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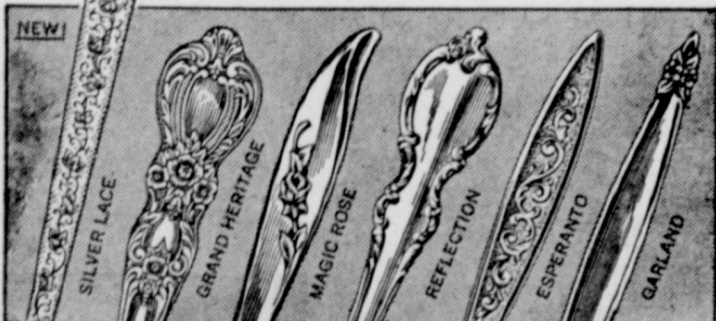

### Hall Family Genealogy

The Scroggs name is not without note in Scottish history. People of this name take it from the "Land of the Scroggs" in the Barony of Stobo, Peebleshire near Edinburgh.

Robert de Scroggs lost his life in the service of David de Lyne. His son Simon had a grant of the lands of Scroggs, circa 1208, from David de Lyne. Later he sold the grants to the Bishop of Glasgow, Adam Scroggs, a burghess of Haddington, rendered homage in 1296.

The surname traveled north to Aberdeen, appearing there in the later half of 14th century. In 1398 David de Scroggs was elected a councillor of Aberdeen. In 1399 he granted a charter in favor of the Carmelites. John de Scroggs was a charter witness and provost in 1449.

The Scroggs are a distinct sept of Clan Hay. The Lynes were of this clan until the family died out on the male side, the lands being carried to the Hays by the heiress.

The Scroggs are entitled to the Hay Arms but have their own, which are described on a brass plate above the shield. This coat of arms is in possession of the family.

Variants of the name in Scotland today are Scroggs, Scroggis, Scroggie. Members of the family bearing this variant were supporters of Bonny Prince Charlie in 1745. The Scroggs moving north to Aberdeen became part of the Gordon Clan.

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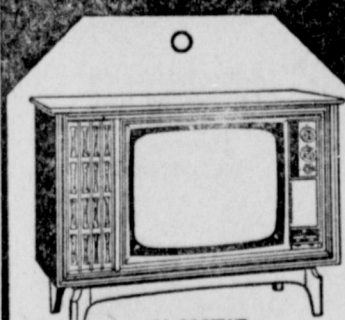
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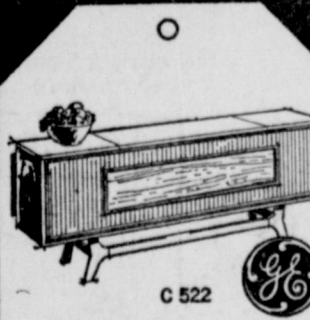
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# SHUCKS

Steve was member of the drama club in Kaneohe which put on some outstanding productions. One was "Lil Abner" musical comedy which showed to full

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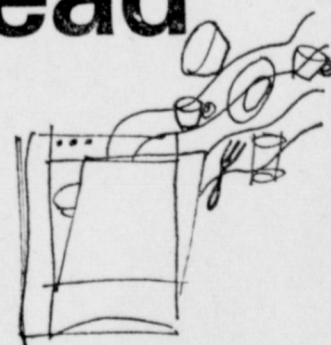
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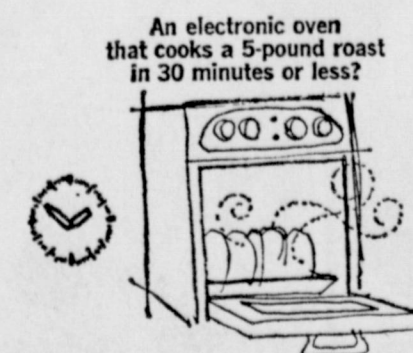
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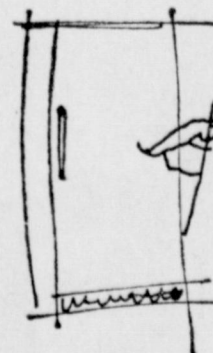
