



In the Frank M. Wood Wildlife Conservation Awards program, resulting in awards for wildlife minded men from all over Texas, Joe. P. Cunningham, who operates an 875 acre ranch three miles west of Iowa Park, was named winner of Area 5, Farmer-Rancher division, Awards will be made Jan. 19 at Lubbock at the annual convention of the Association of Texas Soil Conservation District Supervisors. Game and fish management has been given a high priority in operation of the Cunningham ranch, with provision of cover, food and water for wildlife included.
