## Hello Girls Have Fun

There once was a lady, according to lore, who called on her telephone operator for help in shortening her extra-long telephone cord.

"I'll hold my end of the line and you pull hard on yours. That should take up some of the slack," she told the operator.

According to Jim Hall, Southwestern Bell manager for Iowa Park, the lady is a legend who comes alive whenever the subject turns to funny things that happen at the switchboard.

"Any time you deal daily with the public, you'll experience your share of humorous happenings. This is one of the elements that makes the operator's job interesting. She never knows what will happen next," he notes.

Consider the following exchange between an operator and a customer calling for information:

Caller: Can you help me? I'm trying to call my doctor and I'm having trouble.  
Operator: What kind of trouble are you having?  
Caller: I have a pain in my side and it's going up my back.  
"We've found everybody has a different approach to meaning of things," said Hall. "This is one of the reasons you may no longer hear the operator say 'Information' in many cities. The words 'directory assistance' are being used in many cities."

Hall hopes this terminology will cut the number of calls our girls get from people who want bus schedules, stock market quotations, ball scores, highway directions and other non-telephone dials. He says the directory is the best source for finding numbers.

Telephone operators over the years have saved lives, helped in times of trouble, located stray cats and answered many puzzlers. One Sunday morning recently, a child dialed and asked to speak to God. The response, quick and convincing: "He's busy at church."

"Our operators are dead serious about providing superb telephone service," noted Hall, "but they've learned it helps to have a good sense of humor."

Last Friday night while the Hawks were downing Childress 47-7 here, the Seymour Panthers were knocking Shamrock's Irish from the unbeaten ranks in district play 13 to 7.

Childress Bobcats, playing on Bobby Gilbreath Field, could not crack Iowa Park's defenses until the last quarter, when they managed to work the ball downfield for a 3-yard plunge into paydirt.

Iowa Park scored twice in the first and second quarters, slacked off in the third, and poured on the coal for 22 points in the final quarter.

James Eke, who has been a consistent scourge of the enemy all season, scored three touchdowns on 24-yard run, 1-yard run, and a 60-yard punt runback.

Jeff McDonald palmed a pass from Jim Clapp and scored a 43-yard TD in the second quarter. And just before the game ended he took a punt on the 22 and escorted it upfield 78 yards to paydirt. Besides getting perfect blocking, Jeff fainted the last defender off stride and outran him over the goal line.

Steve Nunn scored in the second quarter on a 10-yard run. Clapp's 8-yard run in the 4th quarter started the parade of scoring in the dying moments. This was followed by Eke's and McDonald's patented punt runbacks.

Jerry Pitman scored 2 points with PAT kicks, and Jerry Spruill the final point.

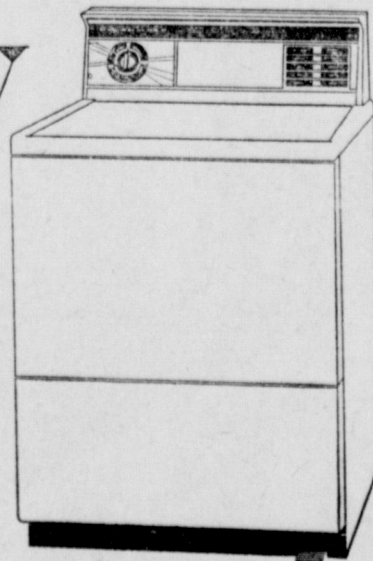

ORDINANCE 123

An ordinance providing for the calling and holding an election by vote of the qualified voters of the City of Iowa Park relative to the adoption of a local sales and use tax for the benefit of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, in accordance with the provisions of Title 122A of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as heretofore and hereafter amended; now, therefore,

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that an election shall be called on the 23rd day of November, A.D. 1968, at Elayle Kidwell Elementary School, 1200 North Third Street, and W. R. Bradford Elementary school, 800 South Texowa in the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, for the submission of the question: Do the qualified voters of said city, voting at an election held regard to the adoption of a local sales and use tax for the benefit of such city in accordance with the provisions of Article 1066C under Title 122A of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, and as heretofore and hereafter amended, wish to adopt a local sales and use tax and

Notice of such election shall be given by causing a substantial copy of this ordinance calling for the election to be published on the same day of two successive weeks in the Iowa Park Herald, and the date of the first publication be given at least 21 days prior to the date set for such election.

The ballot at such election have printed on it the following:

[...] "FOR the adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

[...] "AGAINST the adoption of a one per cent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

The election shall be conducted in the manner provided by law for other municipal elections, and if a majority of the votes cast in such an election be in favor of the adoption of a local sales and use tax, the same shall be effected in the City of Iowa Park as follows: In order to allow time for the Comptroller's administrative duties under this Act, there shall elapse one whole calendar quarter after the Comptroller receives notice of adoption of such tax provided for in this Act, after which such local sales and use tax shall be effective in such city beginning on the first day of the calendar quarter next succeeding such elapsed quarter.

Passed by the City Council on this the 23rd day of September, A.D. 1968.
