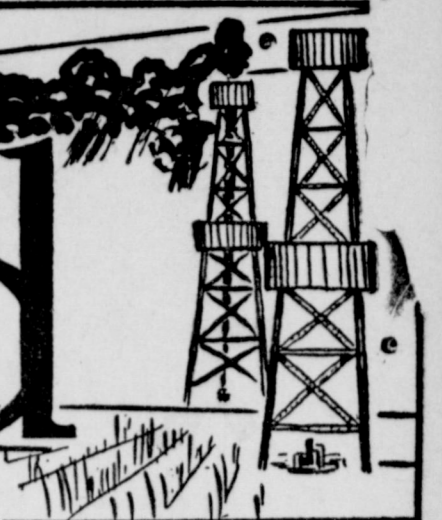

Frank Morris, son of Fred Morris of Iowa Park, is in poor condition as of midnight Wednesday, Dec. 25, following surgery in Wichita Falls. He was discovered Wednesday morning about 1:30 in unconscious condition suffering from a severe beating by unknown assailant.

Frank's 1968 Bonneville Pontiac hardtop is missing and police are making an all-out search for the car and his assailant. It is dark gray with black vinyl top and had Texas license plates — FDF 936.

Police have some clues to the identity of the thief who beat young Morris unmercifully and absconded with his automobile, but they are not ready to state whom they suspect.

Frank has been working with General Dynamics at Dallas for some time.

### Leonard Dowell Service Held

Leonard Leslie Dowell, 57, a resident of Iowa Park since 1953, died Sunday afternoon in Wichita Falls following a lengthy illness.

Born Nov. 10, 1911, at Rotan, he married Floy Irene Sowders on June 12, 1930.

Before moving to Iowa Park the family ran a concession stand at Lake Diversion for a year. Mr. Dowell worked as a boiler and plant operator at Wichita Falls state hospital for seven years.

He was a veteran of World War II and served in the European Theater of Operations. He was a member of United Methodist church.

Funeral service was conducted Tuesday at Tanner Funeral Home chapel by Rev. George Lewis, associate minister of University United Methodist church, Wichita Falls.

Burial was in Highland cemetery here. Pallbearers were J. W. Thomas, T. C. Scott, Doyle Koonce, T. E. Gilbreath, J. E. Howard and Robert Hughes.

Funeral service for Dewey Oscho James, retired farmer and dairyman and long-time Democratic party leader in Wichita county, will be conducted at 10 o'clock this morning in First Baptist church here.

Rev. Gerald Tidwell of Faith Baptist church will officiate. Burial will be in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home.

A resident of this area for 40 years, D. O. died at home early Tuesday.

Born Dec. 12, 1900, in Blue Ball, Ark., he was married Dec. 25, 1925, to Felma Gladys Horn at Danville, Ark. They moved to Texas in November 1928 and he began farming in Wichita Valley irrigation project.

Mr. James had been Democratic chairman of Precinct 33 for 16 years and had been a delegate to several state conventions of the party.

A. F. Edwards, county chairman, praised Mr. James as "long-time worker for good government. He was a fair man who had sound judgment." Mr. James was often consulted by county Democratic executive committee and by governmental figures.

Mr. James was member of First Baptist church and Lions Club of Iowa Park and was former member of board of trustees of Iowa Park Independent School district.

Survivors include Mrs. James; four sons: Don and Douglas of Wichita Falls and Billy and Deryl of Iowa Park; two daughters: Mrs. Dale Hansard of Lubbock and Mrs. Donnie J. 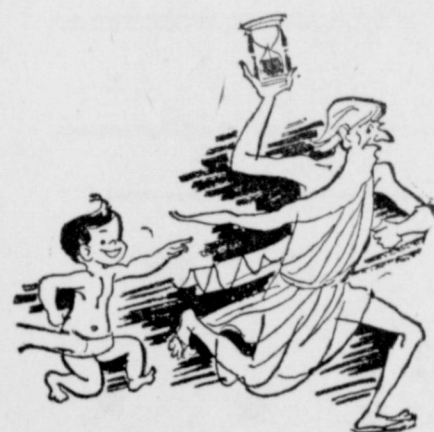

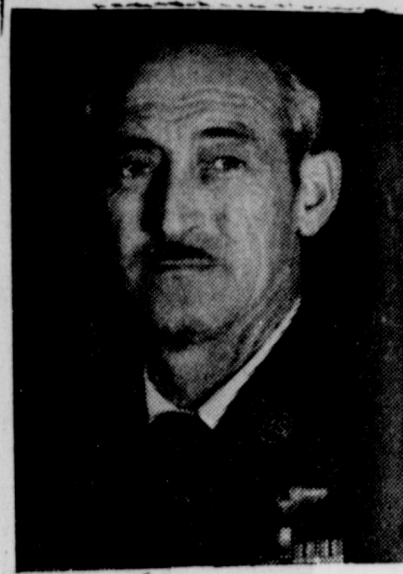

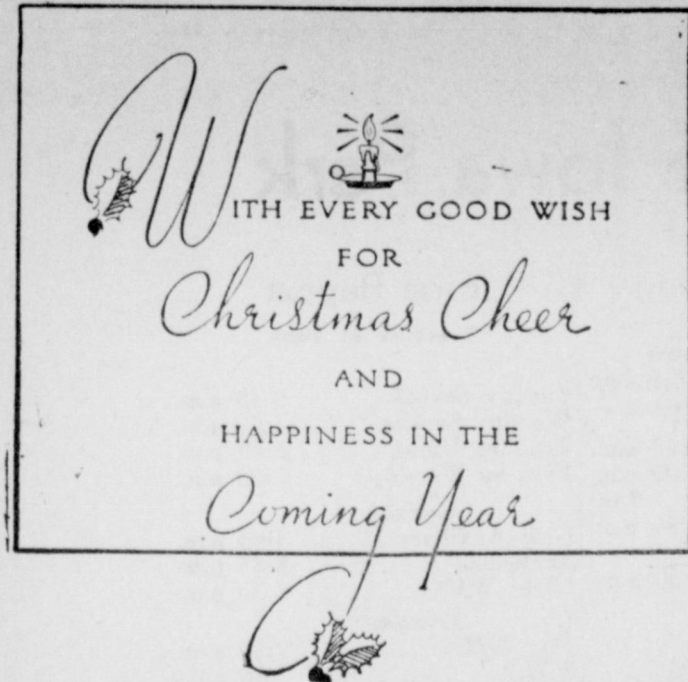
