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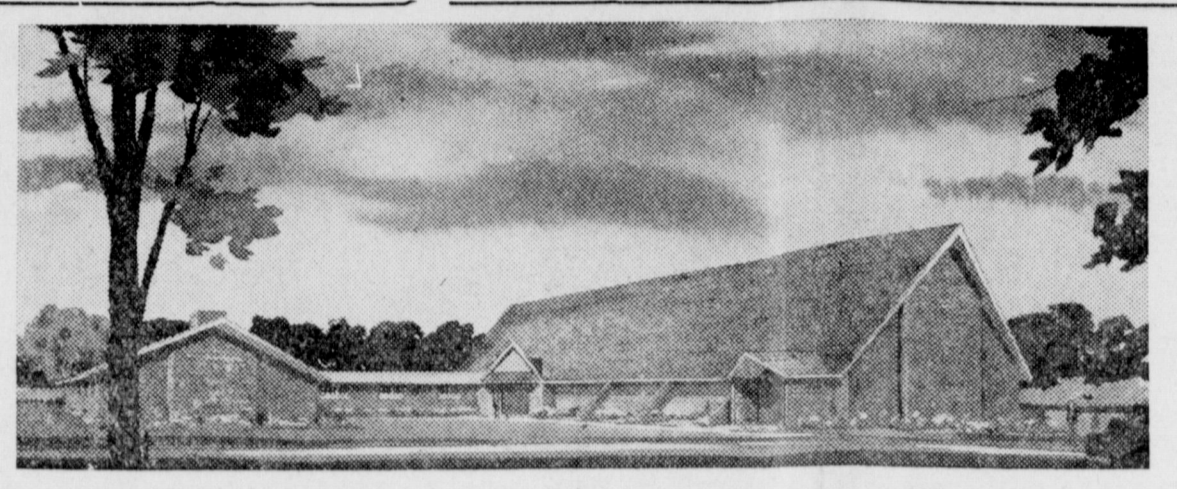

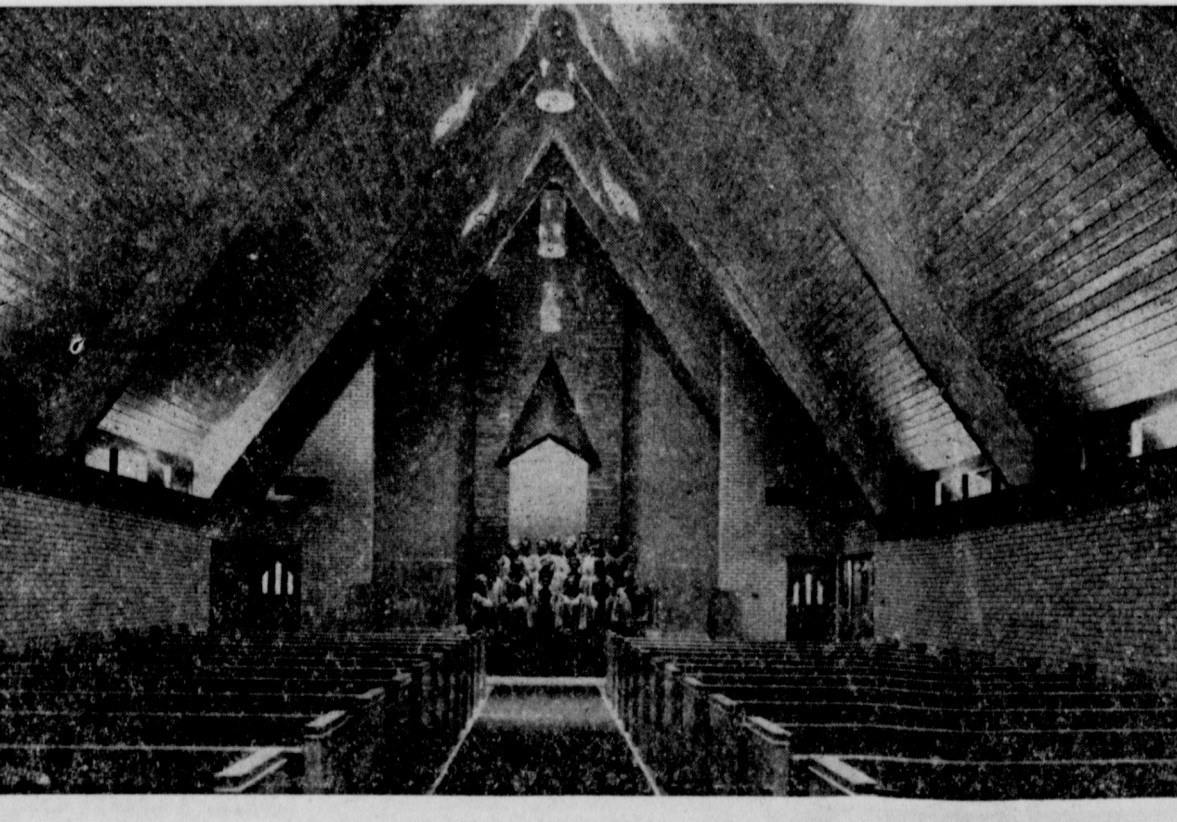
First Christian church of Iowa Park was organized in 1891 with 22 charter members. They were: Mrs. O. H. Crites, Mr. and Mrs. Z. P. Dale, Mr. and Mrs. Newt Herod, Mr. and Mrs. D. M. Smith, Mr. and Mrs. John Chenoweth, Mrs. Fannie Yauger, E. A. McClesky, Mr. and Mrs. I. Flemmons, Judge J. S. Akers, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Ferguson, Mrs. Nicholson, Mr. and Mrs. Snow, Mrs. J. L. Pratt, Sarah Pratt, Mrs. C. A. Peterson.

Meetings for a few weeks were held in a small building on the south side of town, and then were moved to the north side, occupying a vacated grocery room at the corner of Cash and Bond streets.

Preaching in the early days was by itinerant speakers, mainly men who came from Wichita Falls to hold Sunday afternoon services.

The congregation became discouraged and disbanded for a while, but reorganized again in 1899. Services were then held in a schoolhouse on the south side.

Hawks 49 Bearcats 14

Taking up where the 1965 IP Hawks left off last November, the 1966 Hawks opened their season by crushing Henrietta 49-14 on Bobby Gilbreath Field last Friday night.

The Green Wave rolled over Henrietta in the first quarter by making a safety, a 7-point touchdown and a 6-pointer. First scoring came when Hurn was tackled in his own end zone. This was followed by a 41 yard drive in seven plays. Gregg Webb running the final 3 yards. Robert Watson kicked the PAT.

Mike Skinner went 10 yards through the Henrietta line for his score.

Iowa Park scored twice in the second quarter. One was a 76-yard drive in 7 plays climaxed by a 23-yard pass play from Robert Watson to Harry Price. A minute later Webb went 13 yards through the line for another TD. Barry Jackson completed the PAT to run our lead to 29-0.

Before the half was finished Henrietta got on the scoreboard with a 60-yard drive in 8 plays. The try for extra points failed.

Iowa Park started the 3rd quarter with a 57-yard drive in 4 plays, with Watson making the final 13 yard and adding the PAT.

Webb blocked a Henrietta punt into the end zone where Mickey Patterson fell on it for the score, and Watson kicked an extra point.

At this point Coach Watkins had most of his regulars on the bench, so Henrietta's team flexed their muscles and produced another scoring drive. A Hurn aerial to Fullback Keith Horn was the payoff. Hurn ran for two points.

The Hawks then moved 34 yards in 7 plays with Jackson scoring from the two. Watson kicked the PAT.

Decatur vs Iowa Park Friday - Here Kickoff at 8:00

Iowa Park Hawks will host the Decatur Eagles here this Friday in one of the area's better football games. A non-conference tilt, it should settle which team can be ranked at the top of the State AA list.

Last year the Hawks ran into trouble but finally came out victors in an 18-13 game.

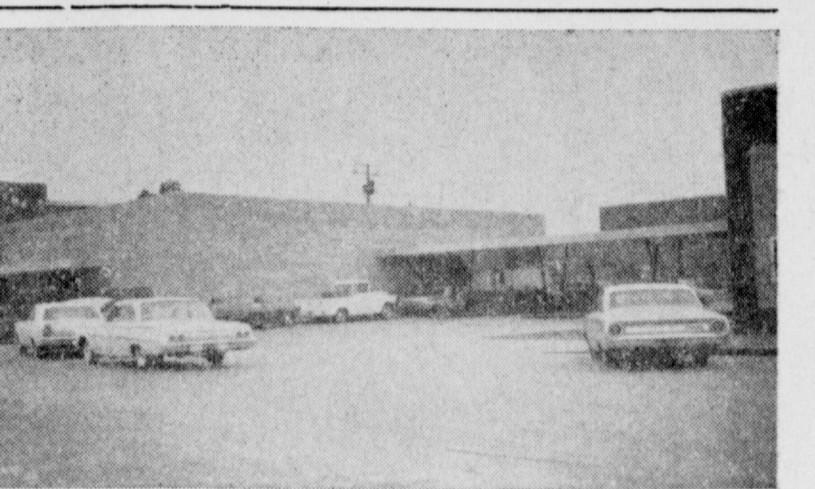
Blood Needed

State National Bank Expansion Program Adds Drive-in Windows and Business Offices Annex

Completion of State National Bank Annex building and its occupancy by the bank and other business interests here has been announced by Cleo Nipper, president of the bank.

His statement follows:

The existing "drive-in" window and "twenty-four hour" commercial night depository along with the "twenty-four hour" all-purpose depository drop, will continue to be used as in the past. Two complete additional "drive-in" windows were added for customer convenience since the existing window was rather crowded on busy days and particularly when accompanied by bad weather.

Window No. 2 will operate on a standby basis under present conditions since it is only needed about 30 percent of the time. Winter accompanied by cold air, sleet, rain and snow usually increase "drive-in" demands which can now adequately be serviced.

The third window is for future expansion and growth which is inevitable as long as all of the Iowa Park area continues to build service facilities ahead of normal growth potentials which population increases alone automatically afford any area.

The State National Bank Annex building is composed of 10 offices of which 9 were allocated for commercial leasing purposes, one being retained and occupied by the bank.

Present occupants are Robert E. Birk of Iowa Park Insurance Agency, Bill Guthrie with Century Life Insurance Company, Sam Hunter of Sam Hunter Real Estate and Insurance, James W. Stewart who is an oil operator, and James R. Tharp of Wichita County Bureau of Credit Control.

All of the offices in this building are equipped with brick wainscot walls, paneling, carpeting. Pre-built-in telefacilities, as well as intercom and/or if desired by the occupant.

The entire building is heated and cooled by a central heating and refrigerated air conditioning unit whereby a desired temperature may be maintained at all times.

State National Bank and staff would like to express their appreciation to all of their customers for the occasional inconvenience that was caused during the construction period. In that the existing alleyway, immediately North of the drive-in area, must be regraded and surfaced where it will more uniformly slope into the existing concrete driveway, we would sincerely appreciate your continued co-operation until the last phase of this expansion program is completed.
