

23 Study Club

The home of Mrs. James A. Sewell was significantly appointed Thursday for Americanism Day meeting of 23 Study Club. Mrs. Miles Hines and Mrs. C. Weiler shared hostesses duties. Pictures of Washington crossing the Delaware, Spirit of 66, Minute Men, and other scenes in American history, a reproduction of the Signing of Declaration of

Independence, and original copies of early American books added interest to the setting. Dining table was covered with a yellow damask cloth which belonged to Mr. Weiler's grandmother and is over 100 years old. Interesting appointments were an antique mortar and pestle and a heavy smoothing-iron made by Mrs. Sewell's ancestors. Mrs. Fred Widmoyer was program leader. sented meditation on "The Kingdom of God Is Eternal." Four high school students presented the program. Steve Streich, a sophomore and young pianist of note, played the "First Movement of a Sonata" (Haydn) for fine arts number. Mrs. Bertha McDonald, teacher of history, government and world affairs in IPHS, introduced three students who presented the program "Our Responsibility as Citizens of a Changing America."

Comette Collins spoke on "I Am Proud of My American Heritage." She aroused interest by asking "What kind of an American are you?" and "How do you react to seeing the flag or hearing the national anthem?" Robert Watson's topic was "The Challenges That Face American Youth in a Changing World." He introduced his talk with the American Creed and continued to discuss four "musts" facing youth in the fight to preserve their heritage. These are: must become stronger Americans, must settle certain issues such as government monopoly and inflation and labor laws and enforcement, must answer certain moral problems such as juvenile delinquency and murder and alcoholism and low moral standards, must practice Christianity.

Gerry Galloway gave the topic "What Lies Ahead?" She recited the Communist Party's commandments and warned that many college students are educators were turning to Communism. "Christianity is the root to the greatness of America. The communists dream of demoralizing America within a few years, and the only hope for our Country is for people rightly to relate themselves to God."

His subject was "Grooming Plants and Preparing Soil for Fall." In discussing mulching and watering, he said plants and lawns should be checked every two weeks during the winter to see if they need watering.

He said plants are often over-protected. They need to get cold and stay that way. During extreme cold weather, he advised covering the plants, but said it is necessary to remove covering as soon as the sun shines out.

Smith said now is a good time to plant rose bushes; trees should be planted after Thanksgiving. He said plants can be pruned at any time of year except for roses and crepe myrtle. Pruning of roses should start the last of February.

Judges for the Evening club will be Mmes. China B. Smith, Chauncey Weiler, Homer Blalock. Serving for the Noon Lions will be Gwyn Moore, Sherry Gillham and Lion George R. Huckaby.

The two sets of judges will determine the clubs' entries in the international contest.

The contest is open to all who are 14 years of age and under 22 as of Jan. 15, 1967. It was initiated to generate an awareness and understanding of peace among tomorrow's leaders.

It will release the ideas of a cross-section of the world's youth on the most pressing challenge facing the world today.

The contest offers a grand prize of \$25,000 in the form of an educational grant and/or career assistance grant to the world win-

ner. A grand total of \$50,000 in awards will be made.

There will be 3 world division semi-finalist prizes of \$1000 plus travel expenses to Chicago, Ill., in July 1967. At that time the first prize winner will be chosen from the group.

More than 20,000 local, district and multiple-district awards will be made.

The contest is one of the highlights of the 50th anniversary of Lions International, and it is the largest Peace Essay Contest in the world.

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
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First Baptists Welcome
