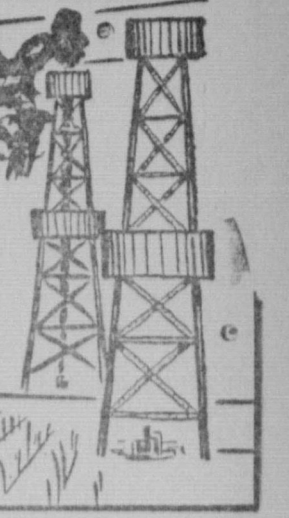

Former Local Boy Cited by Navy

Tommie R. Shook, 21, of Alice, a former resident of Iowa Park and grandson of Mrs. Troy Robinson and Mrs. Flora Shook of Iowa Park, received the Navy Commendation, Nov. 8, for saving a man's life in Viet Nam 14 months ago.

Shook was an engine man fireman serving aboard the minesweeper *Fortify*, Sept. 21, 1964, when the incident occurred.

Along with other shipmates, Shook was floating 55 gallon drums of oil to the ship from a pier at Bach Dong naval base in Saigon. When a shipmate became weakened while swimming against a strong current, Tommie swam to his side and held the man's head above water. Then with the help of another sailor, Shook began swimming with the victim to another ship.

Before they reached the minesweeper, a patrol craft met them and took them aboard.

Although the medal was authorized early this year, the navy was unable to locate the former navyman until now. The ceremony took place at the naval auxiliary air station at Kingsville. Shook received the medal from the station's commanding officer Capt. Carl H. Yeagle.

Tommie's mother Mrs. J. R. Fink of Alice attended the presentation ceremony.

Shook enlisted in the navy Dec. 8, 1960, at Odessa and served on the *Fortify* from 1962 until Nov. 1964. He was discharged that month and is now employed with Hunt Drilling Co. of Corpus Christi.
