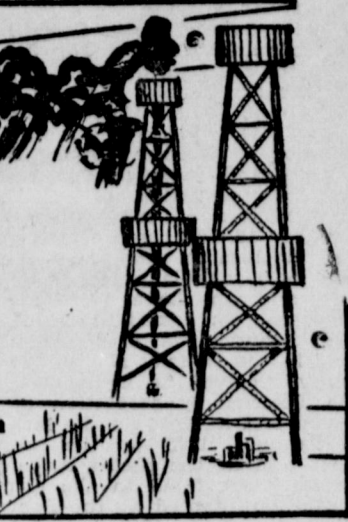

To the resident, qualified electors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 and of the territory received as an addition to Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 by resolution of the Board of Directors of such District on January 18, 1965; and to the qualified electors in said annexed area who own taxable property in said area and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

Take notice that elections will be held in the District and in the territory received as an addition to the District by resolution of the Board of Directors on the 18th day of January, 1965, on the propositions and at the places more particularly set forth in the election resolution adopted by the Board of Directors on the 18th day of January, 1965, which resolution is substantially as follows:

Resolution by the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 Receiving Territory as an Addition to the District and Calling Elections on the Question of Ratification of the Annexation of Such Territory and the Assumption of Indebtedness.

Whereas, on the 30th day of November, 1964, a petition signed by more than 50 landowners owning land within the area defined in such petition and within territory not embraced within a water control and improvement district, was filed with the Secretary of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 requesting annexation of the territory described therein to Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3;

Whereas, on the 14th day of December, 1964, the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 ordered that a hearing be held at 7:00 o'clock, P.M., on the 18th day of January, 1965, for the purpose of considering such petition; and

Whereas, notice of such hearing was given in accordance with law; and

Whereas, pursuant to such order and notice such hearing was held; and

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3:

1. That pursuant to notice prescribed by law a hearing has been held on the question of annexing the following territory as an addition to Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, to-wit:

"A part of Block Ten (10), Tarrant County School Lands, Wichita County, Texas, which is a subdivision adjoining Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, with the exception of and excluding Block 'J' of said subdivision, said area being more particularly described as follows: A tract of land out of Block 10, Tarrant County School Lands, Wichita County, Texas, being more specifically described by metes and bounds as follows:

Beginning at a point in Johnson Road, a public road, said point also being in the North Boundary Line of a proposed expressway and being North 200.0 feet from the Southwest corner of Block 10, Tarrant County School Lands.

Thence North along said Johnson Road a distance of 1,120.0 feet to a point, the Northwest corner of this tract.

Thence, East, 1,320.0 feet to a 1/2 inch iron rod, the Northeast corner of this tract.

Thence, South, 1,170.0 feet to a 1/2 inch iron rod, the Southeast corner of this tract. Said iron rods in the North Boundary Line of above mentioned proposed expressway.

Thence along the North Boundary Line of said proposed expressway as follows: West, 120.0 feet to a Right-of-Way marker; N. 86 deg. 38 min. W., 85.4 feet to a Right-of-Way marker; West, 350.0 feet to the Southwest corner of this tract and the place of beginning, containing 34.56 acres more or less.

Less and except the tract called Block J, being more specifically described by metes and bounds as follows:

Beginning at the Southeast corner of the above described tract of land;

Thence, along the North line of the proposed expressway, West, 120.0 feet to a Right-of-Way marker; N. 86 deg. 38 min. W., 235.2 feet; to the Southwest corner of said Block J;

Thence, North, 377.9 feet to the beginning of a curve to the right;

Thence, around said curve to the right, 72.4 feet;

Thence, East, 308.9 feet to the Northeast corner of said Block J;

Thence, South, 436.1 feet to the place of beginning."

2. That such territory is the same as that described in a petition dated the 30th day of November,

1964, and signed by more than 50 landowners owning land within the area described and within territory not embraced within a water control and improvement district.

3. That it is hereby found that the addition of the above described territory is to the advantage of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 and the water supply canals and other improvements will be sufficient to supply such territory without injury to other lands of the District.

4. That the territory described in such petition and in Section 1 of the resolution is hereby received as an addition to and shall become a part of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3.

5. That such annexed territory shall bear its pro-rata part of all indebtedness and taxes that may be levied on such territory, or authorized by such District.

6. That the annexation of such territory to Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 shall not become a final election hereinafter held within the boundaries of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 exclusive of such annexed territory.

7. That an election be held within the boundaries of the said District, excluding the annexed territory, shall constitute one election precinct and the annexed territory shall constitute another election precinct.

8. That the qualified voters residing within the boundaries of the District, excluding the annexed territory, shall vote at 103 N. Wall Street (City Hall, Iowa Park, Texas) within said District and the following persons are hereby appointed officials to hold said election:

Donald C. Hill, Presiding Judge, Mrs. T. C. Berry, Alternate Judge, Mrs. C. E. Thompson, Clerk, Mrs. Wayne House, Clerk.

9. That the qualified voters residing within the boundaries of the annexed territory shall vote at 113 Johnson Road, within such annexed territory, and the following persons are hereby appointed officials to hold said election:

Mrs. Cecil Streich, Presiding Judge, Mrs. James Boucher, Alternate Judge, Mrs. Grover L. Cleveland, Clerk, Mrs. Ben Hildebrand, Clerk.

10. That said election shall be held as provided by Acts 1925, 39th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 25 as amended, and as provided by law for holding general elections except as otherwise provided in said Chapter. That at said election only resident, qualified voters of said District shall be permitted to vote.

11. The ballots used at said elections shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"For Ratification of Annexation of Territory to District"
"Against Ratification of Annexation of Territory to District"

Concerning said proposition, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

It is Further Resolved by the Board of Directors of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3:

1. That it is hereby found that Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 has outstanding the following indebtedness:

Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 Refunding and Construction Bonds, Series 1964, dated February 1, 1964, bearing interest at the rates of 3 1/4%; 4% and 4 1/2% per annum, outstanding in the amount of \$694,000.

2. That an election shall also be held at the same time on February 20, 1965, for the purpose of assuming such annexed territory's proportion of debts and taxes of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3.

3. That the qualified electors in said annexed area who own taxable property in said area and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall vote at such election.

4. That such election shall be held at 113 Johnson Road and the following persons are hereby appointed officials for holding said election:

Mrs. Cecil Streich, Presiding Judge, Mrs. James Boucher, Alternate Judge, Mrs. Grover L. Cleveland, Clerk, Mrs. Ben Hildebrand, Clerk.

5. That said election shall be held as provided by Acts 1925, 39th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 25 as amended, and as provided by law for holding general elections except as otherwise provided in said Chapter.

6. That the ballots used at said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"For the Assumption of the Debt and the Levy of Taxes in Payment Thereof"
"Against the Assumption of the Debt and the Levy of Taxes in Payment Thereof"

Each voter shall mark out one of the above expressions thus leaving the other as the expression of his or her vote thereon.

7. That it is further ordered by the Board of Directors that the President and Secretary shall prepare a form of notice of such elections and they are further directed to sign such notice and take such steps as are necessary to have same published once a week on three consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in Wichita County, Texas, the first publication shall be at least 21 days prior to said date fixed for said election but in no event more than 35 days prior thereto.

8. That the President and Secretary are hereby instructed to cause said notice to be published and said officers are further directed to furnish election supplies including ballot boxes, ballots, polling lists, tally sheets, and returns of election, and all other supplies which may be necessary or proper. (Jan. 21, 28, Feb. 4, 11, 1965)

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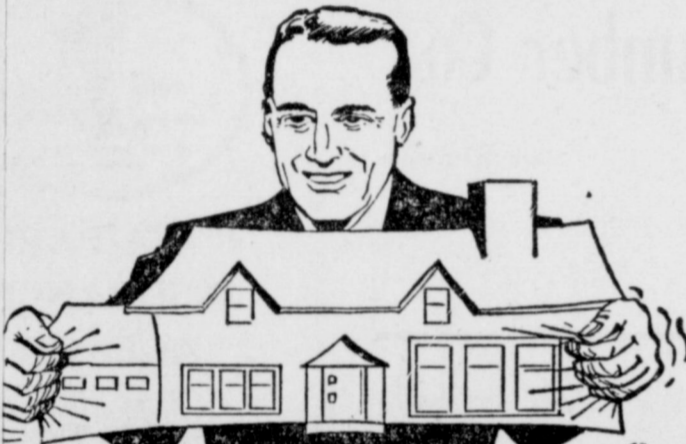
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Lioness Club

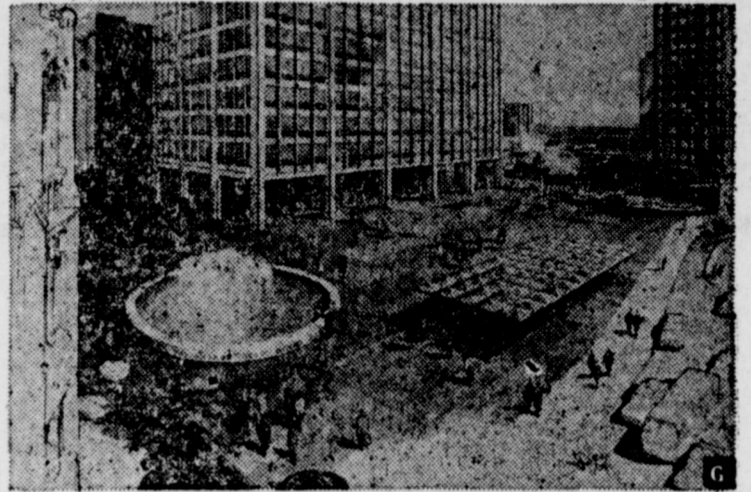

You don't have to go to the country to find wide open spaces. One of our largest cities, Chicago, soon will have an oasis for rest and calm in "Pioneer Court," a 100,000 square foot landscaped area surrounding the new 35-story Equitable Life Assurance Society Building.

Pioneer Court, in the heart of the city, is destined to become a beautiful center where cultural, civic and educational events will take place. Focal point will be an enormous marble fountain inscribed in bronze with the names of 25 Chicago pioneers who made outstanding contributions to the city's growth and greatness. The honored group was chosen by the Chicago Historical Society.

The fountain will send 40 jets of water into the air in a variety of patterns and will be lighted at night.

The court is located on the site of the log cabin home of John Kinzie, Chicago's first settler, and on the plot where Cyrus Hall McCormick, inventor of the reaper, had his original plant in 1847. The names of Kinzie and McCormick are among those inscribed on the fountain. The court is being developed by The Equitable and the Chicago Tribune, which occupies the next building.

Pioneers to be named on the fountain, in addition to Kinzie and McCormick, are: Jane Addams, social reformer and founder of Hull House; Philip Danforth Armour, first of the great Chicago packers and founder of Armour Institute of Technology; Daniel H. Burnham, builder of the World's Columbian Exposition of 1893 and originator of the Plan of Chicago, 1909; Richard Taylor Crane, founder of the Crane Company, philanthropist; John Crerar, manufacturer, financier and founder of the John Crerar Library; Stephen Arnold Douglas, U.S. Senator, projector of the Illinois Central Railroad and benefactor of the first University of Chicago; Marshall Field, first among the great Chicago merchants and founder of the Field Museum of Natural History; William Ramey Harper, first president of the University of Chicago; Carter Henry Harrison, five times elected mayor of Chicago; Gordon Saltontall Hubbard, pioneer merchant, meat packer and lake shipping operator; William LeBaron Jenney, inventor of the first skeleton frame building (Home Insurance, 1884) and thus called Father of the Skyscraper; Jos. Medill, editor, principal owner of the Chicago Tribune and the man considered responsible for making that paper a dominating force in the Middle West; Walter Loomis Newberry, merchant and founder of the Newberry Library; William Gutter Ogden, first mayor of Chicago; Potter Palmer, merchant and real estate developer; George Mortimer Pullman, inventor and founder of the Pullman Company; Martin Antoine Ryerson, capitalist and cultural leader; Julius Rosenwald, guiding genius of Sears, Roebuck & Co.; Jean Baptiste Pointe Sable, Chicago's first settler; Charles Henry Wacker, businessman and implementer of the Plan of Chicago; Aaron Montgomery Ward, founder of Montgomery Ward & Co.; John Wentworth, editor, mayor and congressman; John Whistler, U. S. Army captain who built Fort Dearborn.



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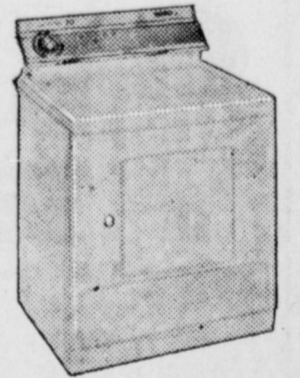

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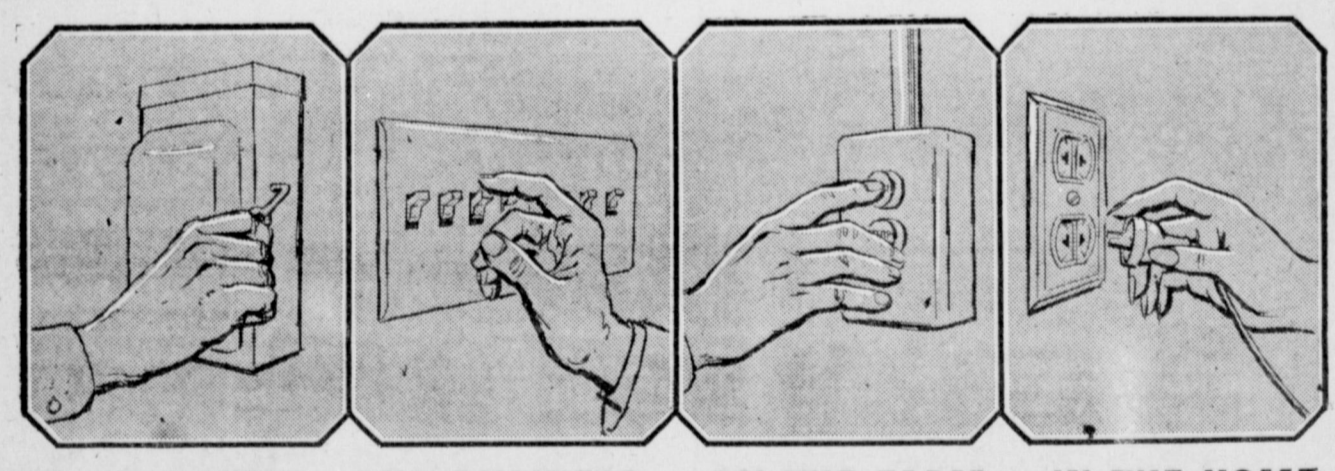
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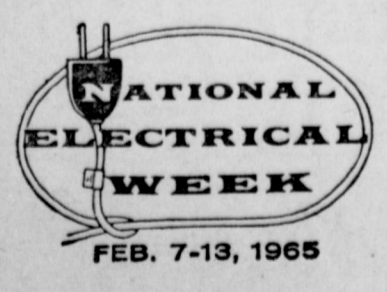
