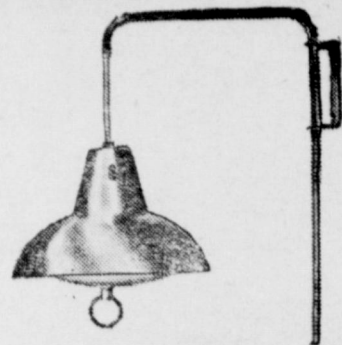
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
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Study Clubs Hear Mrs. Carpenter

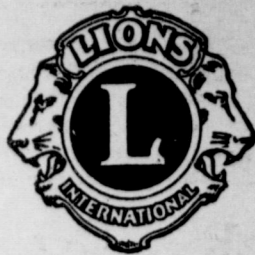

Meditation for the WSCS of Methodist church Tuesday morning featured a hand painted silk Japanese scroll sent from Japan by Capt. Don Owens, former organist of the local church. Mrs. J. W. Farmer was assisted in the presentation by Mrs. S. B. Keefer, who arranged a Japanese floral design during a reading, by those assembled, of a poem by Toyohiko Kagawa, Christian social reformer and evangelist. Comments by Mrs. Farmer were interspersed through the verses.

Mrs. M. L. Hines was leader for the first of several study sessions to be presented on Japan. She emphasized the balance which Japanese place on mind, body and heart.

Rev. Olin Tunnell told of a discussion with a friend Richard Flock, who is a missionary to Japan. He discussed Shintoism, a religion which consists chiefly in ancestor and nature worship and in the belief that the Emperor descends from some of the mythical gods.

Mr. Tunnell said that occupation forces on their soil at close of World War 2 shattered their belief that Japan was invincible.

He also spoke of Buddhism as an adopted religion, and said the two religions tolerate each other so well it is possible to practice both!

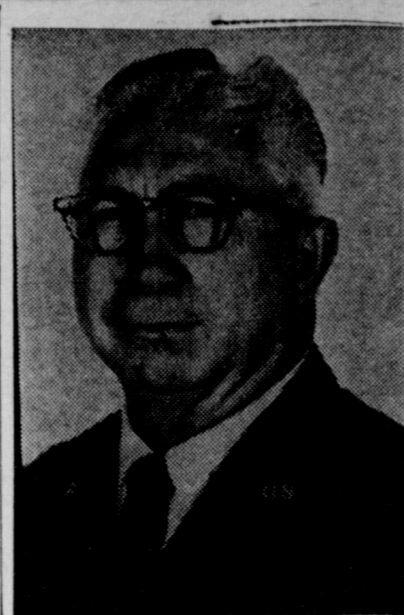
Modern Japan is experiencing growth of two new religions, since World War 2, these equated use of coercion and intimidation with Buddhism. One involves the tian, and they are part of both culture and political life.

There is a great change in the home life of the Japanese. A break-up of family ties is evident, and individuals tend to cluster around the company with which they work.

Japan has the highest literacy rate in the world—99 per cent—as compared with 80 per cent in America. The question was raised as to whether the pressures encountered in their education may be responsible for the high rate of suicide of those under 15 years of age.

Of recent years Christ's image is beginning to change. Formerly Christianity was regarded as a foreign religion, but now the United Church of Japan is having some impact on the culture through sculpture, floral arrangements and poetry.

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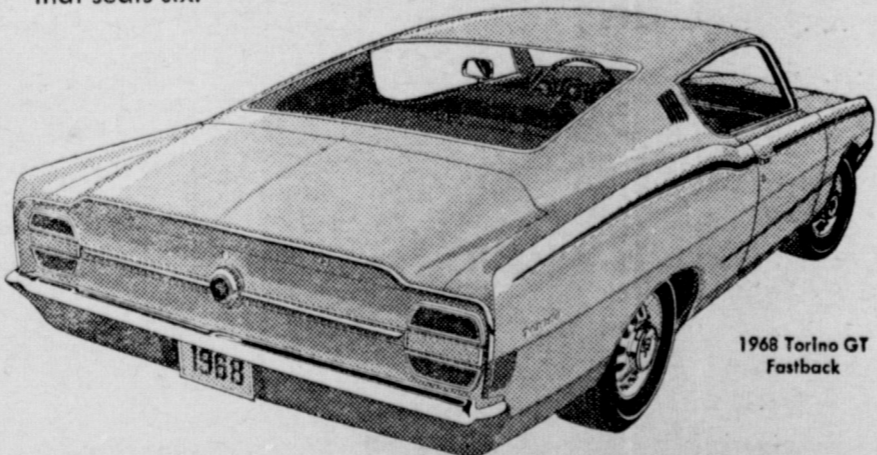

Mrs. Bill Guthrie gave the invocation, Mrs. China B. Smith was introduced by Mrs. Luther

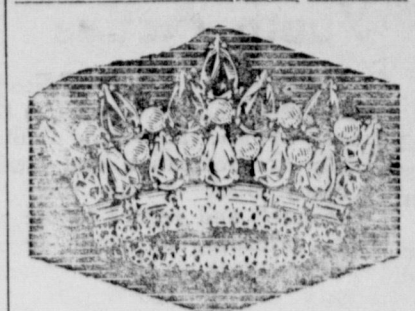

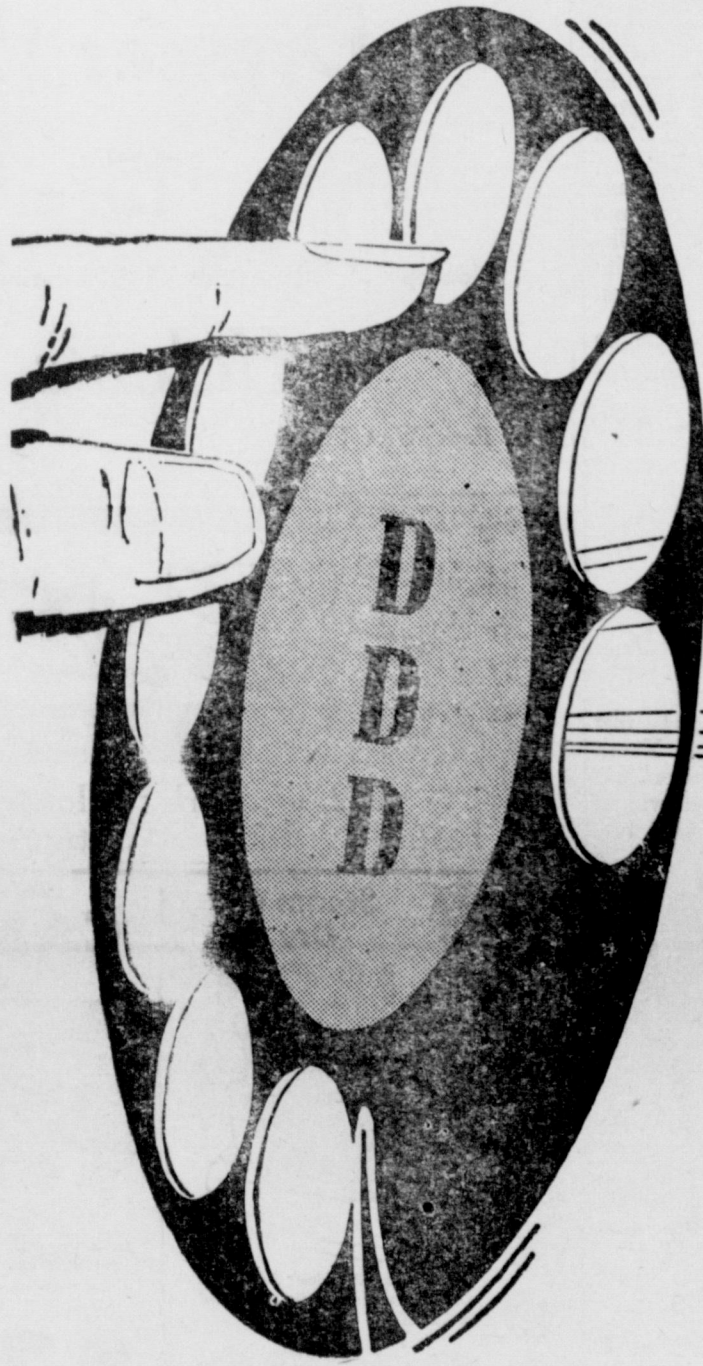
