**Missionary Visits
Sister and Family**

Miss Dimple Heather, missionary from Disciples of Christ to Aguascalientes, Mexico, for 17 years, who is home on sick leave, is visiting her niece Mrs. James Wiseman and family at 300 Kathiee.

Miss Heather was reared in Irvine, Ky. She attended school there and Eastern State Teachers college at Richmond, Ky. She received the AB from University of Kentucky at Lexington, and taught in Estell county, Ky., for several years before going into missionary work. She attended language school in Costa Rica.

Miss Heather describes Aguascalientes, a city of 135,000 persons, as the geographical center of Old Mexico.

In her church, which is self-supporting, she is director of the junior church and works with

Christian Women's Fellowship. She is busy at the church's social center during the week, where teaching English is one of the main objectives. At present there are 10 classes of English with approximately 200 students. The students range from 6th grade up. When Miss Heather left in April, one man 80 years of age was studying English.

The center has a big library which is used by city schools as well as people of the church.

Translation service at the social center has been helpful to many relative to letters, legal documents and such. Other services rendered are extension work for children, sewing classes, and the large playground. Any and all children can enjoy the supervised play on Monday afternoons. On Wednesdays the boys use the playground, and on Thursday the girls take over.

The social center has a sewing machine which is lent to certain suburban communities where the Disciples have a church or mission on work. Miss Heather says that

many of the Mexican women are talented seamstresses.

Director of the center is in charge of a food supplement program for people in rural areas which is proving most rewarding.

Miss Heather hopes she will be physically able to return to her work by October. She loves the country, the people, and the work for which she feels definitely called. She is the essence of charm, poise, gentleness, and devotion to her work; characteristics that people just naturally expect to find in a missionary.





Twice a Week Trash Hauling Set for Homes

ORDINANCE NO. 109

An ordinance amending Trash and Garbage Ordinance No. 90, pertaining to the monthly assessment charge for trash and garbage collections, in the City of Iowa Park, Texas.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, on this the 10th day of July A.D. 1967, in regular monthly session, that Section No. 20 of the Trash and Garbage Ordinance No. 90 be and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

SECTION 20.

There shall be charged, assessed and collected from each residential premises within the City Limits the monthly amount of \$1.50, or two pickups each week, and from each business premises within said City Limits the monthly amount of \$1.50 to \$50.00. The City Secretary shall collect these garbage and rubbish fees through the water department as a separate item on each water bill or by any other practicable means of collection.
