"Decision of the City Council is that if the club will build the swimming pool under the direction and approval of the city engineer and include all facilities pertaining to operation of the pool debt free, the City Council will operate and maintain the swimming pool."

Epsilon Eta chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority has taken the initiative in starting the project. The Chamber of Commerce has gone on record as supporting the project; the Jaycees have expressed interest in the pool; and the Lioness club has adopted the pool for a project.

All other clubs and organizations will be contacted and given opportunity to have a part in building the pool, since it is designed to be a city-wide project.
