Friday Proclaimed 'Hawks Day' by Mayor Metz

Whereas, the Iowa Park High School football teams have had a highly successful regular season, and

Whereas, the coaches and administration and teachers of the school system have co-operated to the fullest in providing our students an education and atmosphere conducive to bringing out their best qualities and efforts, and

Whereas, the patrons and parents have supported the youth activities of Iowa Park wholeheartedly and plan to attend the bi-district game with Phillips at Borger,

Therefore, I, C. L. Metz, mayor of the City of Iowa Park, do herewith declare Friday, November 17, to be "Hawks Day" and call upon the citizens of our community to honor our students and football players by giving them every encouragement to continue their support of the athletic teams and continue their good citizenship in the schools and their diligent pursuit of knowledge in the classrooms.

Crushed but full of fight, the Indians made a game of it by scoring twice in the 2nd stanza. Iowa Park kept a good margin by piling up another 7 points on Eke's 1-yard plunge.

Both hands put on a fine music and marching show for the standing-room-only crowd, and they were warmly cheered from both sides of the field. The Hawk band uncovered some clever new maneuvers and showed why the John Holdridge trained and Ann Huckaby led group deserved to be rated I in the recent marching contest.

Coach Watkins had his reserves on the field much of the second half, and neither team could dent the goal line during the 3rd quarter.

In the whirlwind wind-up the Indians made Iowa Park look at its hole card. They carried the fight to their enemy and brought themselves back into contention by bringing the score to 21-23 before Jim Clapp intercepted a pass and ran 56 yards to paydirt.

This salted away the victory, but the Indians had left enough fight to drive for another score in short order. Time ran out with Steve Nunn reaching the Indian 13-yard line.

With their fourth consecutive district title in the history books, the Hawks and their fans will be in Borger this Friday night for the bi-district playoff with Phillips. This will be the third meeting of the Blackhawks and the Green and White Hawks.

Schools will dismiss at 11:30 a.m. Friday in order for everyone to have sufficient time to get to Borger by 3:00 p.m. for the bi-district football game between Iowa Park and Phillips. Cafeterias will not serve lunches that day.

Tickets for the game at Borger went on sale Tuesday night. They are still available at the administration building. Reserved seat and general admission tickets are \$2. Student tickets bought here are 75c and at the gate are \$1. Ticket sales will close at 5 p.m. Thursday.

An outstanding program has been planned by the group guidance committee of IPHS today from 1:00 to 1:30.

Capt. William A. De Vries, an instructor at SAFB, will present the program. He has recently returned from Viet Nam where he was a helicopter pilot in rescue operations for downed flyers in North Vietnam.

De Vries was one of the first Americans involved in this work, flying Jolly Green Giant helicopters. He will show film of actual rescue operations under fire.

Greg Frazier had a tremendous night as he scored seven of Iowa Park's 3 TD's. Camp ran one over from the 3 yard line. Burkhardt caught two of Frazier's PAT tries and R. Alsop caught the other one.

The defense did an outstanding job. This is the second District title for the 7th grade—no defeats in district play.

Eighth grade Hawks kept their record by winding up the season with a 40 to 6 victory over Quannah last Thursday.

The Indians were stopped cold except for a 50-yard TD pass. Steve Webb was leading gainer for IP, making 202 yards on 20 carries and catching 2 passes for 32 yards more.

Morrison threw three scoring passes. Jackie Perkins scored one touchdown; James Frazier made one. Webb scored three times; and Sam Morrison sneaked in for another. Perkins added four points with 2 PAT runs.

Mail Early and Use ZIP Codes

During the Christmas rush the Postal service carries more mail in a month than most countries do in a year.

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath today reminds local residents that it is important to mail early in the day and well as early in the season.

By mailing early in the day, postal employees can assure that gifts, cards and letters will be sent on their way by the earliest means. Often there is only one connection per day for many distant points. If mail is deposited after that truck has left, there can be one day delay in moving on to its next sorting point.

"Mail early and use ZIP codes on all letters, cards and packages," says Gilbreath.

Direct Dialing Due Next Year

Direct Distance Dialing, a system which permits telephone users to dial across the nation almost as easily as they now call across the street, is coming to Iowa Park.

The announcement was made this week by Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Manager Marvin Marcell.

The new system will go in service during the second half of 1968. Marcell could not give a firm date for DDD.

He pointed to the DDD project as "another evidence of our faith in the future growth of this area."

Marcell said the new system is not expected to cause any personnel lay-offs. DDD will be used for station-to-station calls. All other calls will be handled by operators as at present.

If the customer reaches a wrong number in a distant city or has any other difficulty on the call, he will report it by dialing the operator. She will make a credit ticket, and the customer will not be billed for the call.

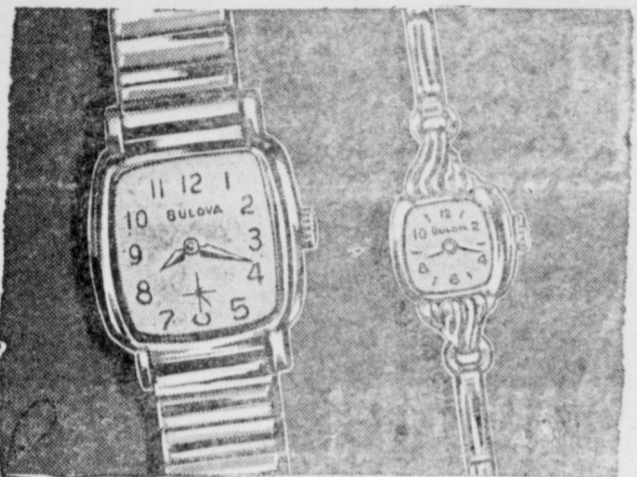

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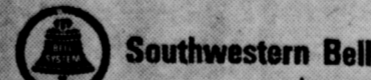

State Hospital Gift List

Miss Beulah Ann Johnson, volunteer services department, Wichita Falls state hospital, requests area residents, clubs and organizations to remember the 2000 patients at the hospital when they are making plans for Christmas.

Help is needed to visit and provide special activities, send funds to help provide special patient needs, and to bring gifts. 6000 gifts are needed so each patient might have three new gifts Christmas Eve. Many have no outside help.

Mail contributions to: Volunteer Service Council, Wichita Falls State Hospital, Box, 300, Wichita Falls, TX 76307.

All money received is used to buy special gifts, therapy equipment, ward items, and refreshments.

Gifts can be brought to the hospital. They should be unwrapped and labeled "Christmas Gifts." Paper and ribbons for wrapping should be included if possible.

Christmas decorations are needed by Dec. 1. Fireproof decorations for 40 wards including lights and extra bulbs and table decorations for 18 dining halls are needed.

Special ward needs for December are coffee, fresh fruit, diabetic refreshments for 150 patients, boxed cake mixed, sugar cubes, sandwiches, cookies, cakes, baby food jars (to divide instant coffee).

There are about 1000 men in the hospital. Suggested gifts for them are: cigarettes, cigars, tobacco, pipes. Instant coffee and tea. Toilet articles. Shoes and socks. Deodorant. Shirts and

washable slacks. Boxed candy, soft preferred. Electric razors.

Billfold and coin purses. Ties and tie clasps. Belts. Gloves. House shoes and scuffs. Shoe shine kits. Sweaters. Underwear. Lighters and fluid. Stationery and ballpoint pens. Nail clippers.

Women's gifts suggested:

Hose, garters, dresses. Toilet articles. Instant coffee and tea. Cigarettes and lighters. Costume jewelry. Underwear. Head scarves. Bed jackets for elderly. Cosmetics, combs, hair brushes. Gowns and dusters. Raincoats and overcoats. Large purses. Gloves. Boxed candy.

Capt. John W. Culton, medical corps, US army, a nephew of Mrs. James A. Sewell and son of Gera Davis Coulter of Hemet, Calif., former resident of Iowa Park, has been awarded several medals for meritorious service during 1967.

He received the Air Medal for meritorious achievement while participating in aerial flight in support of combat ground forces of the Republic of Vietnam. He actively participated in more than 25 missions over hostile territory.

He was awarded the Bronze Star for heroism in action on May 31, 1967 while participating in a recovery mission of a downed aircraft near Bong Son.

Culton was awarded the Army Commendation medal for heroism in action June 6, 1967 while serving with HHC Co., 227th Aviation Bn. near Bong Son. When a nearby landing zone was under hostile mortar fire, causing a series of explosions in ammunition storage area, he assisted in evacuation of several wounded soldiers.

Mrs. Sewell received word recently that Culton has also received the Purple Heart within the past few weeks.

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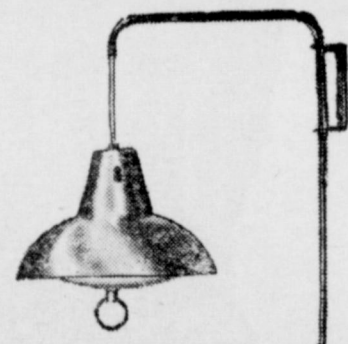
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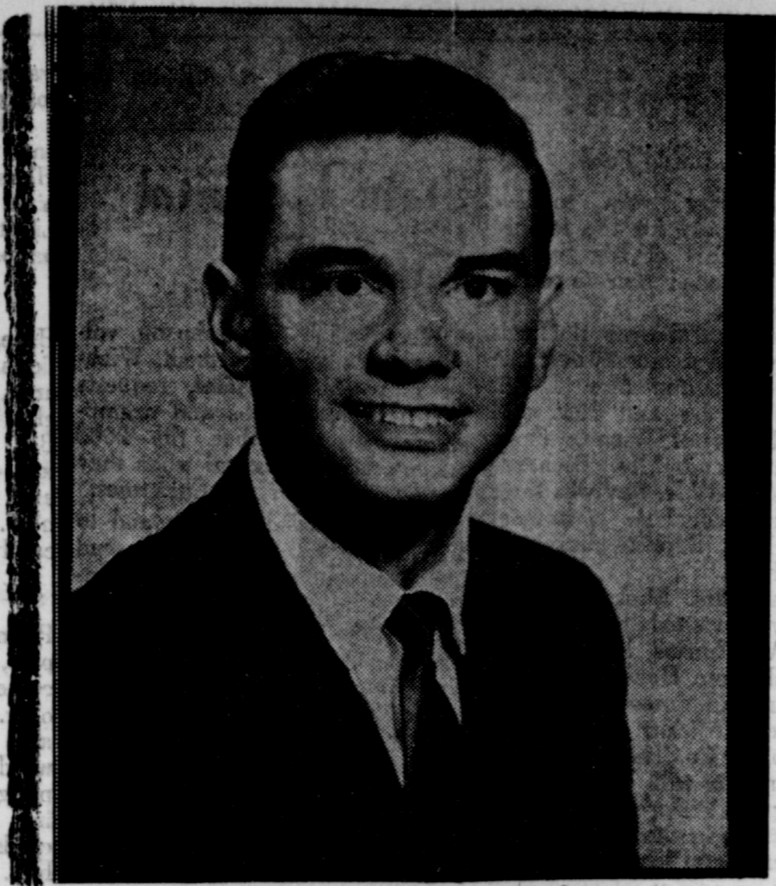
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Larry Dodd Honored at MU

South Africa and its relationship to Great Britain, America and other countries was topic of a talk Tuesday by Lion John Maples at Noon Lions club. He was introduced by Bill Steger, program chairman.

Maples discussed the climate, size, education, tourist attractions, industry, agriculture, and standard of living of South Africa, where he and family have lived the past 12 years.

Some of the interesting observations he made were that South Africa is the only country which has repaid the American World War I debt and is one of the first to pay its lend-lease debt.

Strikes have been outlawed in that country since 1922. Taxation is one third less there than in America. People of South Africa save one-fourth of their incomes.

In conclusion, Maples asked: "Why are America and Great Britain always against South Africa?" He gave two reasons: (1) because 3,000,000 white people control the country and have disfranchised 15,000,000 non-whites. (2) South Africa is one of the few 100 per cent anti-communist countries in the world.
