Elias McKinney Is Unexpected Heart Victim

William Elias McKinney, 86, a retired rural mail carrier, died in a Wichita Falls hospital last Thursday afternoon following a short illness.

Born in Marvell, Ark., Feb. 26, 1881, he moved to Iowa Park with his parents in 1891. He was married to Claudia Rogers, Feb. 12, 1911, in Goodlett, Tex. They lived in Frederick, Okla., Electra, Clayton and Des Moines, N.M.

He served in the army during World War I and was overseas when the armistice was signed.

The family moved back to Iowa Park in 1920. He was a rural mail carrier in Iowa Park and Harrold from 1921 to 1951.

McKinney was a charter member of Electra Masonic lodge. At time of death he belonged to AF&AM Lodge 713 in Iowa Park. He was member of First Baptist church and National Association of Retired Civil Service Employees.

Funeral service was conducted Saturday afternoon in First Baptist church by Rev. Donald Wood. Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

Survivors are the widow; two sons: Herman E. of Austin and Leslie Rogers of Compton, Calif.; two daughters: Mrs. Carl E. Taylor of La Paz, Brazil, and Mrs. Roy Husted of Webb City, Ok.; one brother N. E. of Iowa Park; five grandchildren.

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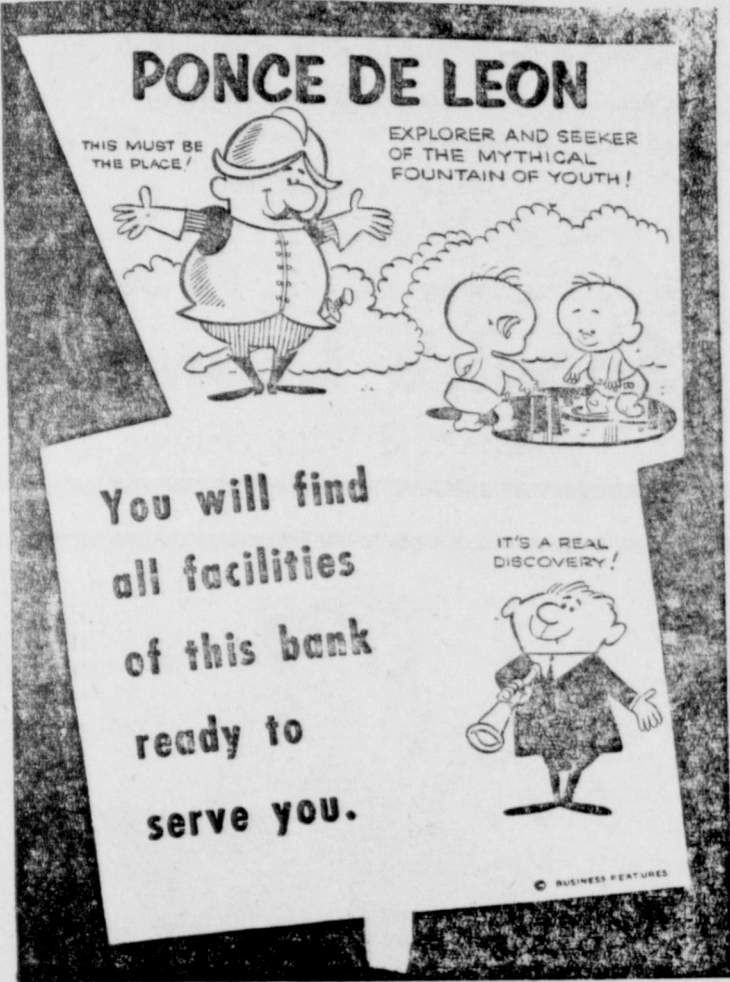
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Lioness Club

City Ordinance

ORDINANCE NO. 108
An ordinance requiring permits for the keeping of animals and fowls in the City of Iowa Park, granting certain exceptions; providing for inspection of places of keeping of animals and fowls; setting forth sanitary requirements; providing for enforcement; providing that any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not more than two hundred (\$200.00) dollars at the discretion of the court having jurisdiction. Essential and violative of the provision of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance; and providing a savings clause.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Iowa Park, Texas;

Section 1. Permits. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to keep certain animals or fowls of any kind or sex or description within the city limits of the City of Iowa Park who does not possess an unrevoked permit from the health officer or his authorized representative of the City of Iowa Park. Only persons who comply with the requirements of this ordinance shall be entitled to receive such a permit.

A permit may be temporarily suspended by the health officer or his authorized representative on violation by the holder of any of the terms of this ordinance, or revoked after an opportunity for a hearing by the health officer upon serious or repeated violation or violations. The annual permit fee for the keepers of animals or fowls shall be two (\$2.00) dollars. Money received from the issuance of permits shall be used to assist in the cost of inspection service, and the printing of forms for same. Permits will run from January 1st through December 31st inclusive each year.

Section 2. Exceptions.
(a) It shall at any time be unlawful to keep a hog or hogs, a pig or pigs, within the city limits of Iowa Park, Texas.
(b) Permits will not be required for the keeping of chickens or turkeys in a brooder or battery or for the keeping of poultry within the business district for sale if said poultry areas are kept in accordance with the Sanitary Code of the State and the Ordinances of the City of Iowa Park.
(c) Dogs and cats shall be excepted from the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 3. Inspection of Places of Keeping of Animals and Fowls: At least once a year the health officer or his authorized representative shall inspect every area or place for which a permit has been issued for the keeping of animals and fowls. In case the health officer discovers the violation of any item of sanitation, he shall make a second inspection after the lapse of such time as he deems necessary for the defect to be remedied, and the second inspection shall be used in determining compliance with the requirements of this ordinance. Any violation of the same item of this ordinance on such second inspection shall call for immediate suspension of the permit.

The person or persons, firm or corporation keeping animals or fowls within the corporate limits of the City of Iowa Park shall upon request of the health officer or his authorized representative, permit access to the area or places of keeping of animals or fowls.

Section 4. Regulations and Sanitation Requirements for the Keeping of Any Poultry, Fowl or Fowls. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to violate any of the following:
(a) Keep, harbor, maintain or permit the presence on any lot or parcel of land within the City of Iowa Park any poultry or fowl of any kind, sex or description, other than not more than one for each ten square feet of floor or ground area, pigeons included.
(b) Keep any poultry, fowl or fowls within any structure in the City of Iowa Park without scraping the floor of the room, coop, box or compartment and thoroughly cleaning the area within which such fowl or fowls are kept at least once every forty-eight (48) hours and so maintaining such structure or enclosure that no offensive odors are emitted therefrom.
(c) Keep any chickens or turkeys within any structure the interior of which is not whitewashed at least once every six months and without spraying crude oil or some disinfectant on the roosting places at least once in each calendar month to discourage insects, fleas, mites, and flies.

Section 5. Regulations and Sanitation Requirements for the Keeping of Cow or Cows, Goat or Goats, Horse or Horses, Sheep, or Any Animal of Similar Species. It shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to violate any of the following:
(a) To feed, breed, stable, pasture, or keep any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other animal of like species in or on any lot, pen, building, parcel of land, stable or other enclosure, in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, any part of which lot, pen, building, stable, parcel of land or other enclosure is nearer than 100 feet to any building occupied by any person

or persons any part of the day or night. A minimum of 400 square feet of area shall be required for each animal.
(b) The place of feeding, breeding, stabling, pasturing or the keeping of any cow or cows, goat or goats, horse or horses, sheep or any other animal of like species shall be kept free of offensive odors, flies, rodents or other pests.
(c) Section 6. Hereafter, each and every lot, pen, building, stable or other enclosure in the City of Iowa Park, Texas, in or on which any of the above named animals or other species are kept, fed, bred, stabled, pastured or housed, shall have a suitable manure box or container which shall be securely screened or otherwise protected from flies vermin and rodents, and shall be cleaned out and disinfected at least once a week. Manure from such boxes or containers shall not be left in open stacks but removed or buried.

Section 7. Enforcement. This ordinance shall be enforced by the Health Officers of the City of Iowa Park or his authorized representative.

Section 8. Penalties. Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not more than Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars at the discretion of the court having jurisdiction. Each and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 9. Repeal and Date of Effect. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed and from and after thirty (30) days from the date of passage of this ordinance all persons or persons, firm or corporation or association desiring to keep fowls or animals within the city limits of Iowa Park, Texas, must conform with the requirements of this ordinance.

Section 10. Unconstitutionality Clause. Should any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, the remainder of said ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

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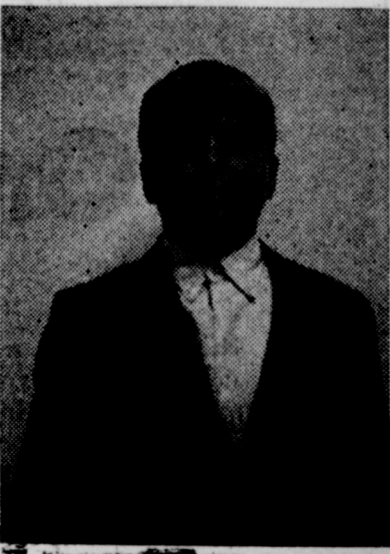
