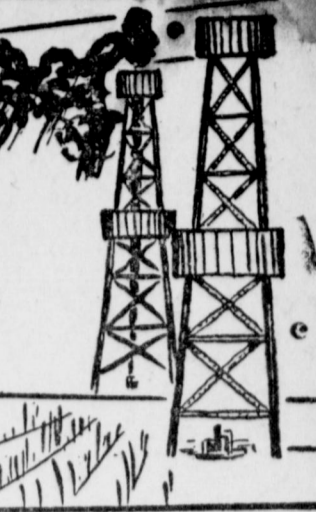

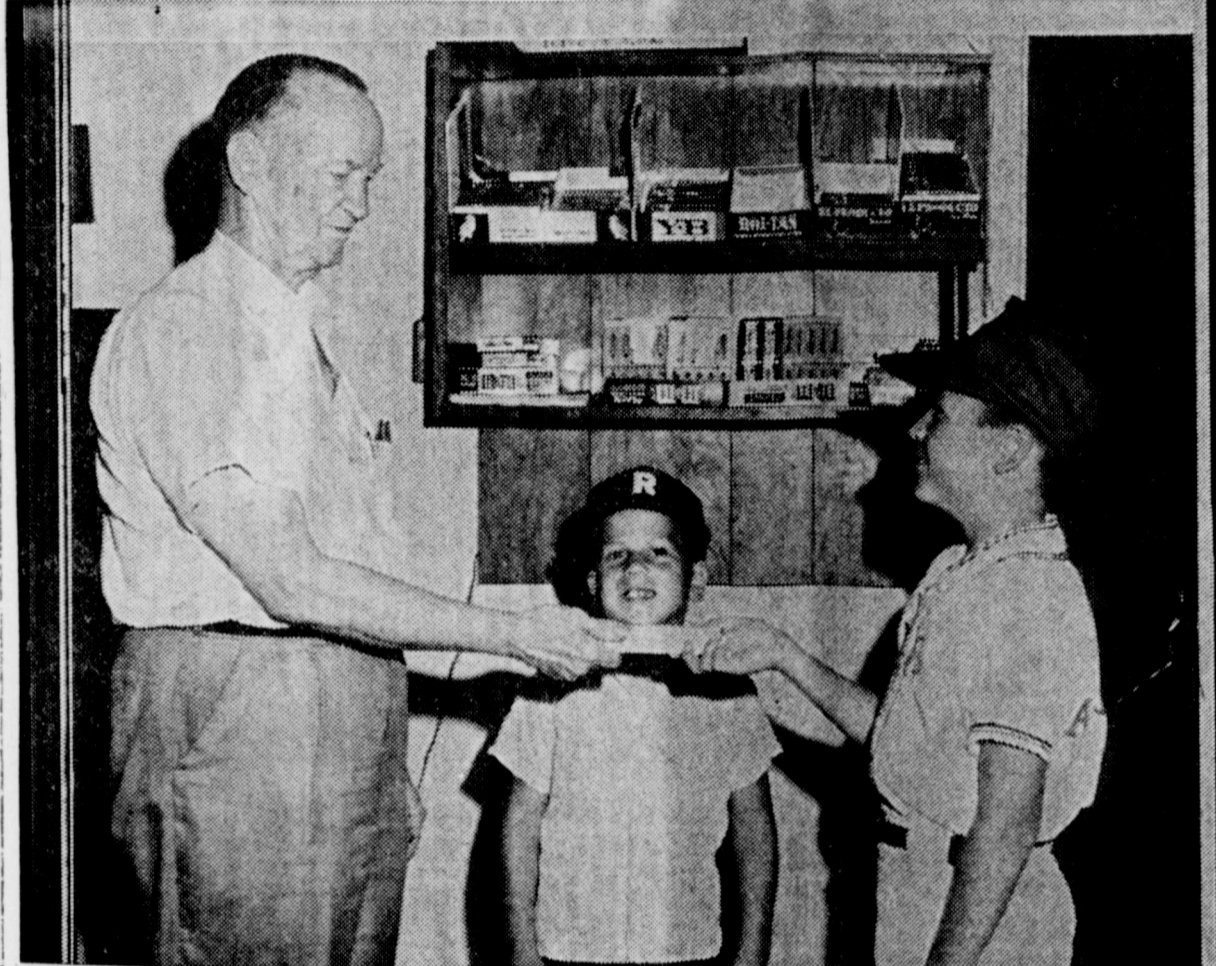

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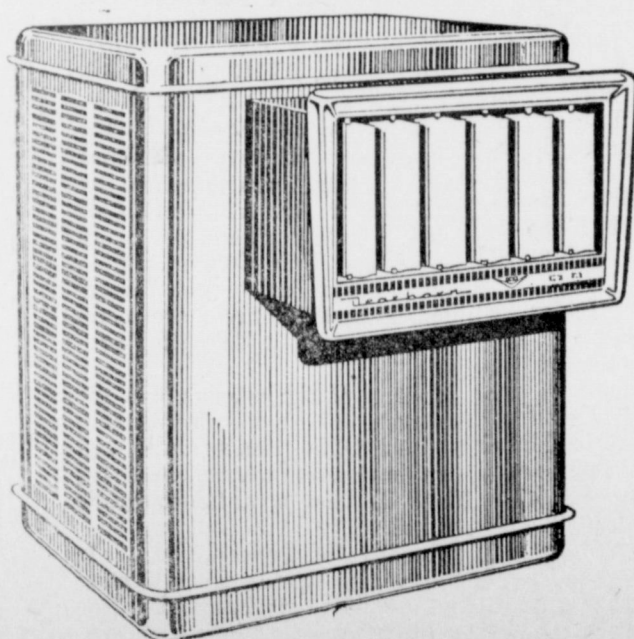

## Better Boating

### Check Your Ventilation System

More than 1,000,000 boat-owners will be affected by the new U.S. Coast Guard regulations on ventilation.

Effective June 1, 1966, all boat compartments containing an engine or fuel tank must have "at least one exhaust duct installed as to extend from the open atmosphere to the lower portion of the bilge, and at least one intake duct installed so as to extend to a point at least midway to the bilge or at least below the level of the carburetor intake."

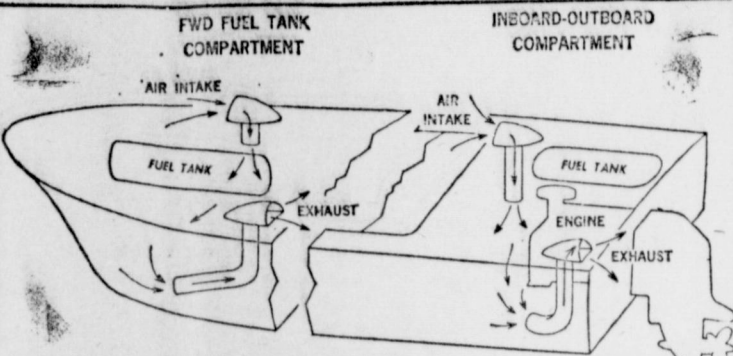
The regulations also specify "cowls or their equivalent... to be located and trimmed from maximum effectiveness and in such manner as to prevent displaced fumes from being recirculated."

Only boats with both engine and fuel compartments open to the atmosphere will not require ventilating ducts and cowls.

Coast Guard officials in Washington, D.C., warn that the new regulations will be rigidly enforced.

"After June 1, Coast Guard boarding officers have orders to issue citations to all boat-owners whose equipment does not meet these requirements," they said.

Now is a good time to check out your boat's ventilation system, whether you plan to do the work yourself or have it done. One of the biggest marine hardware manufacturers in the country, Perko, has just introduced a new line of ventilation hardware—ventilators, blower systems and flexible ducts—designed to make it easy to comply with the new regulations on all types of installations. Other manufacturers are planning to introduce similar equipment.



**NEW COAST GUARD RULES:** Effective June 1, 1966, Coast Guard rules require all boat compartments containing an engine or fuel tank to include at least one ventilating exhaust duct from the open atmosphere to the lower portion of the bilge and at least one intake duct to extend at least midway to the bilge or at least to the level of the carburetor intake. Duct cowls or their equivalent must be located for "maximum effectiveness" and to prevent displaced fumes from being recirculated.

The Coast Guard regulations outline only the minimum ventilation safety requirements. Ventilation requirements recommended by the National Fire Protection Association are even more extensive. Before you start on your modification it's a good idea to check with your marine insurance agent.

A good safety idea for the boatman is the Yacht Doctor first aid kit by Trident Marine which includes 19 different medical items you might need in an emergency at sea. The kit can't rust, will float and can be reused after it has been opened.

Official records for 1964 show that 97% of the boatmen who drowned in mishaps afloat were not wearing life preservers or other life saving devices.

The Coast Guard considers a life jacket for each person aboard a boat the most important item of emergency equipment. They should be readily accessible...and worn at all times by non-swimmers and by everyone when danger lurks.

There is a wide range of Coast Guard-approved life jackets and vests to choose from, depending on the size of your boat and your needs. But the Coast Guard does not approve ski belts...and safety experts frown upon "Mee West" type inflatable life vests which demand inspection, care and maintenance.

U.S. Coast Guard-approved life saving devices made of expanded polyvinyl chloride foam offer many advantages over kapok-filled equipment. Safety jackets and vests, produced by GenTex Corporation and other marine manufacturers are easy to put on in an emergency, comfortable to wear, simple to clean and are designed to turn the wearer face up at the proper floatation angle even if he's stunned or unconscious.

A new line of weatherproof marine furnishings has been introduced by McCallion Marine for boats that are big enough for furniture. Called the Flagship Line, it can be cleaned with a hose and is guaranteed weatherproof for five years.

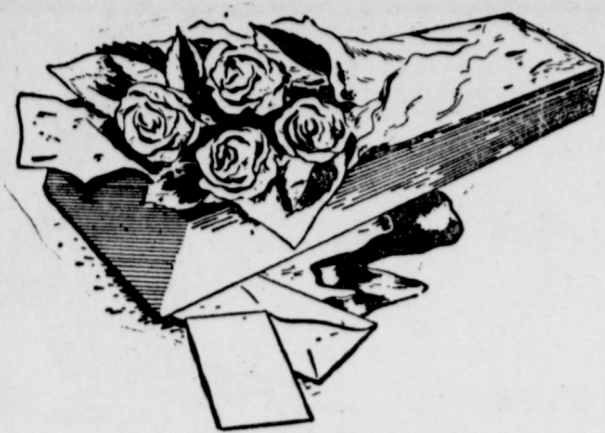

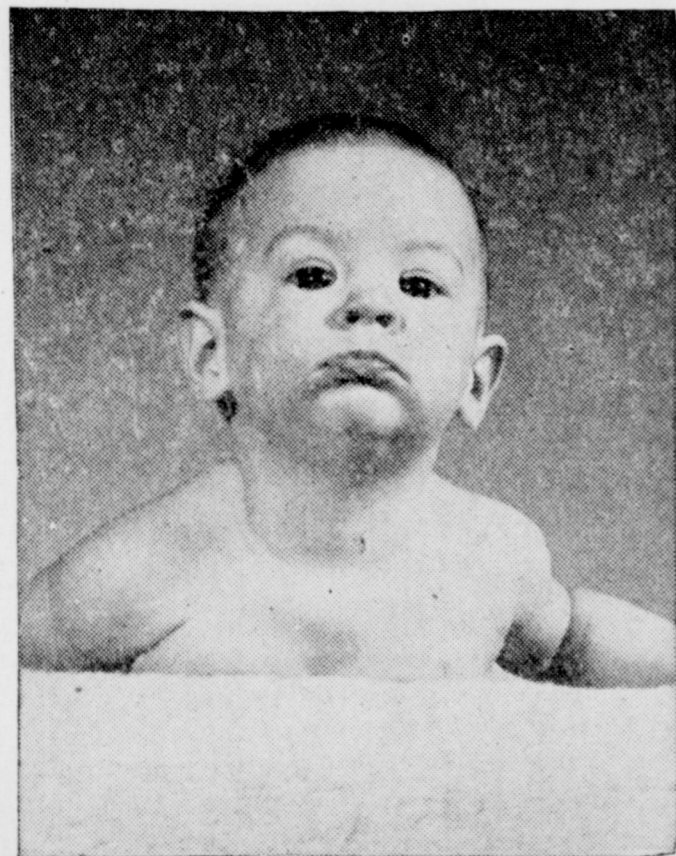

Due to the Federal Court's ultimatum, your Texas Legislature was forced to re-district. The old 30th District I have represented for nearly 14 years has been greatly enlarged — 300 miles across.

This job of State Senator belongs to you, the people, not to me or any other candidate. The whole object of filling this post is that you elect the person best able to serve you—not necessarily the most popular, best known and certainly not just the one who can spend the most money in a campaign.

I wish very much to see and visit personally with everyone, and will do so, as much as is humanly possible.

However, the huge size of our district, very limited money resources and the work and responsibility my Seniority places on me limit this personal contact, by me, quite severely.

I sincerely request you to examine my record, satisfy yourself and help me spread the word to others.

I am a farmer, stockman, and small businessman, 41 years of age; have been active in church, lodge, civic work and farm and veterans organizations. My wife, myself, two daughters and one son are native West Texans, of the area including our Senate district. I served three years in the United States Army during World War II and have seven years of college—Texas A & M and the University of Texas.

It is dangerous in our State Legislature not to be a "go along to get along" person. It is dangerous to speak loudly and firmly against some big officeholders when you do not agree with them 100% of the time or oppose some of their programs you believe harmful to your District or State. It is dangerous to seek to really stop pollution of our surface and ground waters. It is, perhaps, even more dangerous to raise your voice against corruption in high places when it arises or to oppose the great out-of-state owned corporations which have so much power in Austin—those who seek to evade their fair share of taxes and seek to shift an even greater burden to the worker, farmer and Texas-owned businesses.

Andy Rogers has done all of these and therefore is on their list for extermination.

When I first ran for the State Senate in 1952—there was then a great hue and cry to clean up the "mess in Washington." I was an oddity among candidates, THEN, as I charged that "Austin is as rotten as Washington" and that "moral integrity is needed most."

I further demanded a law to require state officials and legisla-

tors to file for public record, a statement showing their income and its source.

This wasn't, and still isn't, the way to be very popular in Austin and certain other circles.

A few months later the led blew off.

I have authored and passed legislation against obscene, dirty literature, pep pills and narcotics.

Yes, I have made many good friends among those who work for the interests of our District. I have also made many good enemies of those selfish minority blocs whose interests conflict with those of our District.

In two of my more recent races they have used every trick; deceit, slanderous anonymous mail and threats to me and my closest friends.

During this race they have, so far at least, been more subtle. But their money and power behind my opponents become more obvious each day.

This is not to say that my two opponents would employ or use these tactics—they both seem like nice guys—but they don't have to use them—some others will gladly and freely do this for them if they think it will work.

These methods of deceit, etc., have been perfected to an art. And as has been said, "the perfection of art is to conceal art." But look closely—it is obvious they are at work—not necessarily because all of them love my opponents, but because they seek to destroy and old and proven enemy, Andy Rogers.

Meanwhile, my opponents readily seek and accept campaign money from various ones of these enemies of the people.

I and my family and some friends have suffered economically, socially and politically at the hands of some powerful lobbyists and others. But, I have not run from them in the past—I will not do so now, or in the future.

### ISSUES

1. So the first real issue in this race for the 30th Senate District post is: Can those who deceive the people and try to manipulate the Legislature and other state officials to their advantage, finally succeed with their tactics and limitless money?

2. In Wichita Falls, the main population center of our district, a group there, several of their number extremely wealthy, pretty well control their city and county. Now they intend to control your Senate representation in Austin. Recently, a banker, and very rich oilman, among their number called a "SECRET" meeting in Wichita Falls to rant and rave how horrible Andy Rogers was and to raise money for one of his opponents. He didn't bother with the facts. MORE IMPORTANT, he didn't tell why he was really against me.

The truth is that in 1959 your then Senator George Moffett and other leaders in Wichita Falls asked me to sponsor a law creating a pollution authority to control oil field pollution as Wichita Falls HAD to seek a new water supply and the proposed new lake would be worthless until firm pollution control was initiated.

I passed this bill for Wichita Falls and neighboring towns and it has brought wonderful results.

But the banker and oil man who called the "SECRET" meeting did not explain how he had been and still is considered one of the worst violators of pollution control.

Most of our oilmen, including the major companies have co-operated wonderfully with the pollution authority—but not this gentleman.

He regularly contacts our legislators and other state officials to try to destroy the pollution authority. He is regularly known to be one of the major political contributors to candidates on every political level.

Shall we let him destroy Andy Rogers, who passed the bill to protect our water for all our citizens?

3. The "Iron-Curtain press." In my 13 consecutive years in politics I have never encountered any news-media as slanted and biased as the Wichita Falls newspaper.

They have persisted in making "news" for their favorite son and denied every opportunity possible to let their readers know there are even other candidates running.

They have so arrogantly and flagrantly denied the public of its

4. Seniority. If a candidate has a voting record to please most of the voters, the next most important thing in his ability to represent them, is his Seniority.

Seniority in our Senate is the most important factor in determining which committee a Senator will serve on and the ones of which he will be chairman—and therefore his ability to serve.

Nothing else can take the place of experience and Seniority—it can't be purchased at the Supermarket or acquired by taking a pill.

This job belongs to the people, not me or any other candidate.

The people of our area have an 18-year investment in the experience and seniority of Andy Rogers. To elect either of his opponents would mean at least a 12-year wait to again have another Senator with this important asset.

Should the voters throw away this most valuable asset they already own?

There are many other subjects I would like to discuss, but I will close by saying it has been privilege to co-author and work for the bill that made Midwestern a four-year state-supported school, to co-author and work for the bill that changed the name of West Texas State to a University and to have had a vital role in the efforts to place Texas Tech where it stands today.

Yes, check my record — ASK THOSE WHO KNOW.

Andy Rogers' long record of service for the people of our area is clear. You can know where he stands — while many have been known to falter and will in the terrible heat and pressure of the jungle of Austin politics.

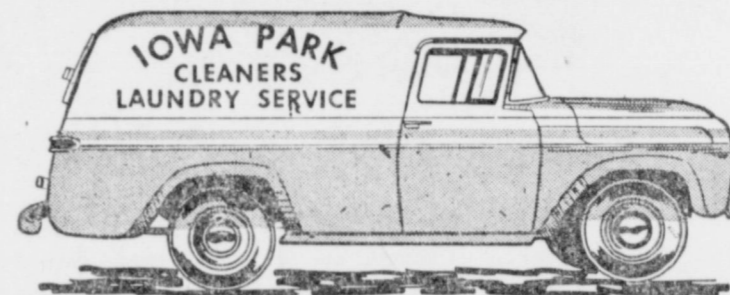

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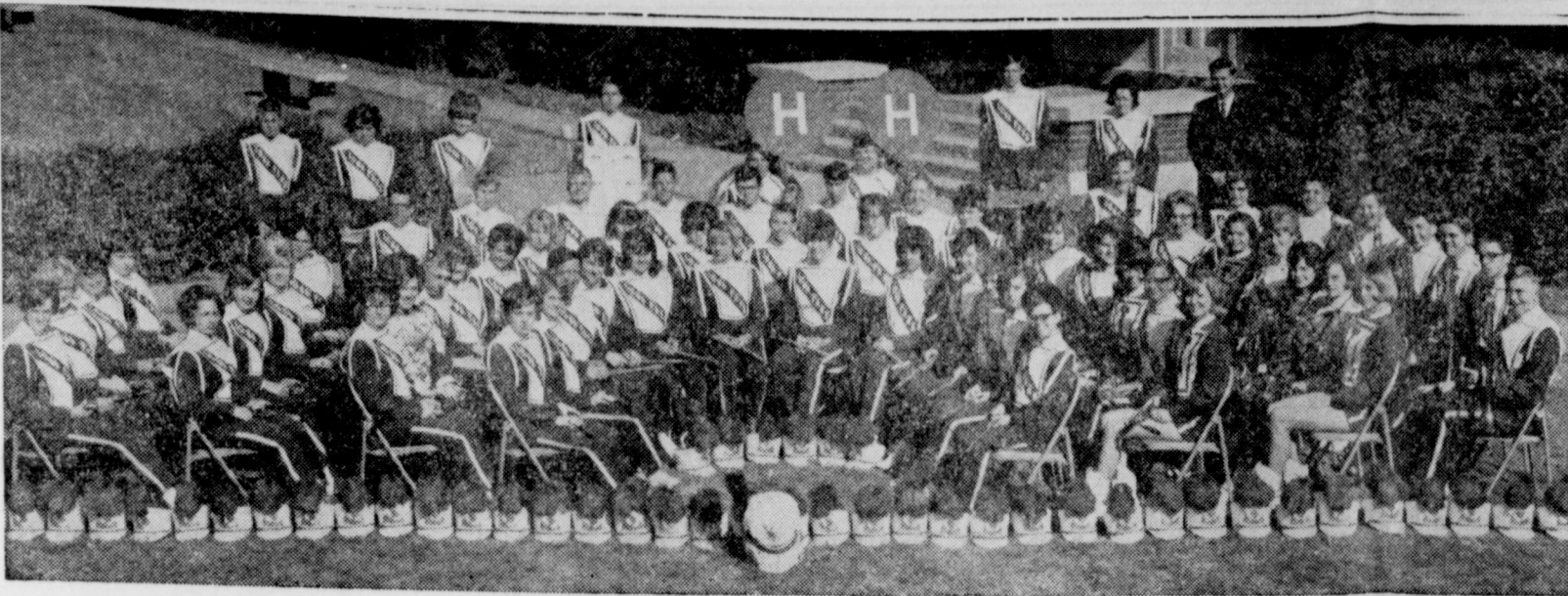


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### Hawk Band Ranked High in Concert Playing and Sight Reading

### Postal Savings Abolished

Postal savings system was abolished March 27. No more deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened.

All certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond 3 months from the interest date.

Unpaid deposits remaining in the post office beyond June 30, 1967, will be transferred to the Treasury department in a trust fund and will be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.

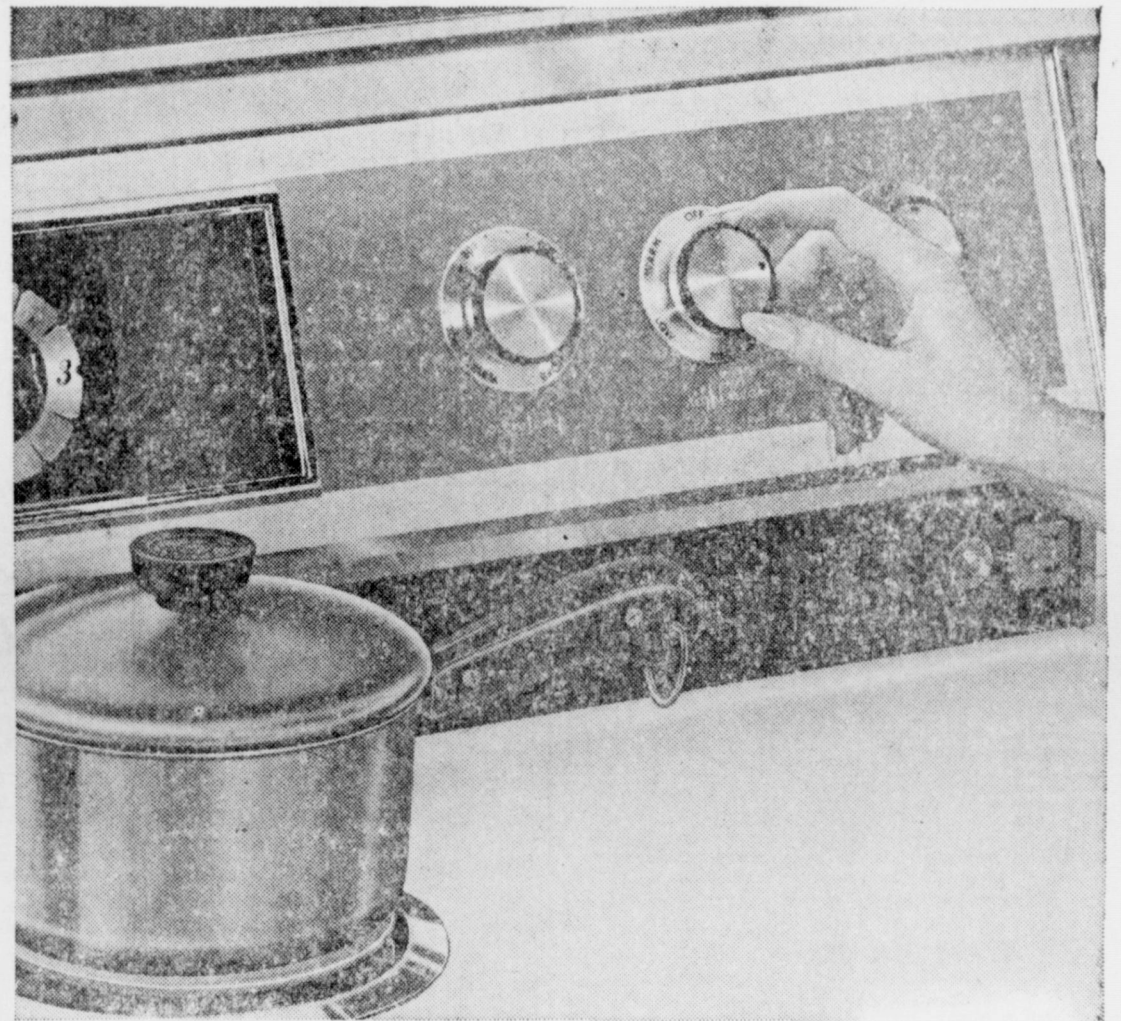


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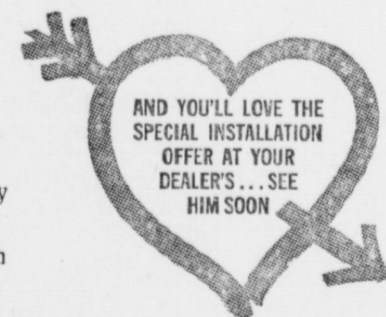

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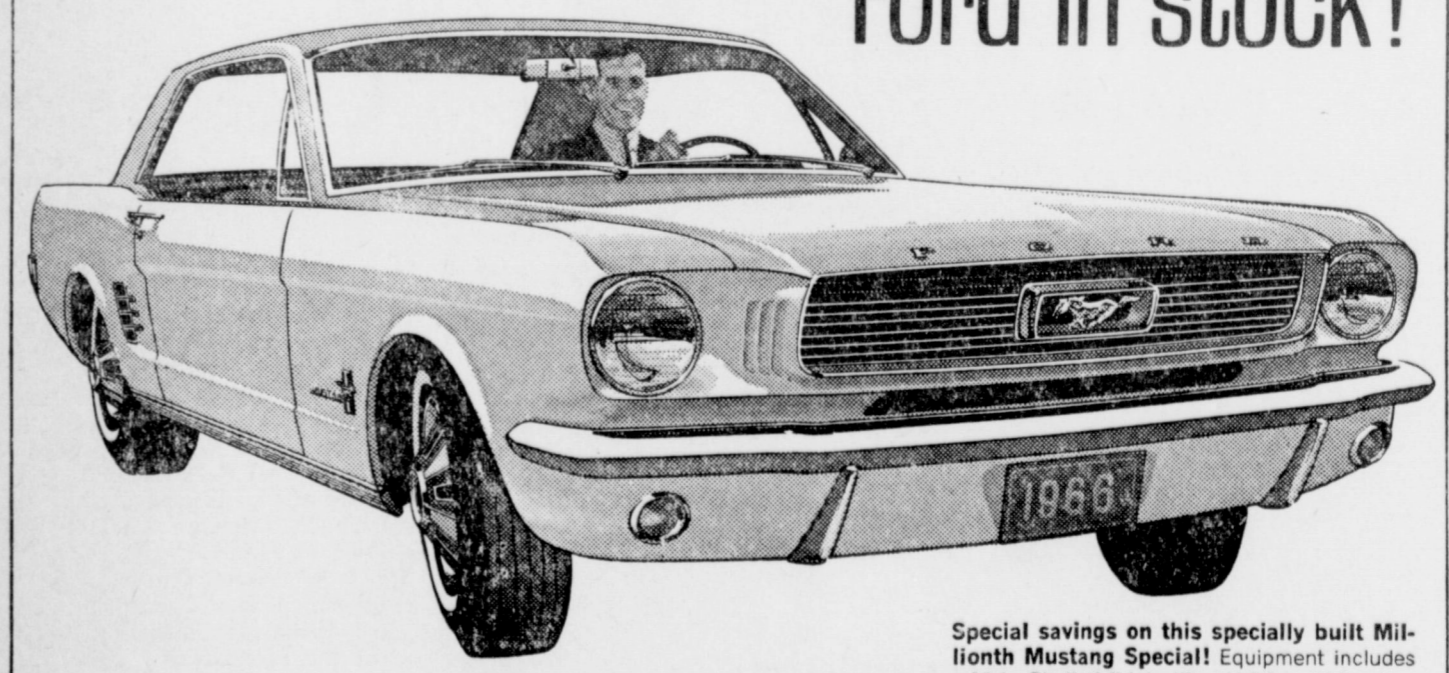
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
