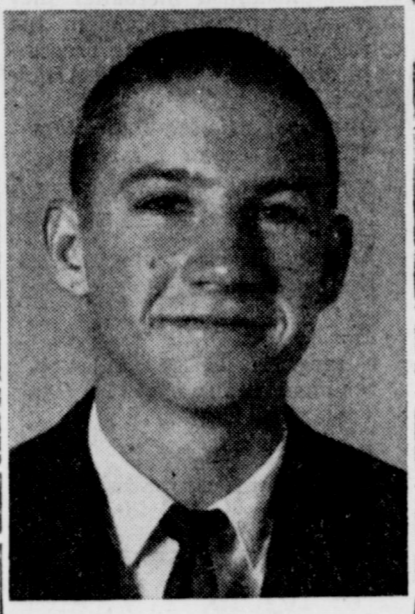

Lance was presented the chapter scholarship award for having the highest grade average of all students enrolled in vocational agriculture at Gold-Burg high. He is vice-president of the class and vice-president of FFA chapter. He was chosen Beau of the Future Homemakers of America there.

Spruiell has an average of 92.18 for four years of high school and has earned 21 solid credits.

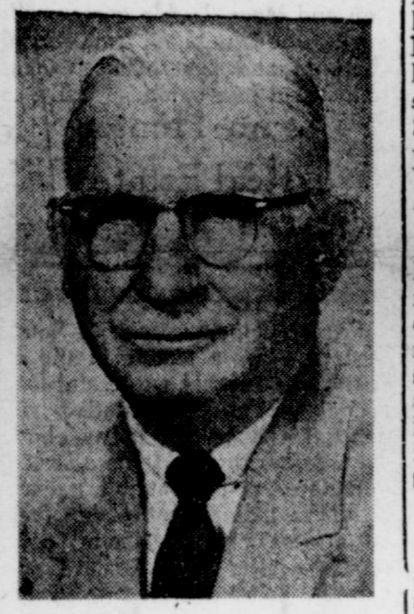

Mrs. Reaves to Retire

"I believe the school is for the students," Mrs. S. B. Reaves, a veteran school teacher, stated as she announced plans for retirement.

She has gone to school and into the classroom with that thought uppermost in her mind for 45 years, and that is possibly the key to her success and popularity as a teacher. Through the years she has had a minimum of discipline problems and complaints from parents and patrons.

Having taught sixth grade most of the time, students in the lower grades have looked forward to being in her room. Those who have been under her tutelage have likewise been anxious for their younger kin to have the same privilege.

Reaction of former students to Mrs. Reaves' retirement is a high compliment to her competence as teacher and friend. Most of them express their sentiments in the same words, almost as if they had been rehearsed: "But, Mrs. Reaves, you can't retire until my younger brother (or sister) gets through the sixth grade!"

She has also been a great source of inspiration to teachers with whom she has taught. Her calmness, down-to-earth philosophy, ability to think clearly and to keep a level head in frustrating situations, eagerness to give students the benefit of the doubt and a second chance have been steady influences to her co-workers.

Mrs. Reaves, the former Grace Mills, is daughter of the late George Mills, who came to Iowa Park in the late 19th century, and Annie Mae Harp. Her father was a prominent business man here for many years.

Grace was graduated from Iowa Park High School and received a BS degree from West Texas State university in Canyon. She has done graduate work in University of Colorado, University of Denver, and Texas Tech.

Her teaching career began in Deep Creek school southwest of town, now consolidated with Iowa Park school. She taught there two years, in Iowa Park 11 years; and was principal of Valley View elementary school 14 years. Eighteen years ago she resumed teaching in Iowa Park elementary. When Kidwell school was built in 1959 she was assigned there to teach sixth grade.

Mrs. Reaves' formula for successful teaching is: to make the lives of students a part of the teacher's life; to have young ideas; to listen intently; and to have a genuine love for young people and the profession.

Mrs. Reaves is member of First Baptist church, where she taught in Intermediate department for many years. She is member of Althean class and Night WMS.

Mr. and Mrs. Reaves live at 311 W. Alameda. He is employed at Sheppard AFB and will retire soon. Both of them enjoy traveling, so they probably will spend part of their time in that way after he retires. A vacation trip to Colorado this summer is already on their schedule.

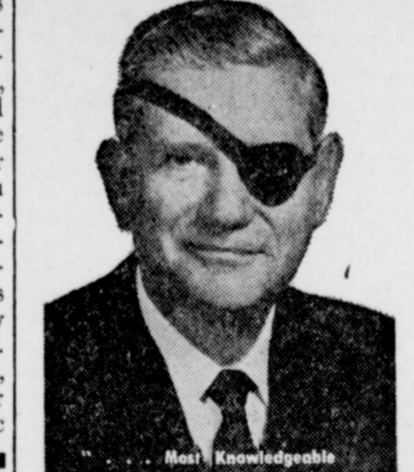

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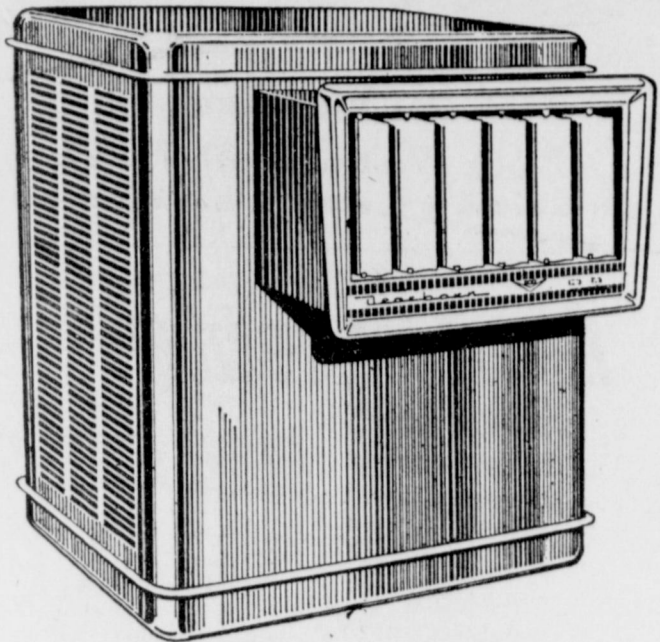

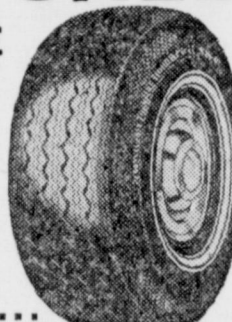

"And if all this is not man's purpose, then I do not wish to know what men's purpose is."

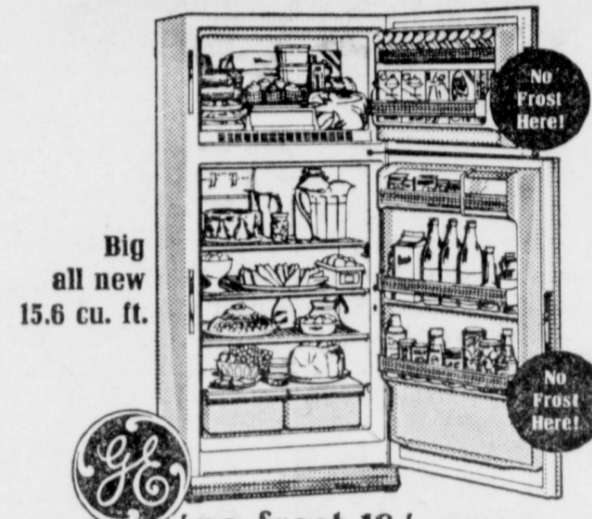
