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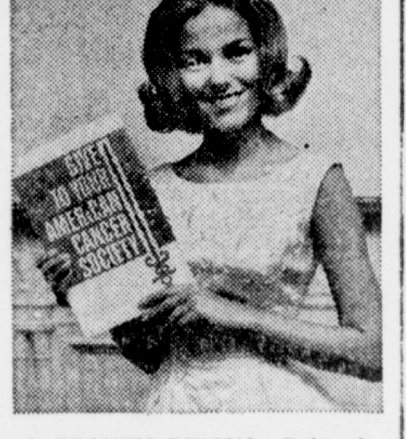

23 Study Club

Mrs. Taylor George was program leader for the 23 Study Club meeting last Thursday in the home of Mrs. W. G. Steele. Co-hostess was Mrs. C. E. Birk.

Council of International Clubs department was observed in talks by Mrs. Noel Troutman and Mrs. Homer Blalock. Mrs. Earle Denny brought an Easter meditation.

Fine arts number featured group singing of Songs of Other Lands, directed by Mrs. C. W. Coppock with Mrs. James A. Sewell providing piano accompaniment.

Mrs. Troutman outlined the history of the Council and its worldwide connections. She said that before 1948 the GFWC had a branch known as Foreign and Territorial clubs. At the national convention that year the Council of International Clubs department was created.

It now has 161 clubs representing 55 countries. Of these there are 134 overseas clubs and 19 American clubs outside the continental USA.

Mrs. Troutman recommended reading of News Bulletin, published quarterly and devoted to letters and reports from International clubs, to get a good idea of what "sisters under the skin" are doing around the world. She also discussed the Pen-Friend program and had information blanks for those interested in corresponding with club women in other countries.

Mrs. Blalock described the Shin Ai Widows Village in Korea, a special project of GFWC Through the American-Korean Foundation, the GFWC channels funds to build earth-block homes, a school, clinic and community center for 50 widows and their 138 dependents.

Before the village was established the women lived on the dry bed of the mighty River Han, where flash floods are experienced several times a year. With communications so remote, many death resulted. So the Shin Ai Village is established two miles from the river.

Easter motif was portrayed in decorations and appointments on the refreshment table. Easter hat favors and refreshments repeated the colors used.

Mrs. L. E. Brooks, vice-president, was in charge of business. Plans were made for club participation in the Swim Dinner on April 24.

Little League baseball began here 10 years ago with approximately 80 boys, a few balls and bats, and white T-shirts as uniforms. The 1966 season has 400 boys with 22 fully uniformed teams, 58 men and their wives engaged in the program.

Hughes, known locally as "Mr. Little League," said there are 15 men on the local board, a player agent, 22 managers and 22 assistant managers and 12 umpires.

George Huckaby Jr. is the district umpire consultant. There are 6 major teams, 10 minor teams, 4 senior teams and 4 Babe Ruth teams in Iowa Park baseball program.

The Roberts were spending Easter with her parents Mr. and Mrs. James Clubb at Lake Diversion, when Karen Lynn wandered to the docks by herself. She stooped to pick up an object on the ground, lost her balance, and fell into six-foot water.

Lee Ann, standing nearby, saw Karen Lynn fall into the water; and go under. She ran to the bank, lay down, and grabbed the child when she came up, and pulled her from the lake.

Unaware of the full import of her quick thinking and action, Lee Ann went to the Clubb residence and calmly reported, "Mrs. Clubb that little girl fell into the water, and I pulled her out."

The miraculous factor of the rescue was clearly noticeable when the family observed the heroine is not too much larger than the one she rescued.

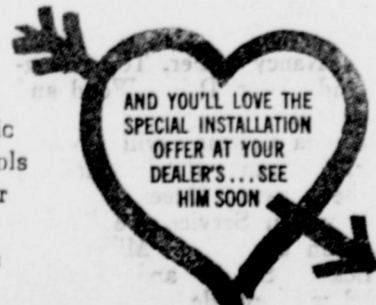

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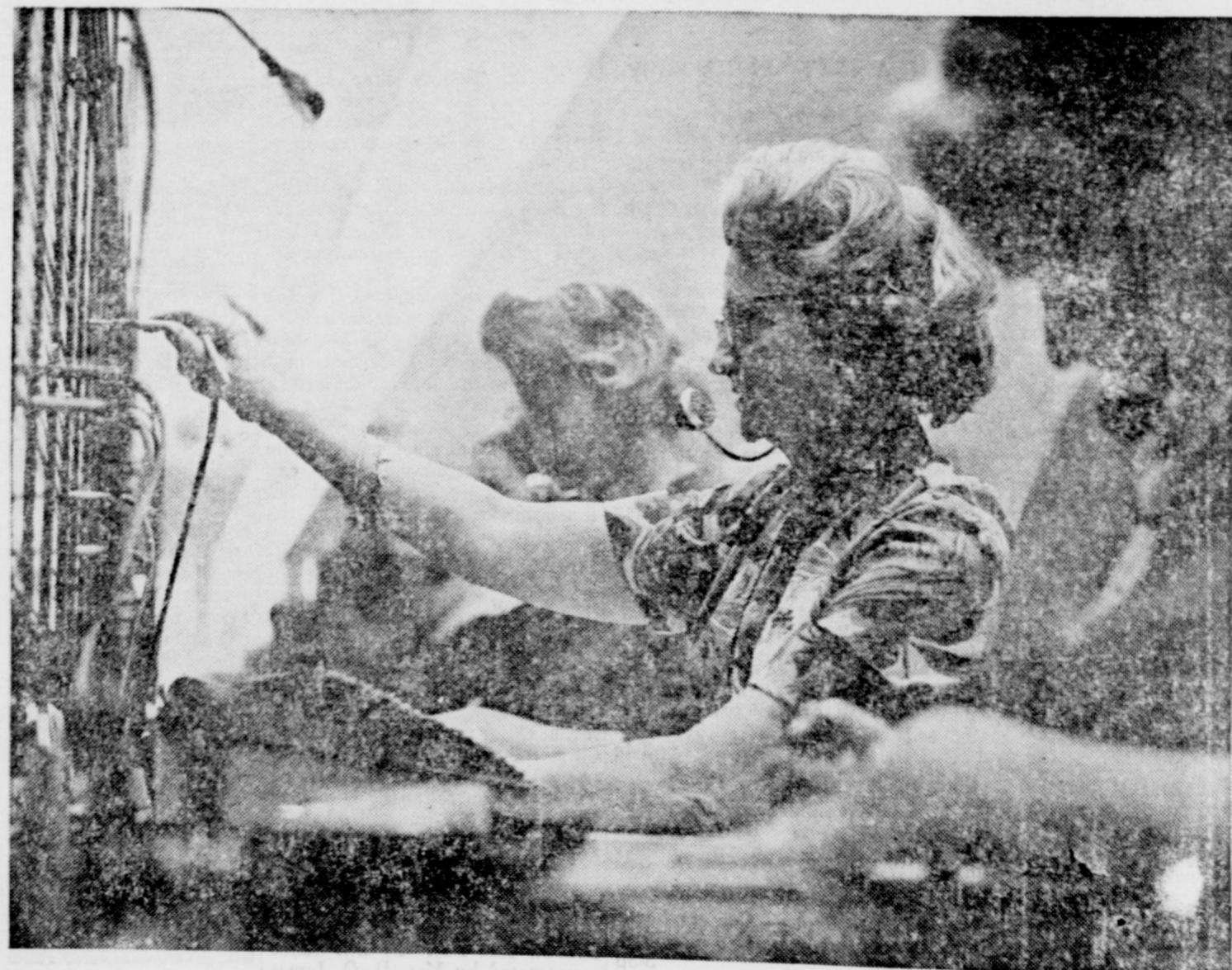
