"Your friend, Gary"

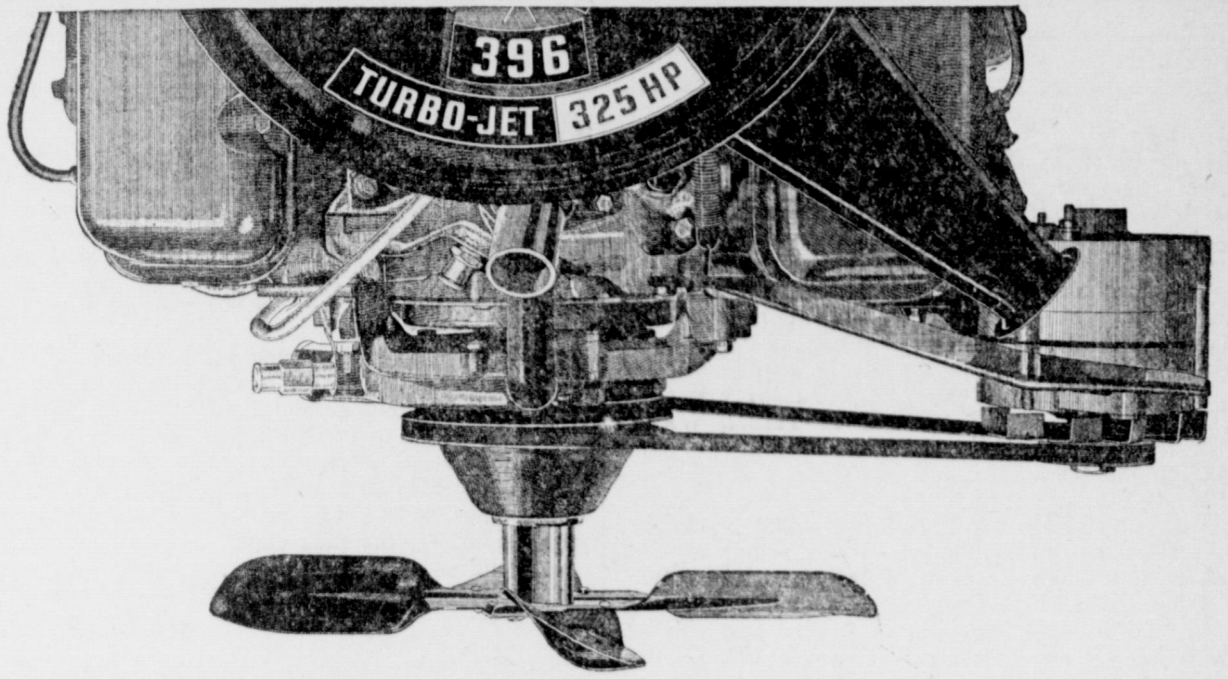

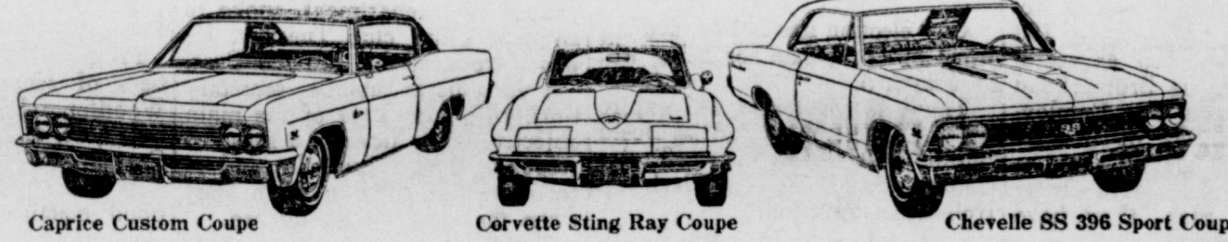

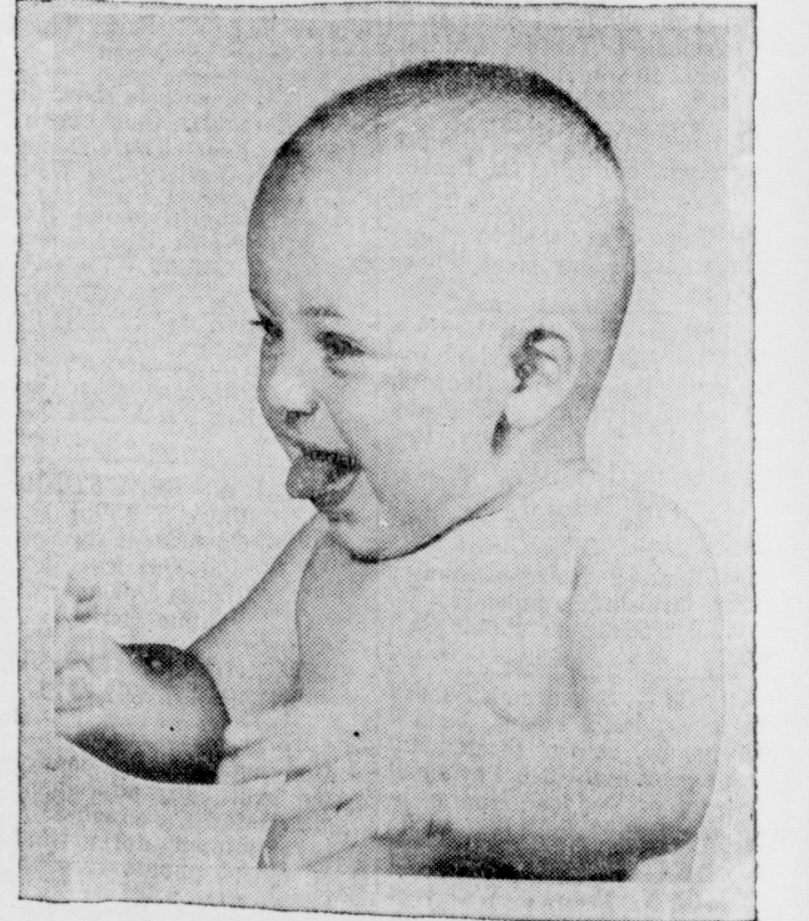
