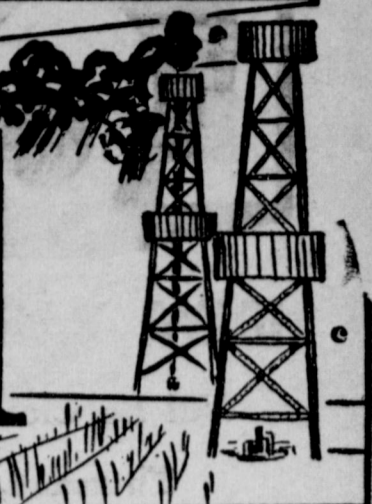

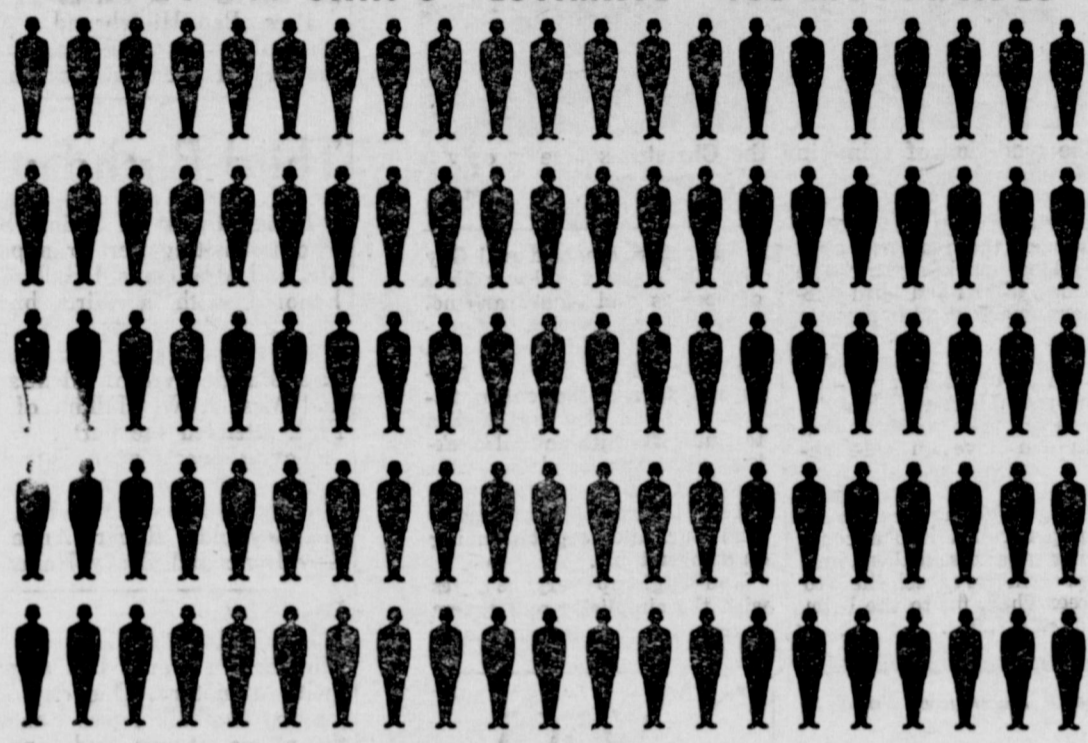

OPERATION "DEATHWATCH" DEC. 24 thru JAN. 3 ESTIMATE 105 MOTORCIDES



The figures above represent the estimated toll of 105 lives expected to be lost in Texas traffic accidents during the 11-day holiday period from December 24 through January 3. During this period, the Texas Department of Public Safety will tabulate these tragedies as they occur and make periodic releases in an effort to focus public attention on the added dangers of holiday travel. A special appeal has been issued to Texans to do their part in proving the estimate is too high.

Students Decorate Rooms With Artistic Imagination

The poetess wrote "Christmas is made of so many things all lovely and gay and bright..."

Somehow, this writer had a fresh appreciation of those words after visiting the three elementary school and junior and senior high to feast her eyes on the beautiful room and door decorations.

I went first to the north wing of Kidwell school where Miss Ethel Kidwell, principal, escorted me down the corridors and into some of the rooms to glimpse the decorations created by room mothers, teachers and pupils.

How I wish I could describe each door in this school! It is impossible, of course, but each is truly worthy of special mention.

Mrs. C. L. McKinnon's second grade room has one of the most unusual doors. Covered with red, it is centered with a green cookie tree; each homemade cookie bears the name of a student. The tree inside the room is decorated with plastic wrapped cookies in Christmas symbols and animal shapes.

Mrs. Delbert Todd's door is quite pleasing with its keynote of simplicity. Three medium sized angels fashioned of Reader's Digest magazines and sprayed silver provide just the right contrast on the dark blue door cover.

Mrs. Joy Ringo has a white flocked tree in her room. Perhaps it is the many tiny felt symbols scattered over the Christmas green door and large candy cane in the center which adds enchantment to the door of Mrs. Joyce Allen's room.

In the south wing, Mrs. Bill Curry's fifth grade room has a door strikingly done in red and gold. The tree is made of gold wire and decorated with plastic figures, greenery and satin balls. Below the tree is a row of gingerbread men.

"A Rocket Ship to Toyland" is the theme of Mrs. John Sibley's first grade room door. It has eye appeal to adults as well as to children. The dark blue background makes the silver rocket ship manned by astronauts and occupied by children even more conspicuous. Destination is Toyland in the Sky.

Herman Escue's 7th grade door cannot escape the eye because of its frame of twinkling lights intermingled in white angel hair. Gold ceramic angels hover over a realistic ceramic manger scene, a separate piece attached to the door. Blue and gold are colors stressed in decorations.

Mrs. Leta Gage's 7-4 room door is an inducement for students to enter the classroom. Decorations stress the traditional red, green and white colors. Covered with green, it has a large styrofoam Santa, two large canes and words "Merry Christmas" in red and white.

Doors at high school were to be judged Wednesday afternoon. Results and descriptions will be carried in next week's paper.

Two large styrofoam candles trimmed with white net ruffles and glittered ribbon, and the Merry Christmas greeting in white glittered letters against a red background give a Christmasy air to Mrs. Jeffe Ross's 5th grade room door that cannot go unnoticed.

Teachers and room mothers at Bradford school chose to decorate the foyer instead of the doors. A large brilliantly decorated tree stands near the front entrance. Across the foyer in the glassed-in wall case are a large Santa Claus, a red net Christmas tree, and numerous other symbols of the season.

Decorations in Iowa Park elementary school:

Mrs. J. C. Roby's third grade room door immediately gives the impression of the unusual. Close scrutiny reveals that it is the dark green tree with its macaroon decorations sprayed dark green, against the red background which achieves such a pleasing effect. Small gift-wrapped packages have been placed on the door near the tree.

Door to Mrs. Irne Eddins' sixth grade room reflects much originality and planning. A large head of Rudolph, the famous reindeer, has horns made of tree limbs, marks the upper right hand corner of the door. On the left beneath stands an elf in the act of painting Rudolph's nose — red.

Mrs. Faris Nowell's fifth grade room has a door characterized by simplicity and dignity. Covered with dark blue, it is outlined with holly. Central decoration is a light blue angel, and colorful symbols are scattered over the door.

Doors in junior high were decorated by students, and each door attests to their talents.

Door of Room 8-4, where Gerald Combs is home room teacher, was decorated to depict the true meaning of Christmas. Stained glass window effect in the center features the baby Jesus, Mary and Joseph with the sheep in the manger. Different shades of blue and pink in the picture are in sharp contrast to the gold background.

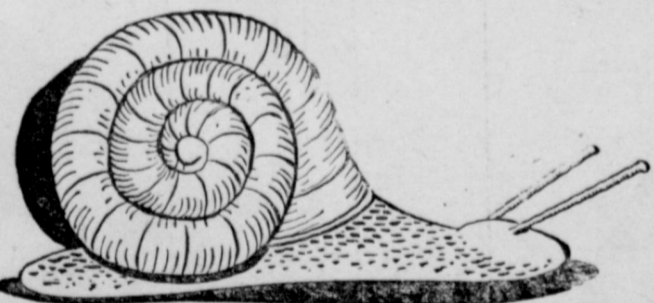
