Breakfast at 7:30 Sunday morning will be served for men and boys of the church. Men will be the choir, and special music will be provided by a male quartet.

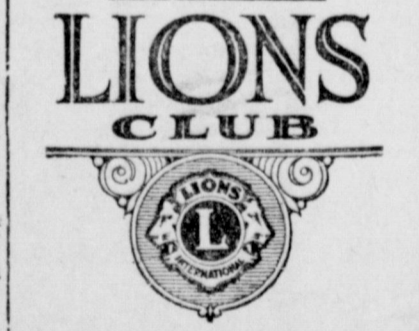
Three laymen will give their personal testimonies at each service.
