Service Held for Mrs. Wilson

Mrs. Recie Lou Fannie Wilson was found dead Monday afternoon at her home, 706 E. Park. Neighbors discovered the body when they became concerned because they had not seen her during the day.

An autopsy revealed death was due to natural causes.
Born April 9, 1890, in Bush Prairie, Ill., she had lived here since April 18, 1955, at which time she was married to the late C. Y. Wilson. She was member of First Baptist church.
Funeral service was conducted Wednesday in Tanner Funeral Home chapel by Rev. Homer W. Thompson. Burial was in Highland cemetery.

Citizenship

It was a special privilege for me to attend the week of Aug. 10-14 the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar at Sam Houston State Teachers college in Huntsville. Our local Farm Bureau sponsored me and two other students from Wichita county, and we were among 350 students at the seminar.

We were welcomed by Dr. Bowers, vice-president of the college, and C. H. DeVaney.

Purpose of this seminar was to convey to students a better understanding of the American system and way of life. There was emphasis on the economic, moral and social aspects of the American society that were envisioned by our forefathers, which have been the basis of the American citizen, in contrast to those countries governed by some form of "ism."

These ideas were conveyed to us through lectures given by Dr. Nicholas Nyaradi, who was born and educated in Hungary and was the former Minister of Finance of the Republic of Hungary; Dr. Clifton L. Ganus, who is president of Harding college in Searcy, Ark.; John Noble, noted author who spent nine years in Soviet Arctic slave camps; Cleo Skousen, noted author and a former FBI agent; and through various films.

The speaker that impressed me most was Noble. He was born in Detroit, Mich., and now lives in Wheaton, Ill. He is a noted author and lecturer dedicated to a public affirmation of the American way of life. During World War II he was trapped in Dresden, Germany, where his father owned a camera factory. In 1945 he was falsely arrested by the Soviets and later deported to the Soviet Arctic slave camps.

Much of his discussion was devoted to a vivid description of his survival of nearly 10 years of brutal Soviet slavery. He made me feel proud to be an American in a country that is free.

I am very thankful to the Iowa Park Farm Bureau for giving me the opportunity to learn more about the great heritage that America has and the many "isms" that are endangering it.

Mexico Caravan

Miss Sue Covington of Iowa Park and Miss Dorcas Scott of Wichita Falls have returned from a caravan to Mexico sponsored by the Central Texas Presbytery. This was the first official caravan offered to high school seniors. The trips are made every other summer.

Eleven young people from Itasca, Abilene, Cisco, Fort Worth, Waco, Wichita Falls and Iowa Park, accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. William Gould jr., left Dallas by Mexican Air Lines. He is assistant general presbyter of Central Texas.

When they arrived in Mexico City they were met by their guides Edson Johnson and Robert Kerr, missionaries to Mexico.

In Mexico City they visited the Pyramids, which depict the religion of primitive Indians; the Alcumen Monastery; and the Shrine of Virgin de Guadalupe, considered a guardian saint of the country.

First day out, the group went by bus to Morelia where they visited the Presbyterian mission hospital and school and sat in on an English class.

They returned to Mexico City for the night and went by bus the next day to Acapulco. They had nice hotel accommodations there and were impressed with seeing the statue of the Virgin of Guadalupe under water.

At Chilpancingo they took on a painting project in the Presbyterian church. They spent three days painting the stairway, windows and back door and waxing the front door. The church folk honored them at a fiesta, and they played games which missionaries had introduced 60 years ago. The fiesta was climaxed with the breaking of the piñata.

While in Chilpancingo, capital of the State of Guerrero, they went to the Capitol and saw the famous mural depicting Spanish history. They also went to the Town Square and heard a concert by the state band of Guerrero.

One of the most primitive sections visited was Chilapa, where the young people attended a lay mission sponsored by the National Church. In this town they saw Indians doing tribal dances, and visited the Presbyterian students' homes.

The caravan proceeded to Iguala and then to Teloloapan. They went to the Presbyterian Bible school for lay workers and to the church farm which teaches agriculture, hygiene, etc.

In Taxco they stayed at another beautiful hotel. The Presbyterian church there has an out-patient clinic for the poor. Places of interest in Taxco are a cathedral built over a silver mine, and the market places.

Back in Mexico City before boarding a plane for Texas, they toured the cultural center for boys and the home for girls who attend the University of Mexico. They also visited the Presbyterian seminary.

Members of the caravan will meet Sept. 11 in Ft. Worth to exchange slides and notes in preparation for lectures they will give in Presbyterian churches throughout central Texas.

Following a trip to Colorado, the couple will live in Iowa Park and will enroll in Midwestern university.


