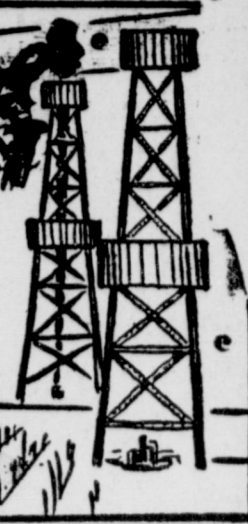

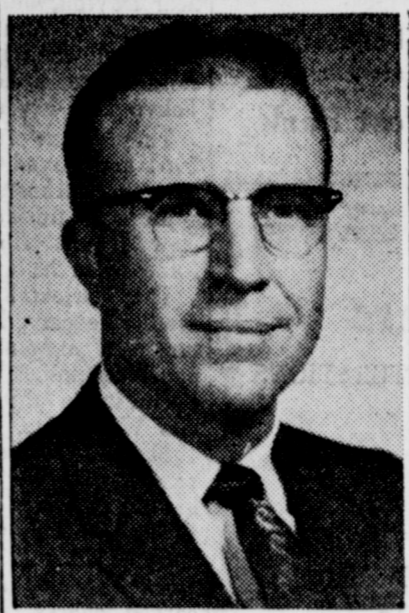

New teachers in Iowa Park school systems not previously mentioned in School News:  
Mrs. Genevieve Begley, elementary; attended Stetson university at Deland, Fla.; received BA at Valdosta State college in Georgia; taught in Naylor, Ga., last year.  
Mrs. Betty Bustfield, elementary, received BBA degree from North Texas State university and has done graduate work in elementary education.  
Larry Dortch of Rockport, Ky., is graduate of Texas Wesleyan college in Ft. Worth. He has taught at Perrin the past two years. Will teach 7th grade science and be 7th grade coach.  
Miss Joan Graves, director of high school and junior high school work, has taught in Munday for two years. Received AB degree from Abilene Christian college and is working on master's degree at East Texas State college.  
Mrs. Becky Smith, elementary, holds BA from Midwestern university and has had experience as private tutor.

Faris Nowell told Noon Lions of plans for the opening of Iowa Park schools next month, at their meeting Tuesday.  
Classes will start Sept. 6, the day following Labor Day.  
Thanksgiving recess will be on Nov. 24 and 25.  
Christmas holidays start Dec. 21 and end Jan. 3.  
March 10 will be an off day to permit teachers to attend a convention.  
Easter recess will extend from March 24 to 27.  
May 26 will be the end of the 1966-67 term.  
An additional football practice field has been laid out north of the school building. Parking for home games will be on four spaces: Across from the Church of Christ, west of the administration building, south of the gymnasium, near the bus barn.  
All reserved seat tickets for the season have been sold. Nowell said he would like for all ticket holders who know in advance they will have to miss a game, to turn in the tickets for that game to be resold. The money will be refunded to the original purchaser.  
The superintendent reported 20 new teachers will be on the staff this year, three of whom have not yet been secured. Iowa Park is eligible for 7 more units than we had last year.  
In discussing the new construction here, Nowell said the four rooms at Kidwell will be ready at the start of school. He expects a delay in the completion of 9 rooms at Bradford. If this develops, students will be forced to attend classes in shift until the work is completed.  
Nowell said 14 new high school students pre-registered Monday and more are expected.

## Baseball Tourney Your C of C

Iowa Park senior all-stars went to Wichita Falls, Wednesday evening for the Red River tournament. They played the Wichita Falls AAA champ Holt's Sporting Goods team and came out winners 4-3 in a see-saw battle.  
Iowa Park scored in the 1st inning. Holt's tied it up in the 3rd. Holt's took the lead in the 5th and I.P. caught up again in the 6th.  
Holt's pulled in the lead again with 1 run in the top half, but Iowa Park took the game with 2 runs in the bottom half.  
After some walks and a hit, the tying run was walked in, and Glen Taylor won the game with a bases loaded single through second base.  
The game was marred by a flurry of errors on both sides. Jim Clapp struck out seven Holt's batters.  
The Hawk team was made up of only nine players: Dick Cutler, Rusty Spruiell, Bingo Miller, Jim Clapp, Robert Bradford, Steve Berry, Mike Robertson, Glen Taylor, Mike Miller.  
Bing Miller is manager and Cletis Wright is coach of the Hawks.  
They will play Thursday night at 8:30 for the title.

Iowa Park boys aged 12-13 are playing baseball in the Red River tournament.  
The Hawks won their first tilt against the W.F. Hoboes, 6-3.  
Lee Dawson pitched, holding the Hoboes to one hit. He walked six batters.  
Iowa Park scored 3 runs in the first inning on walks and a bases loaded single by Jack Perkins, with Lee Dawson scoring on a passed ball.  
In the 2nd inning Charles Buikema hit a two-run homer, to make the score 5-1.  
Iowa Park scored the final run in the 4th on a passed ball.  
The Hoboes made one run in each of the 2nd, 3rd and 5th stanzas.

## The McNulty's

Mrs. McNulty, the former Akiko Ote of Japan, adds a pleasing touch of the Orient to our town. She met her husband, native of New Jersey, when he was stationed with the US air force at Chitose Hokkaido, Japan. After graduation from Biya high school she attended a tailoring school and went to work in a tailor shop in Chitose. Airmen patronized the shop to have stripes affixed to their uniforms, etc. The couple met when he went there to have tailoring done. They dated for 2 years, and were married March 15, 1957.

The McNulty's stayed in Japan 1 1/2 years and were then sent to the States to an air force base near Dayton, Ohio. Akiko had the privilege of returning to her native land when her husband was assigned to Yokota Air Base in Tokyo for 4 years.

They came back in January 1964 and stayed in Missouri until the recent transfer to SAFB.

McNulty finished high school in New Jersey. He joined the air force when he was 18 years old. The Oriental atmosphere is readily observed through furniture and appointments from Japan, Philippines, Hong Kong and Formosa in the McNulty home, 906 W. Louisa.

She has two dolls entirely characteristic of her land. One is a kabuki doll in a stage play which is her own handwork. Among the most striking pieces of furniture from Japan are two ornately carved cherry wood end tables. Tall brass lamps also from Japan stand on the tables.

Madonna plaques made from the monkey pad tree in the Philippines hang on one wall in the living room.

A graceful divider from Okinawa separating the living and dining areas is truly eye-catching. Centering the dining table is a unique hand-carved fruit bowl made of camphor tree wood. Its odd shape and the sprawling eagle atop the handle give the bowl a distinction all its own. McNulty acquired this on Formosa.

Hanging on the wall in the dining area are a large spoon and fork from the Philippines and a brass plaque from Hong Kong.

While on their honeymoon they bought a novelty bear carved with precision by a blind man.

Mrs. McNulty also has lovely

linens from the Orient. She is delighted with America and is favorably impressed with the friendliness of Iowa Park people.

She enjoys sewing, and the family's hobby is making tape recordings.

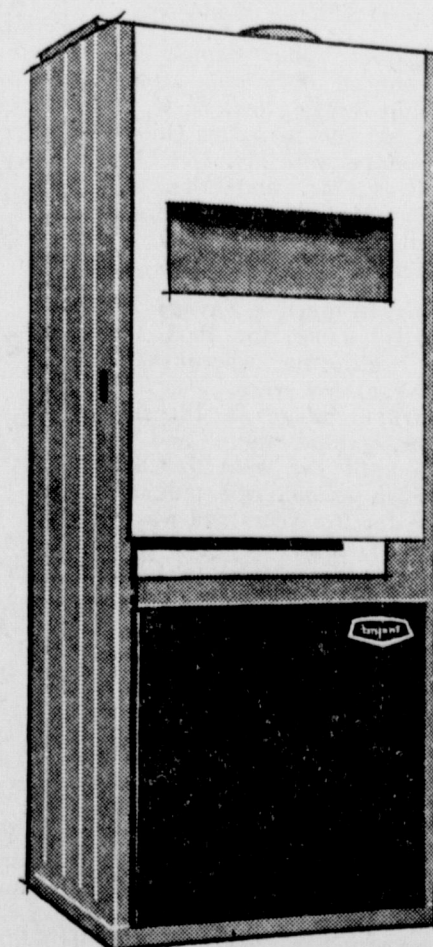

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election."

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has
