Pastor Completes First Year Here

Rev. Donald Wood celebrated last Sunday his first anniversary as pastor of First Baptist church. He and his family moved here from Port Arthur, where he had pastored the North End Baptist church for two years.

During the past year, Sunday school enrollment has increased from 581 to 740, and 192 persons have joined the church, 73 by baptism. Total giving for the year just missed \$70,000.

The church completed its new sanctuary, holding dedicatory services in January; paved a quarter block area for parking; and greatly expanded the teaching organization during the year.

The church is in the first year of a five-year "Faith in Action" program. Goals have been projected through 1971. Hopes are that in 1971 the Sunday school enrollment will reach 900 and attendance, 550. A total giving of \$84,000 a year is expected by 1971.

The pastor's anniversary message was "The Two Resurrections." The sanctuary was full, and six persons united with the church at the invitation.

Don and Frances have three children: Debra 10, Timothy 7, and Mark 4. Debra and Timothy are students at Bradford school; Mark spends much of his time in the church nursery as his mother is quite active in the church.
