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

1 cup julienne strips Swiss

1 can (2 ounces) fillets of anchovies, if desired 1/2 cup mayonnaise 1/4 cup French dressing Ripe olives

2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced Tomato wedges

Have all ingredients chilled. Tear head lettuce and romaine into bite-size pieces; toss with onion, celery, meat, chicken, cheese, anchovies, reserving a few strips of meat and cheese. Just before serving, blend mayonnaise and French dressing; toss salad. Top with meat and cheese strips, ripe olives, egg slices and tomato wedges. 4

PATIO BREAD

2 cups New Bisquick 3/3 cup milk

One of the following: 1 envelope (about 11/2 ounces) sour cream sauce mix

1 envelope (about 11/2 ounces) chili seasoning mix

1 envelope (about 2 ounces)

spaghetti sauce mix 1 envelope (about 1/2 ounce) Italian salad dressing mix 1 envelope (about 34 ounce)

gravy mix 1 envelope (about 11/2 ounces) cheese sauce mix Soft butter

Heat oven to 450°. Grease baking sheet. Mix New Bisquick, milk and choice of sauce mix with fork to a soft dough. Beat vigorously ½ minute. Spread dough on prepared baking sheet into an oblong, 8x6 inches. Spread with butter. Bake 15 minutes. While hot, cut into 24 strips, each 3x34 inch; serve immediately. 12 servings.

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
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Coney O. Walker, predatory animal hunter for Texas Fish and Wildlife, was speaker Tuesday at Noon Lions club meeting. According to Walker, the coyote and bobcat are the two preda-tory animals in this area. They are caught and killed for protection of animals and poultry and not for the extinction of the bobcat and the covote.

Walker is employed by Texas and his work is supervised by the federal government. He explained the use of traps and of cyanide guns in hunting predatory animals. He said the owner of the land has to sign an agreement before Walker can work on his property.

Medicine's Ancient Life-Saving Tool Modernized

Of all the life-saving mechanisms available to modern medicine, probably the most important, and least understood, is the amzingly-versatile catheter.

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
