Jewel Agee Dies 50 Years Ago

W. I. (Buddy) Lynn, "Mr. Anvil Shooter," who normally shoots the anvil on July 4 and Christmas Day, had a special reason for blasting it Monday at 11:00 a.m.

Fifty years ago, when the Armistice was signed, as soon as his family, who lived near St. Jo, heard that World War I had ended, Buddy helped his father shoot the anvil to celebrate the occasion.

They were out of gun powder, and since they lived 20 miles from town they did not want to wait to go buy it, so they broke shotgun shells to get the powder they needed.

Buddy's two children, Harold and Mrs. Don Daugherty, helped him shoot the anvil just as he helped his father 50 years ago.

Another special guest was Grover Hodges who celebrates his birthday on Nov. 11. He served in World War I and was overseas when the Armistice was signed.

One big difference between anvil shooting now and in 1913 is that Buddy uses an electric charger to explode the gun powder instead of the kerosene rags which were ignited and burned slowly until the fire reached the gun powder.
