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



The town's first school was a one room building on South Yosemite, constructed in 1889.

Baptist, Presbyterian and Christian churches were organized in 1390 and Methodist in 1889.

Records show that on May 29, 1891, there was a petition for an election to be held to incorporate and on June 27, 74 votes for incorporation were cast.

City Council minutes started in 1892. Iowa Park school district was organized in 1891. The bank was organized in 1900. Miss Kidwell described the oil
