★ Soil Conservation

Ed Muller, who farms one mile south of Clara, says he won't predict the weather, but he will predict a good wheat crop following the use of clover. This, coming from a man who farms with only a yearto-year lease and one who has the evidence to back his statement, is a story within itself.

In 1950 Muller harvested 5 bushels of wheat per acre, on land that had never been in clover. Adjoining land that had been in clover a year made of gifts, an electronic cardiograph, 8 bushels per acre, and wheat on a microscope and a receptionist's land in clover two years made 12 desk, purchased by friends of Dr. bushels. more money. Muller has also found that clover does better than chiseling in opening the soil, is more permanent and less expensive. In 1950 he had wheat following clover that made 16 bushels. Adjoining wheat on chiseled land made only 7 bushels. This meant a gross income of \$32 and \$14 per acre. The deep-rooted clover penetrates the hardpan and then decay of the root aids in keeping it open.

Even though Muller has the evidence in better yields, he says he can tell the difference just by walking over land that has had clover. He says it is spongy, mellow and has a darker color. The land doesn't slick over, run together or bake. The soil feels more like corn meal instead of flour. He feels that "clover land" will take a 21/2 to 3 inch rain without having any runoff. Yes, Ed Muller knows that soil conservation does pay, even on a short time basis.

In addition to using clover in his conservation plan. Muller has put in terracing, contour farming and stubble mulching as parts of his co-ordinated soil conservation plan. He was among the first to request technical assistance from the local Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District in 1946. He is a firm believer in sound land use and treating the land in accordance with its capability and needs. T. E. Gil- Music. breath of the SCS has assisted Muller in carrying out his conservation plan.

Mr. Muller has been a consistent winner in the Bridwell Soil Builders program. In all probability he will be a strong contestant this year in the new portion, "increased crop yields following legumes." He has already entered the program this year. Others desiring to give him strong competition should enter immediately. All agricultural agencies have entry forms.

Fire Ruins Sewell's Home and Furniture

At 4:30 Thursday afternoon the fire alarm sounded and with their usual speed members of the Volunteer Fire department rushed to the scene. The scene in this case was the home of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Sewell on the old Burk road.

When the firemen arrived there was a dense cloud of smoke pouring out of the house. The smoke made it difficult to work in the house, so fireman mounted the roof and fought the flames downward. Within an hour the boys had the fire under control and were able to enter the building and quench the flames.

The upper two rooms were a complete loss, as was the kitchen. Roof damage was considerable and all ceilings were ruined.

In the meantime many friends and neighbors were carrying out the downstairs furniture and personal effects of the Sewell family. Much of the household goods was damaged by water and smoke.

Origin of the fire is unknown, although Mrs. C. C. Davis, who was the only person in the home, thinks the fire began in the kitchen.

Palestine Customs Told to I.P. Lions



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
