Grandson of Local Couple Wins Rhodes Scholarship at Ole Miss

Paul Parish of Port Gibson, Miss., a senior at Ole Miss, has been awarded a Rhode scholarship, according to word received here by his grandparents Mr. and Mrs. Ruben Parish. Paul is son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Parish. His father is a former resident of Iowa Park.

Paul is the first Ole Miss student in six years to win the coveted scholarship, which is given to 32 students in America annually.

Paul, 20 years of age, has made nothing but A's since entering the University of Mississippi. He described winning the scholarship as "one of the most wonderful things that has happened to me in my life." He has received many honors during his college career.

Parish has been in the campus Senate for two years, served as the Rhodes diamond industry, and for whom Rhodesia was named.

A Rhodes state selection committee nominates two students for the scholarship; and a regional committee picks four winners from the six-state area.

Judges on the regional committee are former Rhodes Scholars from each state in the area, with a non-Rhodes-Scholar as chairman.

Parish is a member of Phi Kappa Phi, a Johns Scholar and a participant in the University Scholar Program. He was recently selected to Who's Who among Students in American Colleges and Universities. He is a liberal arts major.

The stipend is for 100 pounds a year (about \$2600) and provides for two years of study at Oxford university, with a possible extension of a third year.

Council Calls Special Election

Monday night, Dec. 11, the Iowa Park city council held its regular meeting with all members and Mayor C. L. Metz present.

By unanimous vote, Ordinance No. 111 was passed providing for the calling of an election of a Home Rule Charter Commission for the City of Iowa Park. The election is called for Feb. 8, 1968, and final date for filing of candidates for a place on the ballot will be at 12:00 noon on Jan. 6.

The commission will be composed of 15 qualified voters of Iowa Park as members.

Should the Ordinance be approved by the voters on Feb. 8, a commission will be elected to frame a new charter for Iowa Park.

However, the family plans to rebuild and move back to Iowa Park vicinity in the near future. Having been mayor of a small city, Thaten naturally is interested in seeing a small town grow and its citizens prosper.

Four File for Water Board

The Herald has been authorized to publish the following Notice of Water Control and Improvement District Directors Election:

To the resident qualified voters of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, said district boundaries being the same as the City of Iowa Park:

An election will be held on the 9th day of January, 1968, at the Agriculture Building, 220 West Park, in Iowa Park, for the purpose of electing three members to the Board of Directors of said District.

Presiding Judge for this election is Mr. J. C. Hester. Absentee voting may be done with Miss Doria Smith at the Iowa Park City Hall the week of Jan. 2, 1968.

President of Water District No. 3 is Mr. Harrel Sullivan and Secretary-Treasurer is Dr. E. F. Watson.

Responsibilities of this Water District include the management of Lake Iowa Park and the new Buffalo Creek Reservoir. This Board determines the water tax rate for Iowa Park, any recreational usage of the lakes, and furnishes water from the lakes to be treated and distributed by the City of Iowa Park.

Four candidates have filed for the three vacancies to be filled: Mr. M. L. Hines, retired, former Wichita County Commissioner; Mr. Sam D. Hunter, real estate; Mr. Delbert W. Todd, public school biology teacher; Dr. E. F. Watson, present Water Board Secretary-Treasurer.

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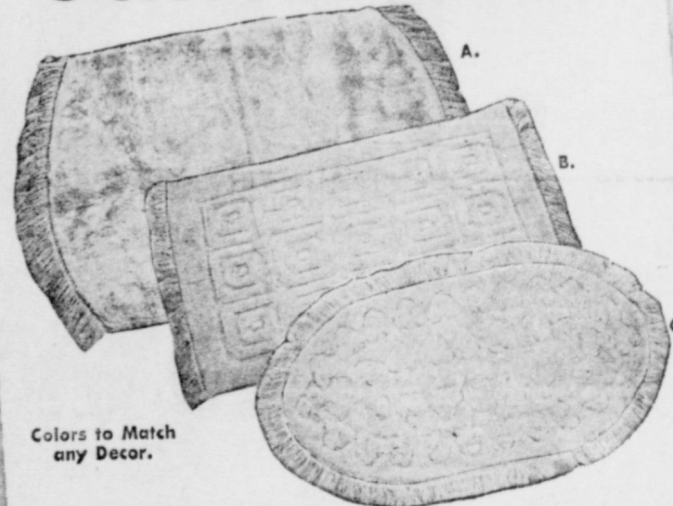
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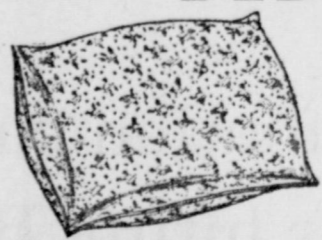
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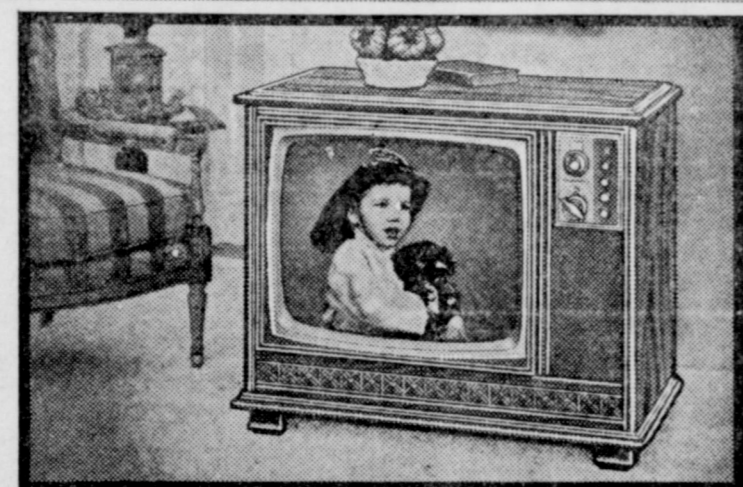
