





Cigaret vs Cancer ESA Items ...

Nearly every adult in Iowa Park s concerned, directly or indirectly, day night, Jan. 17, in the home of with a bit of unusual detective Mrs. Donald Hill with Miss Essie work that has just been completed.

The half-million dollar investigation concerns lung cancer. Results of this research appear in the current issue of Atlantic Monthly. A medical and scientific director of American Cancer society, Dr. Charles S. Cameron, has written the article entitled "Lung Cancer and Smoking-What We Really Know."

"This account of the association between cigaret smoking and the growth of lung cancer is a report of known facts and statistics," says Dr. T. M. Clark of Iowa Park, lo cal representative of the Wichita county unit of ACS. "It may save lives," Clark stated.

According to Dr. Cameron, tobacco has not been proved guilty of causing lung cancer, but tobacco has been shown to have been on the scene of the crime.

"Lung cancer death rate curve suggests that whatever agent is responsible for the present increase in cancer of the lung is of recent appearance in terms of its current prevalence, did not involve men who are now beyond the age of | 70, but did involve men who are 65 to 70, and in the light of usual exposure period necessary to produce cancer, about 20 to 30 years ago. This puts the critical exposure period in the 1920's and early '30's, when the susceptibles were relatively young men.

"Death rates from cancer of the lung were at least five times higher in the heavy cigaret smoking group than in non-smokers.

"The ACS does not propose to tell the public not to smoke. It does intend to equip the national conscience with the information by which it can make up its own mind fairly. If time should establish the innocence of tobacco, such a course will prove less blameworthy than failure to suggest caution."

Dr. Clark says, "Everyone in Iowa Park who is old enough to smoke should be interested in reading this article for the light it sheds on the lung-cancer-tobacco problem."



Pendulum Gift Shows Earth's Rotation



Visible proof of the earth's rotation is shown by a Foucault pendulum presented to the United Nations Headquarters recently by the Netherlands Government. It consists of 200-pound gold-plated sphere suspended by 57-foot stainless steel wire from ceiling of entrance lobby in General Assembly Hall. As earth rotates, sphere swings back and forth over a magnet, the plane of swing shifting slowly clockwise so that complete cycle is made every 36 hours and 45 minutes. Pendulum is named after French physicist Jean Bernard Foucault who used the pendulum in 1851 in Pantheon

For amateurs, wintertime is the safest time for transplanting, according to Miss Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. Plants that drop their leaves are dormant after leaf fall. Others are dormant usually immediately after the first two freezes. After that, plants can be moved anytime before spring growth starts.

Prepare for the job ahead of time so plants will be out of the soil for as short a time as possible. If the ground freezes, do not attempt moving plants until it is thawed. Make holes large enough so roots need not be crowded or twisted.

Good drainage is important. If water will stand in the hole for several hours, additional drainage is needed. Try breaking through the hardpan below, drain off to the






