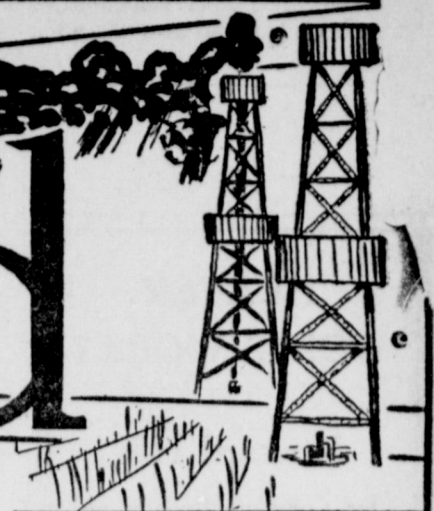

Sales Tax Voted

Canvassing of votes in Saturday's one per cent sales and use tax election was the first item of business at Monday night's regular meeting of the City Council. Official count showed 422 votes were cast with 350 for and 72 against the tax.

Sales tax will go into effect next April 1 and Iowa Park can expect its first returns from the state comptroller about Aug. 1.

Mayor Erwin F. Soell has called a city planning conference for 7:30 p.m. Dec. 2 in the Soil Conservation building. All citizens are invited and will be asked to speak out on any subject relevant to the city and planning for the future.

The council decided to enforce ordinances which forbid dangerous buildings, fire hazards and traps such as littered yards surrounding old buildings, and forbid storage or accumulation of old automobiles and things of like nature without a junk dealer's permit.

The council decided to enforce the collection policy on water bills, beginning in January. Persons who owe two months' bills and do not pay the full amount will be cut off from service and will be penalized before being reconnected.

A new rate schedule for inspections by the electrical inspector was adopted.

Mrs. Juanita Odell Zink, 71, a resident of Iowa Park for 50 years, died Saturday night in a Wichita Falls hospital following a long illness.

She was born Nov. 11, 1897, at Tom Bean. A graduate of Sherman high school, she attended Trinity university at Waxahachie and came to Iowa Park in 1913 to teach history and speech in high school. She was married here on Dec. 21, 1919.

Mrs. Zink was member of the Methodist church and she worked with the young people for 25 years, and sang in the sanctuary choir.

She was a former Camp Fire leader, past president of 23 Study club and Modern Music Study club. She was a member of Order of the Eastern Star.

She worked with Iowa Park Insurance Agency for 19 years before ill health forced her to retire.

Bike Safety Tape

Bike owners wishing to have reflective safety tape applied to their bicycles may bring them to City Park behind City Hall on Nov. 30 between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Tape will be applied free by members of Iowa Park Veterans of Foreign Wars with cooperation of city police.

This is part of a nationwide VFW "Lite-A-Bike" program.

Robert Horton, post commander, says the tape can be seen at night a distance of 1500 feet when caught in the beam of a car's headlights. It is applied to the handlebars, front fork and rear fender, making the bike capable of being reflected from any angle.

"Some 600 persons are killed and 30,000 are injured every year in bicycle traffic in the nation," Horton says. "And four of five fatal accidents occur at dusk or after dark."

"The extra warning provided by reflective tape could save the rider's life."

In addition to applying tape, VFW members inspect bikes for proper equipment, horn or other signaling device, headlight, rear reflector and adequate brakes.

Hawks 34 Phillips 12

Last Friday night in Vernon the feathers really flew as the Mean Green Hawks and Phillips Blackhawks tangled in bi-district round of the state playoffs.

For the many rooters who left Our Town of friendly living and traveled to Vernon the outcome was never in doubt as the Mean Green stopped the vaunted Phillips ground game completely.

Jimmy Gilmore, Craig French, Robert Bradford, Steve Berry, Steve Watson, Weldon Bradberry continually mopped up the blockers and made jarring tackles.

Coach Tommy Watkins' sophomore laden specialty teams did a tremendous job of throttling Phillips at every turn.

Hawks made the scoreboard click on their second possession of the game as the North Country defense concentrated on stopping Eke and Nunn. Sophomore Steve Watson burst through left guard and raced through the middle of the Blackhawks. The play, opened by blocks of Don Harrison and Robert Bradford, carried 51 yards and brought the entire contingent of Hawk fans to their feet.

Hawks continued to stop Phillips and took over the ball again to ram another TD. Clapp's pass to Eke and a penalty moved the ball to the visitors' 10. Berry picked up nice yardage through the line. Steve Watson then lugged it close to the goal line, where he was knocked loose from the pigskin. Soph Jeff McDonald obtained possession in the endzone for the second Hawk score.

Just before the half ended, the Hawks were driving relentlessly on the ground and Blackhawks were trying to stave them off. Steve Nunn ran a pass pattern that got him behind the defense — and Jim Clapp laid the ball right on him. The defense caught Nunn at the 5 but he managed to fight his way over for the third score. The Hawks went to their dressing room leading 21-6.

Phillips' first-half score came after the Hawks had fumbled on their 31-yard line. Kelly Cooke, who was to give the Hawks and their fans some anxious moments during the game, scored the TD.

After Marching of the Bands, the Hawks continued their mastery over the Panhandle's Best, especially in the line. Our Mean Green offense and defense were superb and Phillips' passing attack was repeatedly stopped by hard rushes of Gilmore and Bradford and French. Eke, Clapp, Nunn and Thompson did a fine job of covering receivers. They allowed only one pass to be completed against them.

A big play of the game developed on a Phillips punt. McDonald tried to field the ball but it eluded his grasp. Gary Frazier raced in and picked up the ball and carried it 45 yards to paydirt.

This play was followed soon by pass interception and 25-yard return when netted Phillips another 6 points.

Iowa Park's fifth TD came at the end of a sustained drive with Jeff McDonald capping the march with a 3-yard plunge through a hole made by Hawk reserves, who also did a fine job when Watkins sent them in.

Rain and snow have hampered the Hawks in workouts this week in preparation to meet Denver City at Snyder. Wednesday the Hawks worked out in the H. L. Gage enclosed arena so they could have some contact work.

Snow and rain also have hampered Coach Don Orr's Mustangs. If any Hawk fans have never seen the Mustang offense, they are due for a real eye-opener. Orr uses wide gaps in the line and sometimes goes into an SMU spread.

Mean Green defense will have its hands full, especially with an All-District 190-lb. fullback, who is Denver City's premier running back.

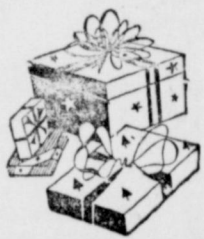

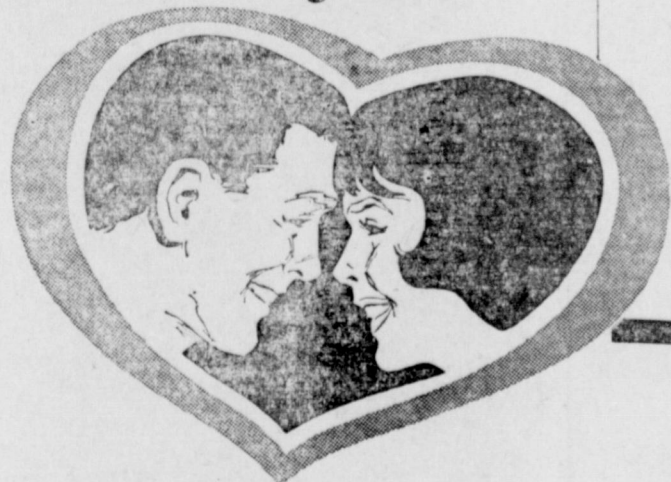

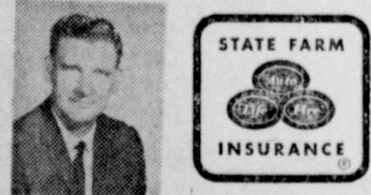
