Jim C. Keiningham, water superintendent, said Wednesday use of water here has dropped almost 50 per cent since the people were asked to conserve water on a voluntary basis. He estimates there is enough water on hand to last through August.

Meanwhile, the city administration has put on an emergency pipe laying project to connect with the irrigation ditch just south of town. An 8-inch line is being laid to the Old City Lake and should be completed by next Monday.

Keiningham says the necessary pumping equipment should be installed by next Wednesday.

Present plans call for blending Lake Diversion water with Lake Iowa Park water. Keiningham says the blend should not be too unpalatable for use, unless the drought should continue into the fall months.





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
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
