising. Non-partisan—any party member may belong but PTA does not promote individual candidate. We do legislate (assisted greatly in teacher pay raise). Non-sectarian—recognize rights of individuals to own religious belief.
3. Working with schools in full co-operation and not trying to operate them.
4. Working with other agencies in child welfare.

We find some are in favor of disbanding. Are we going to let a few people break down our channel of communication among the parents, teachers, students.

As new needs arise, rules and by-laws must undergo changes. Let's try a PTSA—parents and teachers and students association. Students pay no dues, but may serve on committees.

When well made plans are made known, we can and will assist in getting better and bigger educational facilities—such as a new high school building.
