The Iowa Park Hawks again demonstrated their supremacy over the Burk Burnett Bulldogs in a district clash last Friday night in Fair Park auditorium. The Hawks scored 39 points while holding the Burk lads to 30. The game was cleanly played and well officiated.

Coach Clarence Warren was apparently pretty well pleased with his boys' efforts. After the game he had lost that tense expression and let his smile shine forth.

In the meantime the Quana Indians were taking care of the little matter of a three-way tie. They soundly thumped the Electra Tigers on the Indian stomping grounds and threw the conference race into only a dual draw. Iowa Park and Quana are co-leaders with two losses each.

If the Hawks beat Seymour at the Panthers' lair Friday night and twist the Electra Tigers' tail here next Tuesday night, while Quana manages to dispose of Seymour and Burk, it will necessitate a playoff for the title.

Both the Hawks and the Indians have lost two games, one to the other and both a game to Electra. Seymour and Burk are knotted for the cellar with no chance of even tying for the district crown.

While Electra's chances are slim, they still have a chance. If Burk should unseat Quana, and if Iowa Park should win from Seymour and lose to Electra, the district race would be concluded in a three way tie for leadership.

But Burk's chances of upsetting the high flying Indians are slim, and also slim are the chances of Electra's beating the Hawks in their home domain. The Electra court is smaller and that will surely make a difference in the style of play that will take place in the Fair auditorium next Tuesday.

The All Stars avenged an earlier defeat at the hands of the Sheppard AFB Medics last Saturday night in Fair Park auditorium by whipping the Pillrollers 48 to 39. It was a much closer ball game than the final score would indicate, as the All Stars were forced to come from behind in the final canto to overhaul the Medics.

You and your Congress

Battle lines are forming in Congress on proposals to get a federal foot in the state unemployment compensation door. It promises to be a multi-million dollar battle—tax dollars, that is.

Foremost is a bill (S.2504) by Sen. Moody (D-Mich), under which the federal government could match 50 per cent of state unemployment compensation payments.

Michigan is experiencing unemployment caused by diversion of materials from automotive and certain other industries to defense production. Prior to introduction of the bill, a similar though broader program of federal aid was being advocated by the UAW, CIO, whose heaviest membership concentration is in Michigan.

Unemployment compensation is now paid exclusively by the states, which finance it entirely from special taxes on employers.

Supporters of the federal aid program argue:

1. Defense production is causing serious unemployment in some industrial areas.
2. Much of that unemployment is among workers with skills essential to the defense program and, therefore, alleviation of their unemployment difficulties is part of defense program costs.
3. State compensation payments are inadequate and to pay too little to employees idled in the national interest is to impose on them "an inequitable share of the burden of the defense program."

Supporters of this federal aid program estimate it would cost about \$200 million a year. Opponents point out that unemployment compensation by all states cost nearly \$1.4 billion in 1950. Thus, if defense program unemployment is to increase this year the federal bill on a 50 per cent matching basis would be closer to \$1 billion.

Opponents of the program also argue:

1. The Moody bill provides for federal payments to a state where the governor and the U.S. Labor department agree there are areas of unemployment caused by defense conversion. But the federal payments would go to all unemployed persons in the state, not just those in the distress areas.
2. An increasing complaint from the so-called distress areas is that growing numbers of workers displaced by the defense program are exhausting their benefits periods. Yet the Moody bill makes no provision or recommendation for extending benefits periods. So it overlooks a major part of the problem it is supposed to solve.
3. The Moody program would obstruct the accepted practice of holding unemployment compensation to levels where it will not encourage idleness, especially import-

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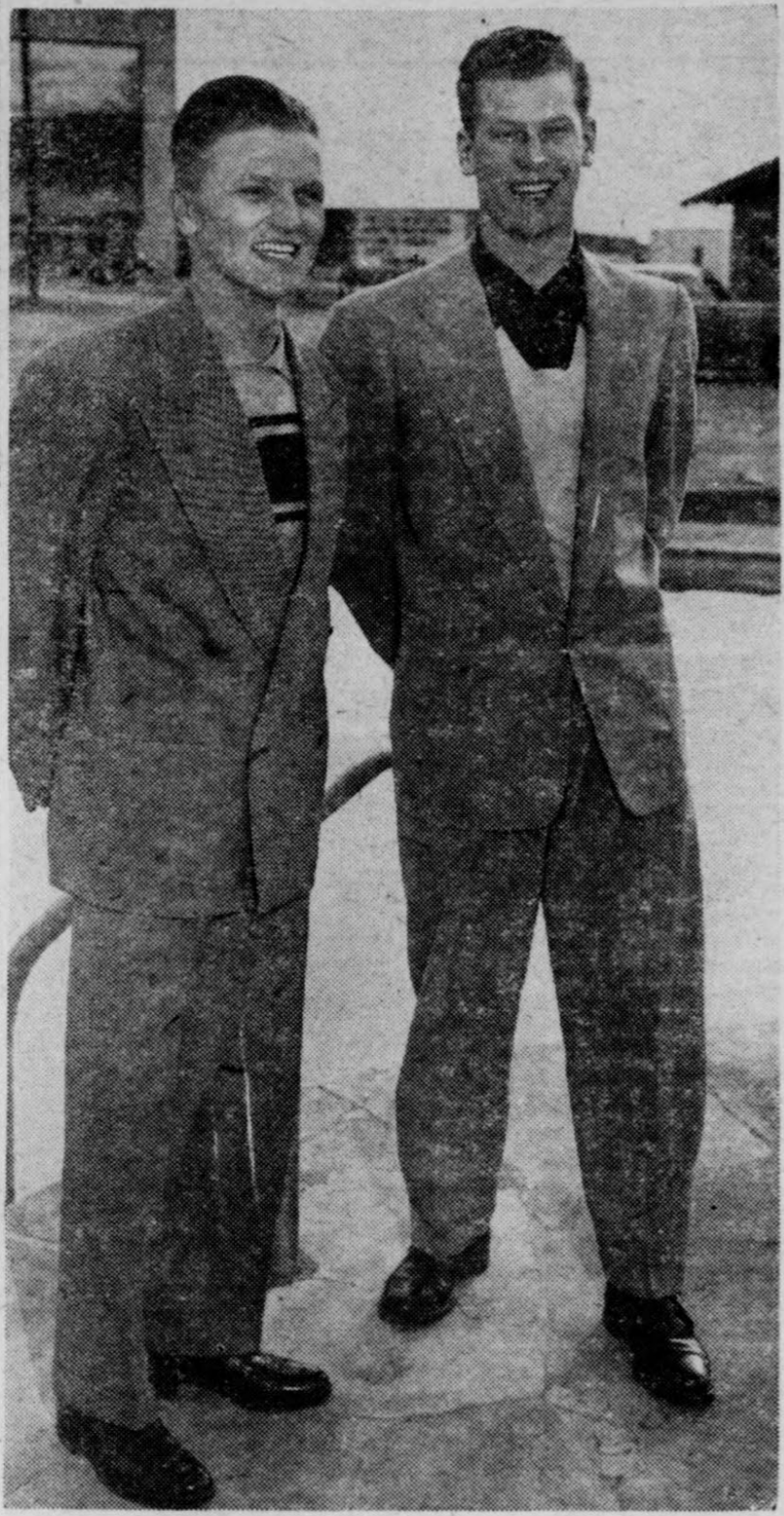
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Miss Kay Burgoyne, Sgt. Childress Wed

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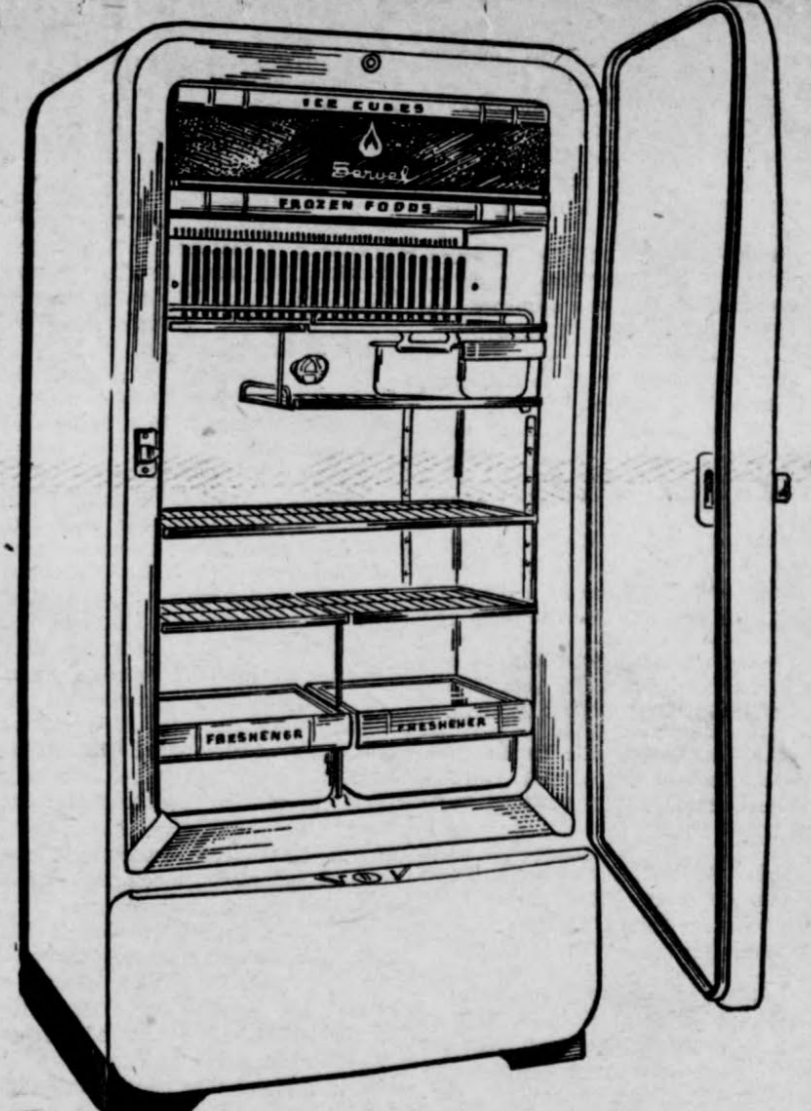
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Cain Family Given Farewell Courtesy

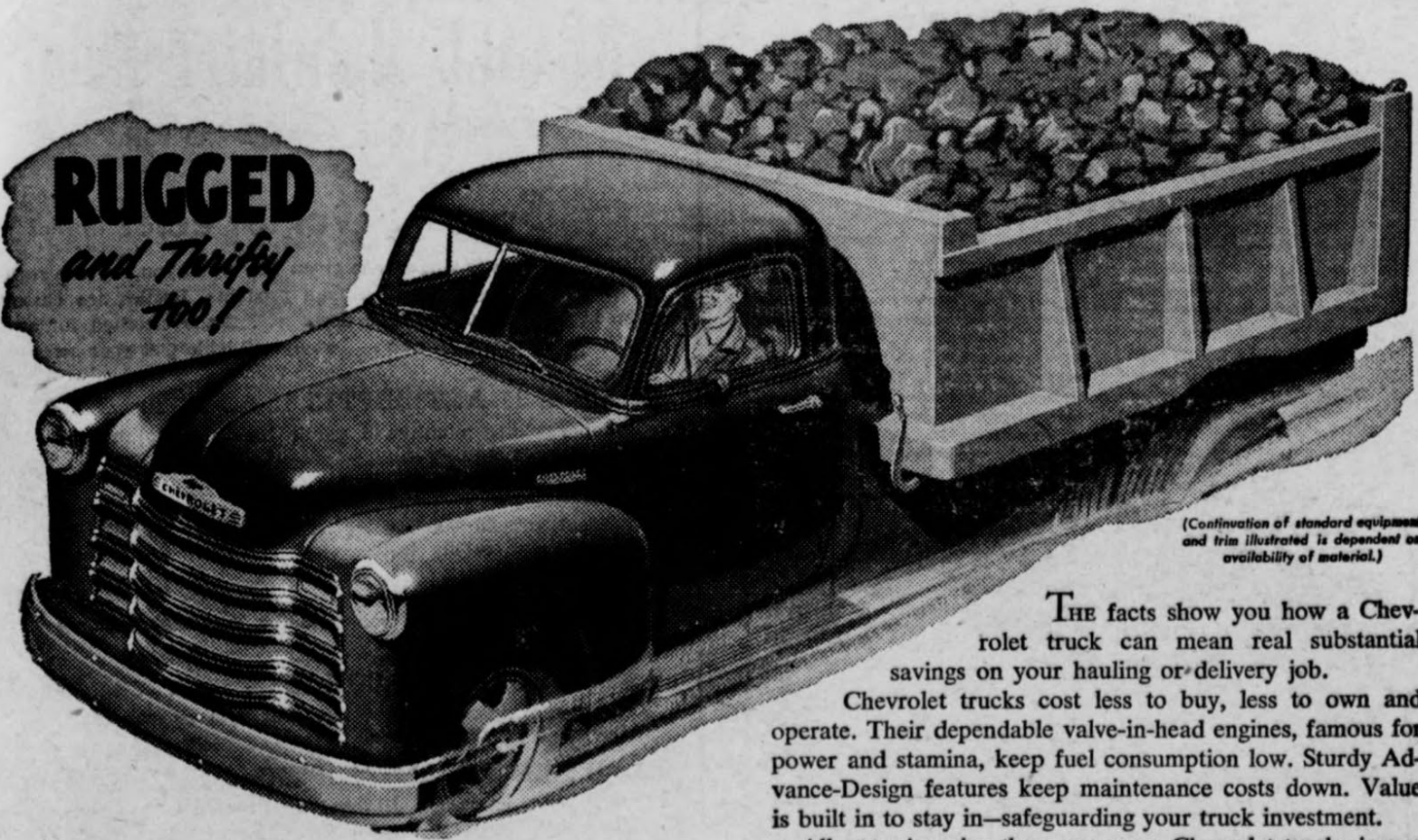
"The Ministry of Prayer" was the theme of the royal service program presented by members of the Mary-Martha circle for a meeting of the Baptist WMS Monday morning.

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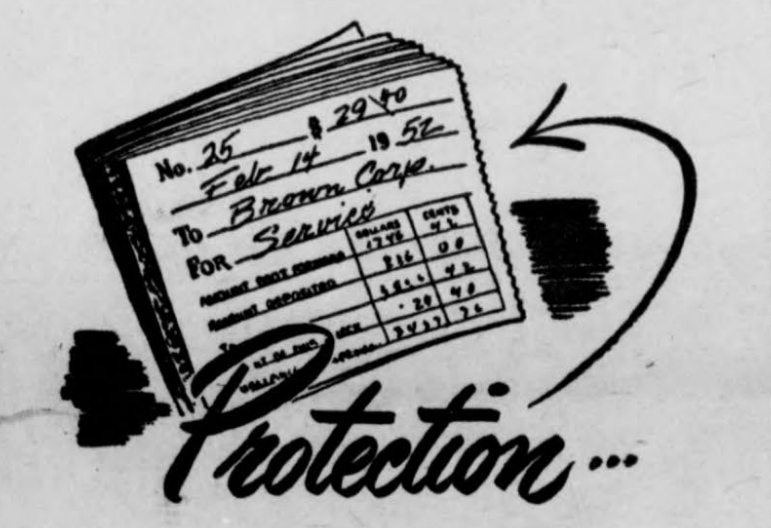
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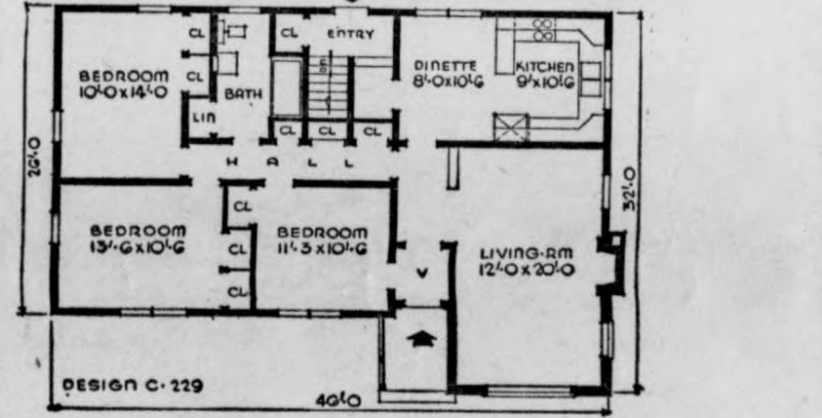
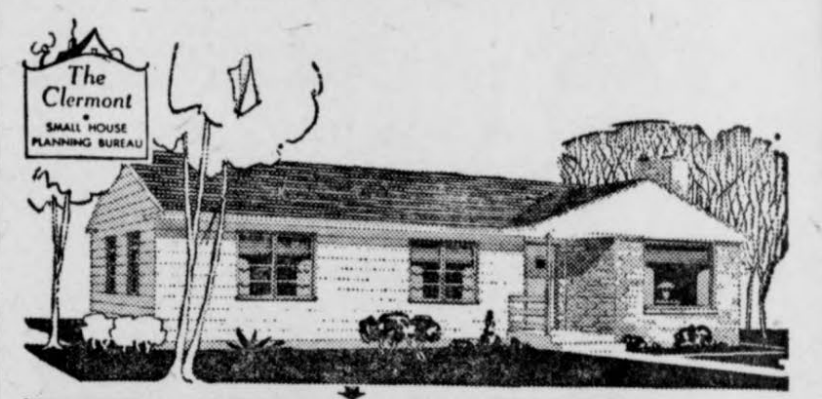
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
