## Poll Tax Due

Reminder to voters to pay their poll tax—including suggestion that poll tax receipts be part of family Christmas gifts—was made today by Prof. A. F. Edwards, chairman of Wichita county Democratic executive committee.

Poll tax receipt will be required to vote in state and local elections next year, Edwards said. Even if the court case now pending on the poll tax is decided in the near future, appeals will take at least a year.

Those who fail to pay the \$1.75 poll tax by Jan. 31 will be unable to vote next year unless exempted by age. Among elections scheduled for 1966 are school boards, city officials, state officials, U.S. senator and representative, county officers, state amendments, water board and any special elections which might be scheduled.

Edwards said there are four classes of people who are exempt from paying the poll tax:  
1. Those who were 60 or over on Jan. 7, 1965.  
2. Those who became 21 after Jan. 1, 1965, or will be 21 by an election day.

Those persons who have moved into Texas since Jan. 1, 1965, and who have lived in the state a year preceding any election, and who are 21 years of age or older at that time.

4. Those who only want to vote in federal elections. In some cases, exemption certificates are required. Edwards urged anyone unsure of his eligibility to check with the Tax Assessor and Collector's office. The Wichita Falls number is 322-0721.

## Christmas Art in Our Town

The manner in which Iowa Park residents have decorated their homes, both inside and outside, this year is typical of the excellent way in which they always do things.

Hours and hours of pleasure are in store for everyone who will take time to drive around town and look at the decorations.

A 10-foot steel tree glowing with 275 red and blue lights and topped with a red neon star on top of a 90-foot elevator leg at Robert Johnson's Elevator is visible for miles from any perspective and is a conversation piece for many people in the area.

The tree was made by Bill Gilmore Welding, and Bob Johnson plans to leave it on the elevator leg so it can help to spread Christmas good cheer and light during years to come.

Country Hills addition is a blaze of lights at night, particularly on Johnson Road and Rita Lane. Homeowners worked together last Christmas and this year on the project, and their efforts have produced a pleasing, delightful and beautiful effect.

Motorists on the highway designate Country Hills as a "point of interest" on their trips to places near and far.

The nights at W. A. George's home northeast of town afford motorists on the Expressway their first or last look of the unusual lighting effects in Our Town.

Description of some of the outside decorations is given as an incentive to residents of the community to drive around and get the "Christmas in the Air" feeling.

We hope to continue the outside decorations next week.

Bill Robinson's decorations at 1013 W. Louisa are striking. The most unique feature is the topiary tree on the front door covered with gold foil. The tree is made from a styrofoam ball decorated with red satin balls and pine cones growing in a wicker basket filled with greenery and ornaments.

N-O-E-L is spelled out on the two garage doors with "Season's Greetings" hanging overhead in smaller letters. A white flocked tree standing before the living room window can be seen from the street. A lighted star on the housetop, vari-colored lights at the edge of the roof, and tiny lights in the shrubbery add to the attractiveness of the place at night.

A cross on the housetop where

50 blue lights burn, and the greeting "Merry Christmas" written in blue paint on the grass of the front lawn inspire passers-by to stop at the Ray Cook home, 913 Van Horn, for a closer look. The garage doors and front door are completely covered with slick blue paper and the brilliantly colored symbols on them provide interesting contrast.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Carter, 1019 Cornelia, have used red and white decorations and lights. Garage doors are done to represent huge packages wrapped in white and tied with wide red ribbon and bows. Red bells are suspended above the doors. Front doorpiece is especially pretty—a large Santa—and reindeer stand on one side of the lawn. Colorful canes line the driveway.

Yard decorations at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Elwell, 603 W. Rebecca, are sure to attract the young and old. A life-size inflated Santa waves as he stands by a wooden sleigh drawn by four tall brown and white plywood red-nosed deer. Red and white lights outline the front of the house.

Strings of lights running up a flagpole form a "Tree of Lights" on the front lawn of Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Owens' home, 520 W. Texas. Hurricane lamps outline the driveway and lawn next to the street. Six tall carolers stand beneath the "Tree of Lights" while Santa is caught in the chimney on the roof and two elves struggle to free him.

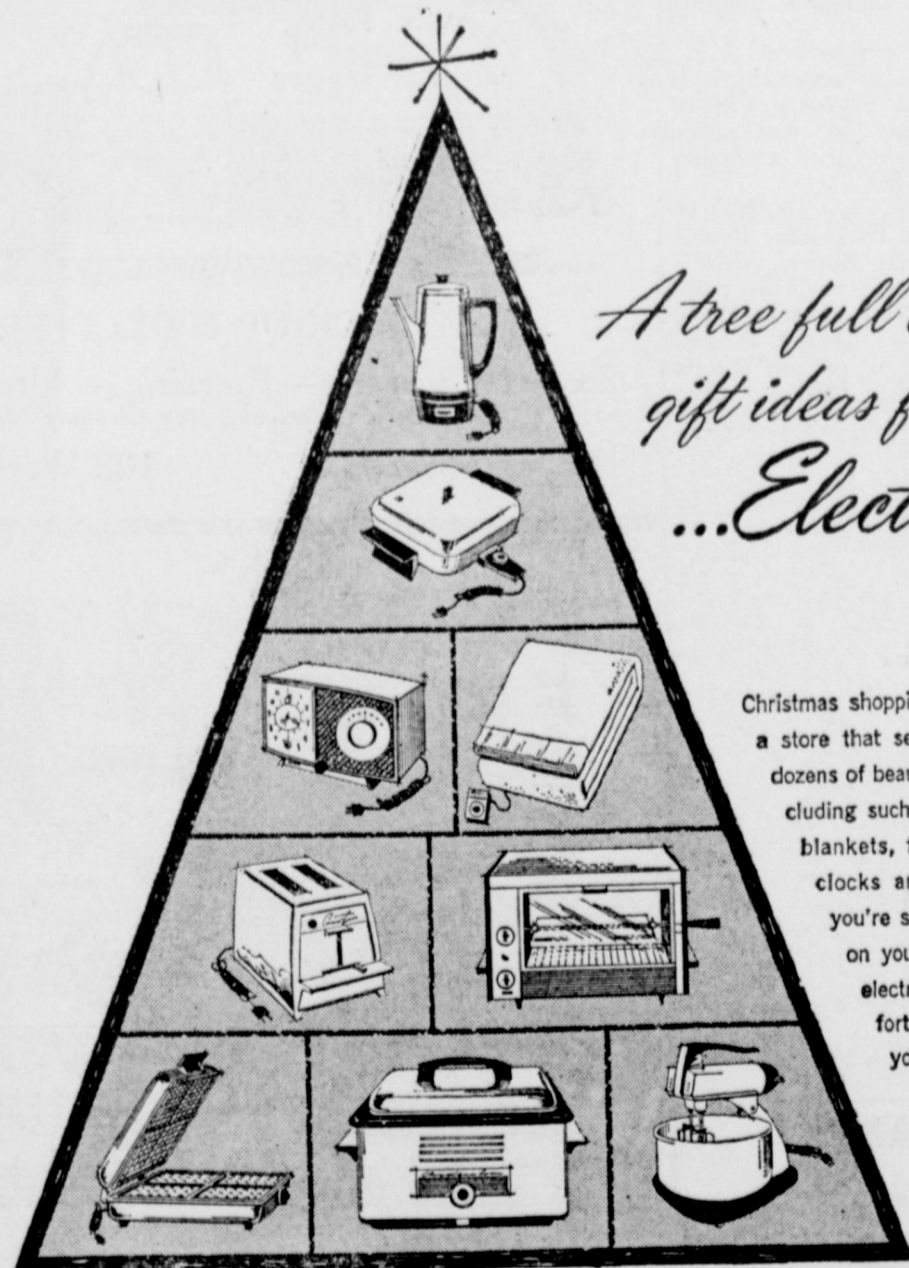
