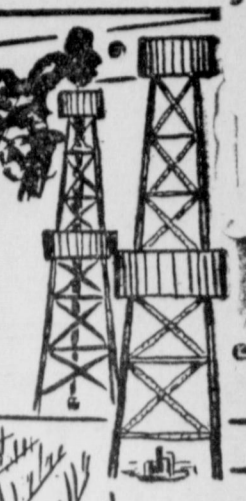

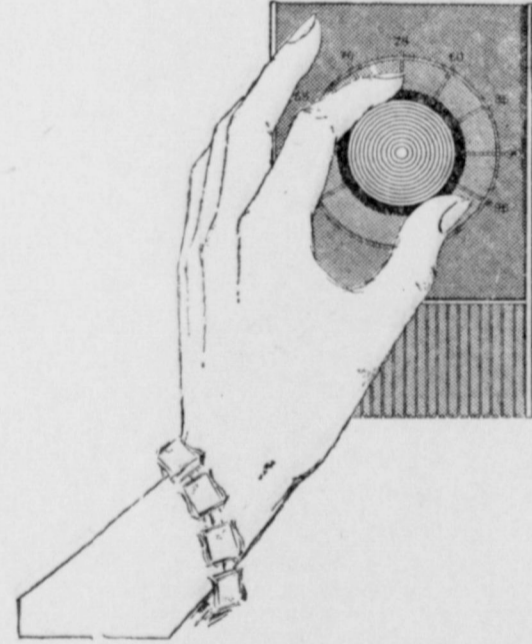

**Australian Student Visits Friends Here**

Arthur Venton Cook of Adelaide, South Australia, spent his first Christmas in America at Iowa Park and Wichita Falls. A graduate student at Oklahoma State university, he accompanied Gary Leath, his roommate and a junior at OSU, to spend holidays here with Gary's grandparents Mrs. Neile Leath of Iowa Park and Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Lowry of Wichita Falls.

Native of Australia, Cook is a graduate of King's college (high school) in Adelaide, and received the bachelor of agriculture economics degree from New England university in New South Wales, Australia.

He worked in the department of agriculture at Adelaide for 2½ years and entered OSU in September to do graduate study on a Rotary Foundation scholarship.

Several days after arriving in Stillwater, Venton was sitting in the dorm room when Gary Leath walked in and said, "I am from Japan." He had spent the summer in Tokyo visiting his parents Maj. and Mrs. James Leath.

Venton, feeling a homesickness for relatives and friends and for Australia, liked Gary's attitude, and knew immediately he wanted Gary for roommate. The feeling was mutual and the boys have become close friends.

Venton is son of Rev. and Mrs. R. A. Cook. The father is Congregational minister and headmaster of King's college. The mother is a sister Mrs. Mervin Beare, a former teacher; and a younger brother John Ralph, who has BA degree from University of Australia at Adelaide.

Commenting on America, Cook stated the pace of living is much slower in his native country, and Americans work harder and for longer hours.

His first impressions of America were: the great mass of people, large buildings, populous cities, freeways, almost innumerable motor cars, friendliness of the people. He has found a greater variety of foods here; and he especially enjoys chicken, dressing and vegetables. But he misses lamb and mutton.

He has noticed a difference in serving of meals. In his country the plates are filled in kitchen and brought into dining room. He like the family style serving in Southwest.

In visiting rural areas of Oklahoma, Cook has observed a bond between rural families in both countries in that they realize and appreciate the worth of family and home life.

The Australian says that national football dominates the lives of people in his country; but the rules and play are different from the American gridiron. He has found marching bands, cheerleaders, majorettes, mascots, ribbons and banner here exciting.

Australian national football is a game of kicking and high catching, and players do not run with the ball. Each team has 18 players dressed in boots, long socks, shorts and short sleeved sweaters.

The field is 150 yards by 100 yards and the game is 100 minutes in four quarters. Football is played there on elementary, high school, college and professional levels as it is in America.

Venton saw snow for the first time when he visited Colorado at

Thanksgiving time. Australia has snow in some sections, but he has never seen it.

Cook's hobbies are travelling, photography and old motor cars. When he came to the USA he sold one of his most prized possessions—a 1949 M-G TC model—and he had previously owned a 1935 Chevrolet convertible. He enjoys cricket, a national summer game; tennis; track and field; and plays the piano some.

Cook is in demand as speaker at Rotary club meetings. He plans to tour USA before returning to Australia. One of the Christmas gifts from his family was "The Flinders," a picture book telling the story of Sand Stone Mountain Range.
